We the undersigned on behalf of the Town Commissioners and voicing the genuine national sentiments of the people of Duan, desire to avail ourselves of the present opportunity of tendering to you a hearty welcome to the City of the Tribes and to the County of Galway, with both of which your name must ever remain familiarly associated. We cannot forget the many dreary days of imprisonment you spent within the prison walls of this city to prove your submission to English dictation. Neither can the down trodden tenantry of Galway soon forget even as the cry of the present day hill-siders, the many bitter struggles you so bravely fought by their side, the many sacrifices you made, and the many dangers you risked to help them to trample upon the cruel system of landlordism with which they were oppressed.

We desire to convey to you our unbounded admiration of your indomitable courage, your unselfish patriotism, and your unparalleled advocacy of the cause of the poor and the tenants of Ireland. Those worn-out soldiers who have made such unparalleled heroic sacrifices in the cause of the tenants of Ireland, but who were so ruthlessly, so shamefully deserted in their hour of need, and on the eve of victory, by the world-beaten savours of our country, we desire too to express to you and to your faithful and incomparable comrades in suffering and sacrifice for pure and ardent love of country

honour John Dillon, the intense feelings of satisfaction and joy which the people of Duan, in conjunction with the people of Ireland, felt when at the present time of this year you proclaimed your unwillingness to sacrifice your Country at the shrine of an ambitious dictator, and when you're unhesitatingly cast in your lot with all true lovers of your country to save her from ruin at the hands of those unfaithful sons she trusted too implicitly and too well.

We grieve to think that amongst these degenerate sons who have so basely betrayed their faith and Fatherland, should be found a representative of the Tipperary County of Galway. We beg to tender to you and to the Irish Parliamentary party under the leadership of Mr. Justin McCarthy M.P. our entire confidence and we promise that so far as the time comes when ~~we~~ ^{you} and terrorism cannot stifle the expression of the real feeling of the country the electors of Duan who have never been behind in the struggle for the freedom of their country will do their best to wipe out any stain upon their constituency, and to stamp out factionism as the curse of our country and the destruction of our people.

We thank you for your noble efforts to restore peace and harmony to our dear afflicted and distressed country. It cost the expense of Margravement and calumny, but as your increasing efforts have been so persistently and so scornfully rejected, we beg to suggest that the time for conciliation has passed away, the golden opportunity has been spurned and it is now the duty of every Nationalist to join hand in hand to fight shoulder to shoulder until factionism has been driven from every corner of the land, and until the Irish party united once again, we shall have achieved independence for our country.

Statement of Facts

In 1871, Mr Hignell purchased the tenancy of house No. 1, Church Street, Maryborough for the sum of £190, at the yearly rent £28 per annum, Mr Hignell reconstructed shop and premises all which were in a ruined condition, at an outlay of over £600 and built up a fine business. In 1888, he was通知 by the head landlord Mr J. Cassan, not to pay rent to Mr O'Brien and in 1891, a suit for possession was instituted - the immediate owner Mr O'Brien not being aware of the transaction

On the issue of the writ for possession, Mr Cassan demanded from Mr Hignell four years mensal rates, at the increased rent of £50. per year (£200) with interest and compound interest on same. He also demanded the legal costs incurred in establishing his claim, together with the removal and large portion of yard, on which Mr Hignell had built stores and stables, leaving nothing more than the dwelling house and small yard, which would be quite insufficient for Mr Hignell in carrying

on his large business. Sooner than destroy his business Mr. Hipwell consented to pay these most unjust demands. of undemanded; also to surrender the Galway, but stated his house was useless to him without species and said As Mr. Cassan would not agree to this. Mr. Hipwell then offered to pay him the above sums and an additional £30 if left in possession for six months, so as to clear off his large stock.

Mr. Cassan also refused this, and the sheriff was instructed to put him out, and possession was taken on the 11th June 1892 by the sheriff.

of Guardians would entail, - (1) The Guardians at their last meeting, 2nd inst, decided
to appoint a collector at a salary of £1 per week and a plumber at £30. per annum. The only
extensable duty of the collector would be the collection of the domestic rate which at the very
most will not exceed £200. per annum, if it even reaches that amount, If the Local Government
Board approve of such a salary it will be given its sanction to the payment of compensation
for collection at the extraordinary figure of £1 per week or perhaps more. (2) The appointment
of collector is wholly unnecessary. If a competent plumber be appointed, it can be made
one of the conditions of his appointment that he should collect the domestic rate; or the poor rate
Collector who at present collects the public water rate could also collect the domestic rate,
(3) The Township of Tuam must now bear the entire cost of the construction and maintenance of
the water works. The plans, maps, etc., were before the Guardians for more than two years,
yet they allowed the reservoir to be erected on an elevation to command the Workhouse and pipes
to be laid to the Workhouse gate, and then refused to take the water in. Had the reservoir not been
erected on an elevation to supply the Workhouse a suitable site could be had much nearer the town,
and several hundred pounds now unnecessarily expended in the work of construction would have been
saved. The Guardians, with the exception of a few, have no interest in Town of Tuam, and this fact cannot
be more clearly exemplified than by the useless expenditure of money in erecting the reservoir where
it is and allowing pipes to be laid to the Workhouse gate, all for no purpose. This waste of money the
Guardians who will bear a part of the expenditure want to supplement by making an appointment
(Collector of domestic water rate) at an orbitant salary that is simply a sinecure, that the Local Govern-
ment Board be respectfully requested to inquire into the matter so as that the area of taxa-
tion may be extended on account of the extra cost consequent on the action of the Guardians

and that rate payers be spared the burthen of sustaining an useless office

Sir.

I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of a copy of resolution passed by the Irish Board in favour of the Christian Brothers

The recent history of the struggle made by the Irish Members and other Nationalists to secure equal treatment for these most valuable educationalists and (as present) unpaid public servants, affords a striking lesson in the great political act of "putting off." As I recollect the circumstances, a strong and united effort was made last summer by the Irish Nationalist Members to secure a promise from the then Government that the Christian Brothers should be permitted to share in the proceeds of Irish taxation so long as they continued to bestow the excellent training which their system now affords. Mr. Laucke the then chief secretary, successfully parried our attack - or yielded to our well founded remonstrances by declaring that the question was one for the Irish Board of Education, and that the latter could confer on the Christian Brothers the advantages of the grant by passing a rule which would bring the Brothers under the scheme of National Education in Ireland. This was the first "put off," though in the whole I think it was an extremely good one for our principle. The Board of Education, after many attempts of a minority to still further delay a solution, found means to pass an excellent rule which would have permitted the Christian Brothers to come under the Board of Education. His Excellency, the Lord Lieutenant, refused to confirm this rule and although it is somewhat premature to judge yet of the effect of the decision of this generally well disposed nobleman, I am not wholly devoid of fears that this retoo may prove a second instance of "putting off." The matter is, I believe, now again referred to the Board of Education, and we can only wait for the developments in that quarter, if the question is not decisively resolved before the 31st January, I would humbly suggest that the Irish Members should make this question one of first class importance and that we should place only one limit to our efforts,

We should not let this point interfere with Home Rule, otherwise we should strain every nerve against anymore "putting off." I have the honour to be, Your Obit Servt

"That as a necessary result of this state of affairs, capital is not ^{being} expended in improving house property, Irish towns are in many cases falling into decadence, trade is languishing or leaving the country, the population is rapidly diminishing, many works of general public utility are delayed, necessary sanitary reforms are neglected and such of the working classes as elect to remain in their native land are not only deprived of regular employment but are also in innumerable instances forced to live in wretched hovels in which a healthy existence is impossible:

"Therefore your Petitioners humbly pray that such a change may be made in the law as will secure the tenants in towns the fruits of any expenditure made by them in effecting permanent improvements in their properties:

"And your Petitioners, as in duty bound, will ever pray."

A Copy to be sent to each of the County members.

The chairman proposed the following resolution which was seconded by Mr MacCormack and unanimously adopted:-

"That we the Tuam Town Commissioners express our profound regret at the death of Rev. Fr. MacPhilpin P.P. Aran Island, as zealous and energetic a priest in the cause of religion and country as any in the archdiocese. Through his several missions he was ever active and indefatigable on the side of the oppressed in their battle against their oppressors. He bore the brunt of coercion during Forster's regime and did yeoman service in furthering the Land League. Sir - I have the honor to report for the information of the Local Government Board for Ireland that I have audited the accounts of the Town Commissioners of Tuam for the year ended 29 Sept 1893 and herewith to send abstract of same duly certified by me in the usual manner. The expenditure for the year under audit appears greatly in excess of the revenue from all sources and it must be cut down unless the Commissioners wish to bring their affairs into Bankruptcy. There may be some items of an exceptional nature but not, I fear, at all sufficient to meet the falling off in receipts from the letting of the Tolls and Customs. There is nothing illegal in the payment of a fixed salary to the Treasurer provided it is reasonable and passed by a resolution of the Board requiring for alteration or rescinding due notice and the votes required for rescinding a resolution passed at a previous meeting. The Town Commissioners will be good enough to attend to this.

If you require any further assistance from me I shall be happy to give it.

so far from Tuam and the cost of supervision the result will not be satisfactory. I should be glad in such a case if the Commissioners would undertake the work for one year after which better provision could be made by Presentment Sessions. It is unfortunate that the long half year comes first because if that had not been the case I could have advised the Grand Jury to present you a half year only, and the short half year could have been managed for the amount allowed but this would not succeed for the long half year (till March Assizes) running through the winter. It will be remembered that I consulted the representative of the Commissioners present at Presentment Sessions before naming the price and the price allowed was then considered to be sufficient.

The Board unanimously decided to have a gas lamp erected in Barrack street, the Chairman and Mr Burke to select site for same.

The chairman proposed and Mr Lyons seconded the following resolution which was unanimously adopted:-

"That, we, the Town Commissioners of Tuam, aware of the sufferings endured and sacrifices made by the evicted tenants of Ireland urgently demand from the governing authorities responsible for the well-being of the Irish people and the preservation of social order in Ireland, to effectually and at once place on equitable terms every tenant unjustly deprived of his holding and that the House of Lords the hereditary and consistent enemies of every Irish advancement, must not be allowed to make the rendering of justice subordinate to class privilege.

"That we think the time has arrived when the Irish Parliamentary Party should take their stand and insist on the Government calling an autumn session for the purpose of passing a registration bill with a view of making an early appeal to the country.

"And that this resolution be telegraphed today to Lord Rosebery and Lord Salisbury, the Evicted Tenants Bill being before the House of Lords tonight."

Tender for printing and advertising was received as follows:-

The clerk was directed to write to Mr Perry, Co Surveyor, requesting him to inform the Board, in case they cleansed the streets for the ensuing year as they had hitherto done, would he give them over whatever remained in his hands of the Grand Jury grant, £90.16^s, after defraining costs of repairing the streets; and also state what that remainder might be.

The Chairman proposed and it was unanimously adopted that—

"We, the Town Commissioners of Tuam, protest in the strongest and most solemn manner possible against the cruel and persecuting action of the House of Lords in rejecting the Tenants Arbitration (Ireland) Bill introduced by the Government and passed through the House of Commons by a large majority of the representatives of the people. That we concern in the interests of social order the vicious and hateful conduct of the so-called noble lords who although admitting that the evicted tenants are almost universal subjects of pity, compassion and sympathy, nevertheless keep 4000 of them and their unfortunate families on the roadside, preventing them from recovering their lost status on the land, deriding and scoffing at their sufferings, flouting public opinion, and by pursuing a persecuting policy seriously imperilling the peace and tranquility of Ireland. That a copy of this resolution be sent to the Freeman's Journal and local papers, to Lord Rosebery Sir John Morley and Justin McCarthy."

The Board adjourned to Monday 27th instant

After revision of the schedule, all the items thereon were decided to remain unchanged for the ensuing year except the toll on wool which, Messrs McDonnell and Rishworth submitted, should be reduced.

At suggestion of Mr MacCormack the clerk was directed to write to Athlone, Mullingar, Roscommon, Ballinasloe Loughrea, and Westport to ascertain the tolls charged on wool in those towns.

Annexed is copy of letter read from the County Surveyor:

"Galway, 25th August, 1894

"The Town Clerk Tuam,

"Sir—I have been unsuccessful up to the present in my attempt to get a

contractor to keep portion of Tuam streets presented for at last Assizes in repair. If I cannot get a contractor before the end of next week I shall advertise for and purchase broken stones and put on a man to attend to the work of repairs. The total sum available is £90.16^s till summer assizes 1895. I shall be glad to have the assistance of the Town Commissioners to make this amount do as much work as possible. I do not propose to divide it into two portions, one for repairs and one for cleansing. In the absence of a Contractor, in my opinion, the Commissioners are liable for cleansing. As County Surveyor I am not bound in any way further than to expend the money to the best of my ability, and if left to myself I shall mainly attend to the surface repairs by applying a sufficient quantity of broken stones. If there is any balance available for cleansing I shall so expend it, but I would point out that till Spring Assizes 1895 the sum available is only one half of the year's amount viz £45.8^s and this certainly will not allow any margin for cleansing. There will probably be a margin during the four months from Spring Assizes to Summer Assizes. I beg respectfully to submit to the Commissioners that a considerable extra as compared with former presentations is given this time from the barony to Tuam: if it is not enough to cover the cleansing it covers part of it, and I am disposed to do what I can to set the Commissioners' views fairly before the Grand Jury of Summer 1895. I am not a lawyer and my opinion is little value on a point of law, but I simply take it that the Loughrea judgment settles that as between the two parties liable for cleansing, the Contractor came in before the Town Commissioners. In your case you have no contractor and I am brought in without any choice on my part and as it is impossible for me to make any profit out of any presentation I am kept free from any loss; this has been decided over and over again. If the Commissioners arrange to supplement the presentation to such a figure as that we shall get a Contractor, I shall put their conditions as best I can and a figure ^{may} in this way be settled which will be useful when next the presentation comes before Sessions and Grand Jury. Consideration of the foregoing letter was postponed till next monthly meeting

At suggestion of Mr Lyons it was agreed that Messrs McHugh, Burke and the Chairman be appointed as Committee to find a suitable place for the street sweepings in order to discontinue making the potato market a depot for them in future.

Mr James McDonnell's tender reduced from £6.17s.6d to £6 was accepted for supplying and erecting a lamp at Barrack Street and connecting same by pipe with the gas main, 100 yard distant

Sir, - I am desired to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 14th instant, transmitting copy of a resolution adopted by the Tuam Commissioners of Tuam at their meeting on 13th instant - and in reply, to acquaint you for the information of the Comms that this Company are not in any way responsible for the accommodation at Tuam Station being insufficient, the Athlone and Tuam railway being now owned by the Waterford and Limerick railway Company. I am further to state the Commissioners are under a misapprehension in thinking that there is any disagreement between the Midland and Waterford Companies, as I am happy to say there exists between them harmonious working arrangements. The delay in running the trains direct into Station at Claremorris does not rest in any degree with the Midland Company, but is owing to the necessary additional accommodation to be provided which has not yet been done. The question has been referred to the decision of Major General Hutchinson R.E., C.P., and the work is to be carried out at the expense of the Waterford and Limerick and Athlone and Tuam Extension to Claremorris Companies before the traffic can be worked through in connexion with our station at Claremorris.
