LOCAL COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE (LCDC)

HEALTHY GALWAY

Adele Rankin has taken up the vacant post of Healthy Galway Coordinator and attended meetings with key stakeholders in preparation for the LCDC Health & Wellbeing Sub-Committee Meeting in March to agree a Workplan and Communications Plan for 2024.

HEALTHY ISLANDS

Galway County Council has received approval from the HSE, Age Friendly Ireland, and Healthy Ireland, for its proposals to allocate €28,746.18 towards a Healthy Islands project on the 4 offshore islands. The proposal is a 2-tier project involving an audit to increase the number and range of social & leisure activities on all 4 islands, in addition to the delivery of targeted health & wellbeing programmes on the 2 larger islands of Inis Oirr and Inis Mór. Further meetings will be held with key stakeholders in March with a view to visiting the islands in April as the project must be completed by end June 2024.

LOCAL ENHANCEMENT PROGRAMME

Galway County LCDC received a total of 220 applications under the Local Enhancement Programme which must be assessed and approved by the LCDC Funding Evaluation Sub-Committee, with recommendations submitted to the Department of Rural and Community Development, by 28th March. Notifications to successful applicants will issue following formal announcement of the funding allocations by the Department in April 2024.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

CATHAOIRLEACH AWARDS

Cllr. Liam Carroll, Cathaoirleach of the County of Galway, formally launched the Cathaoirleach Awards for 2024 on Friday 8th March. The Awards are an annual initiative to acknowledge the commitment of individuals and groups who participate in community & voluntary activities in County Galway and recognise the significant impact their actions have on quality of life in their communities. Nominations are invited from the public under 7 Award Categories reflecting the breadth of community & voluntary activity, and there will be an additional 3 Award Category winners which are selected by the Cathaoirleach and Galway County Council. Galway County PPN (Public Participation Network) are key partners in the delivery of the Cathaoirleach Awards and will work with Galway County



Council in progressing the awards process and announcing the winners in due course at the Mayoral Charity Ball in May 2024.

TIDY TOWNS

In preparation for the National Tidy Towns Competition 2024, the Community Department surveyed all Tidy Towns Groups to identify key issues and challenges which will be discussed at a Tidy Towns Networking Event in Kinvara on Saturday 9th March, with other key staff from the local authority including the Biodiversity Officer, Community Climate Action Officer, Environmental Awareness Officer, and Heritage Officer. In response to the primary challenge identified by Tidy Towns Groups, i.e., getting and retaining volunteers, Galway Volunteer Centre will also attend the Networking Event. The event will also include a guided walk of the Burren Nature Sanctuary's Biodiversity Trails to showcase the local flora, fauna, sculptures, signage, and amenities developed in the area. It is hoped that the Networking Event will lead to opportunities for identification of further training, workshops, collaborations and networking, to enhance the invaluable work of Tidy Towns Groups across the County.

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION NETWORK (PPN)

ACTING AS AN INFORMATION HUB

Submissions were invited from all Departments for the March PPN Newsletter, which was circulated on 2nd March, and the PPN also circulated information to all 1,308 member groups on funding schemes such as the Town and Village Renewal Scheme (TVRS) 2024—Project Development Measure (PDM). PPN staff attended an online interagency meeting on 4th March, hosted by the HSE, on planning for 'Men's Health Week 2024', PPN will have an information sharing role, sharing the invitation for community groups to get involved and submit their events, and then sharing information about the event schedule for the week of 10th - 16th June.



BUILDING CAPACITY:

The PPN workers have organised two trainings for PPN member groups in March - both workshops are online, covering highly popular topics as per the training needs analysis survey undertaken by PPN Member groups.

PROMOTING REPRESENTATION:

The PPN welcomed two new members to its Secretariat, Maria Heneghan representing the Community and Voluntary Pillar and Maura Canning representing the Loughrea Municipal District. Both newly elected representatives will be given an induction session on 14th March. The Housing SPC meeting was held on 1st March and PPN workers will work with the PPN Reps on this SPC to gather their feedback from the meeting, report back to the wider PPN as appropriate, and PPN workers will be working on developing the capacity of the PPN Reps on the SPC, as well as the Housing Linkage Group.

RURAL FUNDING SCHEMES

TOWN AND VILLAGE RENEWAL SCHEME PROJECT DEVELOPMENT MEASURES

This Project Development Measure (PDM) is one measure under the Town and Village Renewal Programme as part of the Town Centre First Suite of Supports announced by the Department of Community and Rural Development in February 2024.

The purpose of this Measure is to assist Local Authorities and Approved Applicants to contribute to a pipeline of significant, well-developed projects which might be subsequently progressed to construction stage subject to the availability of further funding. Galway County Council can put forward a maximum of three applications to the Department of Community and Rural Development for consideration and approval. Funding may be awarded for costs such as detailed design, planning, procurement, professional fees, assessments and other development costs.

Expressions of Interest (EOI) are now sought from Business Representative Groups, Community and Voluntary Groups for this PDM.

For counties in the Northwest Transition Region, including Co. Galway, grant aid of 95% of the project development costs up to a maximum value of €50,000 will apply with a minimum match funding rate of 5%.

The Project Development Measure (PDM) will place particular emphasis on projects that bring economic and social vibrancy to town centres and help bring vacant and derelict



buildings and sites back into use as community or multipurpose spaces to encourage more people to return confidently to town and village centres to work, shop and socialise.

LAMA AWARDS 2024

Triple success for Galway County Council at Local Authority 'Oscars'

The recently opened BIA Innovator Campus in Athenry, the community-based 'Healthy Islands' initiative and a pilot scheme aimed at improving energy saving and management in County Galway's social housing stock have been named winners at the 2024 All-Ireland Community and Council Awards.

Galway County Council's triple success in what is regarded as the Oscars of the local government sector was revealed at a ceremony held at the Dublin Royal Convention Centre last night (Saturday, 17 February 2024).

Now in its 18th year, the award scheme hosted by LAMA (Local Authority Members Association) and IPB Insurance recognises and celebrates communities and the country's 31 local authorities working together.

Opened in January by Taoiseach Leo Varadkar, the BIA Innovator Campus in Athenry is the first Centre of Excellence for the Irish food industry in the country and aims to drive regional and national growth in Ireland's agri-food sector. The facility, which was developed with the support of Galway County Council, was named overall winner of the 'National Impact Award' after coming out on top in a shortlist that also included Dublin City Council (Connection Arts Centre), Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown County Council (Coastal Mobile Route) and Wicklow County Council (It Takes A Village & Tiglin and the Rise of the Cover).

Galway County Council also was named overall winner of the 'Best Energy Smart Initiative' for its 'Heat Pump Remote Access' project, having beaten off competition from Wicklow County Council (Bray Bolt E-Bike Scheme), Mayo County Council (Castlebar Energy Clinics) and Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown County Council (Carbon Neutral Street Lighting).

The pioneering approach to sustainable energy, which is currently is being piloted in a local authority estate, involves the installation of GSM modems on domestic heat pumps to enable technicians to remotely monitor for energy efficiency and any maintenance requirements ahead of any required callouts. Should the initial trial prove successful, Galway County Council says it will roll out the scheme across its full housing stock that contain heat pumps, including all new builds.

The 'Healthy Islands' project was named winner of the 'Best Community Health' category in recognition of its efforts to promote health and well-being, to improve communication and enhance knowledge of available services amongst residents of The Aran Islands (Inis Meáin, Inis Mór and Inis Oírr) and Inisbofin. The project featured free activities and resources for more than 200 participating residents to promote health and wellbeing across all the islands, including pulse and blood pressure checks, healthy cooking demonstrations workshops, a community fun-run, yoga, relationship and sexual health education, citizen information advice, and exercise and fitness tips.

Meanwhile, Galway County Council's Garraí Ghuaire social housing development in Kinvara was shortlisted in the 'Best Housing Regeneration & Urban Planning' category alongside entries from Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown, Fingal, South Dublin, Clare, Cork County and



Wexford. The development, comprising 10 detached and semi-detached homes, was completed in January 2023.

Corofin-based Heptagon Houses Ltd. also was shortlisted in the 'Best Micro Start-Up' category alongside The Smooth Company (South Dublin), Farmteam (Wicklow), Quickcropt (Sligo) and Nualach Automation (Cavan). The company, which has benefited from supports provided by Local Enterprise Office Galway, has been lauded for its innovative business approach that has seen the family-run enterprise thrive as Ireland's sole manufacturer and installer of Timber Framed Greenhouses.

The Arts Office is working with Cúirt literature festival on a writing project with underserved communities in Tuam. Writer and Traveller advocate Oein DeBhairduin will work with people from the Traveller community and people who engage with Galway County Council's Refugee Resettlement Programme.

Oein will lead participants in a creative writing series of workshops called Tera na Nug. Tera na Nug is local Cant dialect describing that creative spark of storytelling and imagination. Oein will encourage participants with an interest in the creation of stories in a safe, respectful and fun environment, using props and supporting materials the workshops will initiate stories from participants. The project is also supported by Western Traveller &



Intercultural Development Centre, Brú Bríde's artist in resident Martina Passman and Three Rings.

CREATIVE IRELAND

2024 CREATIVE IRELAND BURSARIES

The Creative Ireland Bursaries opened on the 22nd of January and ran until the 28th of February. Two online information sessions were held in February to explain the use of Submit.com and answer any questions. Similarly, to the Arts Office, the feedback on the usability and layout of Submit.com as a means of application was resoundingly positive.

This year saw a large volume of extremely high-quality applications with 52 applications from all over the country and a total ask of €369,728. A panel of experts met on Monday March 4th to assess and score the applications. The panel returned a list of 12 successful awardees with a total spend of €57,680. This covers a wide variety of workshops and projects across many different forms of creative expression, including coding, painting, sculpture, theatre, music, dance, circus skills, and more. The geographical spread covers all areas of the County, and the age and socio-economic spread ensures access to creativity for

people from all walks of life.



A project with 'The Living Bog' in Mountbellew is also being funded separately to the Bursaries. This has been assigned to Rosina Joyce, Biodiversity Officer, who will take this on as her first project as part of the Galway County Council Culture Team

Galway Sports Partnership were delighted to attend the Volunteer in Sports Awards 2023 in the Crowne Plaza Hotel, Blanchardstown on 29th February 2024.

The Federation of Irish Sport recognised the recipients of the 2023 Volunteers in Sports Awards, celebrating their dedication and giving freely of their time locally to play sports happen. Proudly supported by the National Network of 29 Local Sports Partnerships the committed volunteers from across the country were honoured at an awards ceremony with



special guest speaker Minister Thomas Byrne, Minster of State with responsibility for Sport and Physical Education presenting the 32 county awards.

The vital role of volunteers in advancing sports participation and community development cannot be underestimated or taken for granted. The economic significance of volunteering has an estimated value of €1.5 billion annually to the Irish economy. This figure underscores the immense social and economic benefits derived from the invaluable contributions of volunteers across the Irish sporting landscape.

The recipient of the award for County Galway is Tony Stephens, of Claregalway GAA Club. Over the course of three decades, Tony has made an enormous contribution to Claregalway GAA Club. Serving as the club's treasurer during a transformative period, helping to manage parking on busy match days, volunteering his time at numerous club fundraisers and occasions, and serving as a team manager during the 1990's and early 200's. In 2009 the club acquired is knockdoemore grounds and under Tony's stewardship, the club invested nearly 2.5 million in these facilities. The grounds now boast 4 grass pitches, a walkway, and a community centre. Under Tony's stewardship these grounds have been transformed into a hub, not just for the GAA Club but for the community as a whole.





FEBRUARY'S TOP THREE POSTS






FEBRUARY'S TOP THREE POSTS



Baby Rhyme Time in partnership with Music Generation Galway City continues to gather big numbers and these sessions run in the three city libraries as part of the Early Years Programme.






Ballybane also developed and coordinated an information morning for those recently retired and showcased all the available activities and community groups that work in the area. This was a popular event and was well attended.

VACANT HOMES GRANTS (CROÍ CÓNAITHE)

There continues to be a high level of interest in the Vacant Property Refurbishment Grants (Croí Cónaithe Scheme). The number of applications submitted to date is 346 (100 in progress i.e., additional information has been requested, etc.), 175 applications have been finalised (153 approved, 22 rejected), and 71 Applications have been withdrawn).

GEO-DIRECTORY VACANCY SURVEY

Under the *Housing for All* Strategy Pathway 4 for "*Addressing Vacancy and Efficient Use of Existing Stock*" Galway County Council, along with all other Local Authorities, has been requested, to complete a GeoDirectory Vacancy Data Survey. The Survey has been developed to assist local authorities in identifying properties which may be recoverable into use.



The initial part of the survey whereby the properties identified on the APP were visited, to determine whether the property was vacant, began in September 2023 and was completed in early February 2024. 43 settlements were identified by the Department (DHLGH) to be surveyed within the urban settings of Galway County and a perimeter of 1km from a central hub point. 7 large towns, 11 major settlements and 25 minor settlements were selected.

The Survey was carried out by Vacant Homes staff with the assistance of the Community Wardens. In total 1,708 properties were visited by the surveyors. The survey enabled the visual assessment of these properties and completing several fields of information on the app such as the condition of the property, length of time the property has been vacant and the reason for vacancy, if known.

Of the 1708 properties surveyed, 817 properties were deemed vacant/derelict of which 44 were considered derelict. (773 deemed vacant). The condition of the properties which were considered vacant/derelict were categorised as follows:

- Good (habitable, requires only minor work or no work at all)
- Fair (habitable, requires moderate work)
- Poor (habitable, requires substantial work)
- Uninhabitable

As the purpose of the survey is to bring vacant properties back into use, a leaflet was compiled to give the owner information on the Vacant Homes schemes available, including the Vacant Property Refurbishment Grants (Croí Cónaithe scheme), Repair and Leasing and Buy and Renew Scheme. This was distributed to the vacant property owners through the letterboxes or under the doors of the properties where possible. The intention is to follow up with all the owners of these properties to try to bring these properties back into use.

Following the distribution of the Leaflets, property owners (81) and neighbours (8) contacted the Vacant Homes Office directly to provide information in relation to the vacant properties. Please see breakdown below of the information collected:

Legal/family issues, for example probate: 11

• Financial Issues: 1

Interest in VPRG/B&R/RLS: 30

Occupied Part-time / Holiday Home: 6

• For sale: 14

Construction/renovations will commence: 7

Storage/Commercial Use: 6

Not vacant/permanent home: 6

Neighbours: 8

Therefore, there are 728 properties which will require follow up contact from the Vacant Homes Office with the property owners to try to bring them back into use as homes.

MEETING WITH THE VACANT HOMES UNIT

A meeting was held with the Vacant Homes Unit from the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage in County Buildings on Monday 04th March. A presentation was delivered on the findings of the Geo-directory Vacancy Data Survey. As a result of the



success of the presentation, a member of Galway County Council's Vacant Homes Team has been invited to present the findings at the Vacant Homes Network Meeting in The Radisson Blu Hotel in Athlone on Wednesday 20th of March.

Additional initiatives undertaken by Galway County Council to address Vacancy and Dereliction were also presented to the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage. These initiatives included information leaflets, posters, Information Evenings and engagement initiated by property owners as a result of the leaflet distribution.

LOCAL AUTHORITY HOME LOANS

The Local Authority Home Loan was launched in January 2022 as part of *Housing for All*. It supports creditworthy borrowers who are unable to get finance from commercial banks to buy a home. It can be used for new, second hand or self-build homes. It means those on more moderate incomes are helped by the State to achieve homeownership. This Loan scheme replaced the previous Home Loan scheme under *Rebuilding Ireland*. Under the LAHL scheme, the prices of homes eligible for a Local Authority Home Loan and income limits of those eligible to apply for a loan were increased.

At the end of 2023, there was 0.5 of one *Rebuilding Ireland* loan outstanding to be drawn down. This refers to a self build which will be completed in 2024.

Under the *Local Authority Home Loan* Scheme, 72 applications were received in 2023, 33 were approved in principle and 20 were refused. The remainder were in progress at the end of 2023. There were also 16 (live) loans in 2023 which had been approved in principle in 2022. During 2023 a number of Approvals in Principle Loans were either drawn down or expired. Therefore, at the end of 2023, 14.8 loans in the amount of €2,621,204 which had been approved in principle in 2023 remained "live". In addition, 0.65 of a loan which had been approved in principle in 2022 also remains "live". Note: fractions of a loan refer to self builds which are being drawn down in stages. 11 loans which were approved in principle in 2022 and 6 loans approved in principle in 2023 expired during 2023 without being drawn down.

CAPITAL BUILD PROGRAMME

DEPARTMENT OF HOUSING, LOCAL GOVERNMENT AND HERITAGE (DHLGH) - STAGE 1 APPROVALS.

For social housing construction projects, the DHLGH has a streamlined process focusing on 4 mandatory steps comprising: Stage 1 Capital Appraisal, Stage 2 Pre-Statutory Approval, Stage 3 Pre-Tender Approval and Stage 4 Tender Approval.

The purpose of the Stage 1 submission is to make the business case for a proposal, to obtain Departmental approval-in principle, including a funding commitment for the next Pre-



Planning Approval work. Stage 1 comprises two parts: firstly, identifying the need, evaluating alternatives, and making a recommendation. The second part is the project brief which gives details of the proposal, its costs and justifies the value for money of the proposal.

The Capital team in housing successfully received a number of Stage 1 approvals further to proposals submitted seeking capital funding under the Housing Investment Programme.

These new projects to deliver housing includes proposals for:

- 63 No. new homes at Farrannamartin in Tuam comprising 34 no. two storey units, 5 no. single storey units, 12 no. duplexes and 12 no. apartments at Farranamartin, on the Galway Road, Tuam.
- 30 new homes in Phase 2 of Gort Mhaoilir, Athenry comprising 8 no. 2 bed bungalows, 18 no. 2 bed two storey units and 9 no. 3 bed two storey units.
- 11 new homes at Cullairbaun, Athenry comprising one and two bed bungalows and a residential community facility (exact details tbc).
- 11 No. 2-bed universal design bungalows at St. Bridget's Road, Portumna.
- 24 new homes at St. Joseph's Rd., Portumna. Exact design and layout to be developed by an external design team. It is envisaged that the development will have a mix of unit types and sizes to meet the social housing demand in the area.
- 50 new homes at Cosmona, Loughrea. Exact design and layout to be developed by an external design team. Again, it is envisaged that the development will have a mix of unit types and sizes to meet the social housing demand in the area.

CONTRACT SIGNING FOR APPOINTMENT OF CONSULTANTS

On Monday 11th March 2024, Galway County Council signed contracts with an Architect Led Integrated Design Team to deliver more than 65 new homes on local authority-owned sites in Loughrea and Tuam.

The two new housing developments will be delivered on a brownfield at High Street in Tuam and on a 3.3-hectare greenfield site at Cosmona, Loughrea.

Vincent Hannon Architects (VHA) were appointed as the lead Architects for the integrated design team. The team's work commences immediately and includes the delivery of preliminary designs, preparation of planning consent, detailed designs, and the preparation and evaluation of tenders for construction, including certification of works and compliance with building control regulations.



It is intended to lodge planning applications for the housing projects this summer and advertising construction tenders before the end of 2024.

CONTRACT SIGNING FOR THE APPOINTMENT OF CONTRACTORS

On Monday 11th March 2024, Galway County Council signed contracts for the construction of two new housing developments in Ardrahan and Ballinasloe.

A multi-disciplinary Design Team, led by OBFA Architects, were appointed to assist with delivering the housing projects and assessed the tenders for construction on behalf of Galway County Council.

The 10-unit housing development at Caisléan Raithin, Ardrahan is being constructed by Jada Construction and consists of 3 single storey two-bed dwellings, 1 two-storey three-bed dwelling and 6 two-storey two-bed dwellings.

Pat Loftus Construction Ltd. will construct an 8-unit housing development comprising 2 single storey two-bed houses and 6 two-storey two-bed houses at St. Joseph's Place in Ballinasloe.

The 18 houses are funded under the Government's 'Housing for All' Plan to 2030' and will be constructed at a cost of €4.8 million. Construction work will begin this month.

PART 8 EXEMPTIONS (SECTION 179A) PUBLISHED

Two housing developments were published under S.I. No. 101/2023 – Planning and Development (Section 179A) Regulations which allows for accelerated delivery of social, affordable, and cost-rental housing by means of an exemption from the 'Part 8' process for Galway County Council own development housing on owned land.

The housing developments consist of a 3-unit infill development at Hillcrest Loughrea and a 4-unit infill development at Parkmore, Tuam.

The Loughrea and Tuam elected members were briefed on the developments at MD meetings on the 12th February and 26th February respectively.

The advertisements were published in the Connacht Tribune newspaper on 8th March and development will not take place until 8 weeks after this date. The details will be available for viewing at Galway County Council planning office, the relevant MD office and online at www.consult.ie during this period.

LAND ACQUISITION FUND APPLICATION.

An application form and business case was submitted to the Housing Agency for a Land Acquisition Fund to purchase development lands consisting of 1.58 Ha (0.86 acres) in Portumna.

These lands were deemed suitable for housing development further to a technical appraisal undertaken by the Capital Team in Housing.

The Housing Agency confirmed that the Housing for All Land Acquisition Fund Project Steering Group met on the 19th February 2024 and approved this site for acquisition using the fund, subject to a number of conditions.

Once finally approved, the Housing Agency will directly progress the purchase of these lands on behalf of Galway County Council.

HDCO MEETING AND MAPPING OF AVAILABLE LANDS

The capital section of housing met with Ruth Hurley from the Housing Delivery Coordination Office (HDCO) on 8th February 2024. Items discussed included update on access to HDCO guidance and support on design & build, issues with developments lands owned by Galway County Council, state land enquiry options available under Circular 46/2022 and the land acquisition fund.

Further to a request at this meeting, the capital section undertook a land mapping review, to identify suitability and availability of land for housing development.

CRIME PREVENTION WORKSHOP

Further to a commitment given at a recent Joint Policing Committee Meeting, the housing capital team engaged with Garda Crime Prevention Officer for Galway (Michael Walsh) and



requested him to give a crime prevention workshop and feedback on crime prevention for new housing schemes.

On February 7th, a presentation was given by Michael Walsh to the housing team in the Council Chamber. Information was provided on promotion of crime prevention generally and feedback/advice was given on current LA Build schemes in a workshop after.

TOBAR MHUIRE, AHASCRAGH



Major rejuvenation works have been completed to an existing social housing development formerly known as Bridge Court, Ahascragh. The works included the demolition of 10no. existing units and construction of 11no. new two-bedroom dwellings on the same site; and 1no. one-bedroom dwelling. The proposed works also include the renovation of 6

no. existing dwellings and the construction of a single-story extension to the rear of one existing dwelling. Proposals further include car parking, hard & soft landscaping, site clearance works, roads, footways, amenity facilities, public lighting, signage, connections to existing services and all ancillary site development works.

LAKEVIEW, GLENAMADDY:

The advance purchase of a development at Lakeview, Glenamaddy was completed in this month. The development consists of 22 new social homes.



As you can see from the aerial photo this development is a continuation of an existing estate of 22 units (6 detached and 14 semi-detached unit) and completes the estate.

The project team are currently working on the framework documents which will be published on eTenders within the month. The project team are continuing to engage with landowners and over the past month have contacted the majority of them with an update.

The advanced works Archaeological Investigations contract is ongoing with Stage 1 testing and building surveys.

R336 FEASIBILITY REPORT - BEARNA-SCRIB VIA ROS A MHÍL

In drafting and adopting the County Development Plan 2022 to 2028, the Council inserted a policy objective in relation to Priority Roads Projects, namely PRP 3 for the R336 Bearna-Scrib via Ros a Mhíl. This policy objective of Galway County Council is "to support the preparation of a feasibility study in relation to the R336 within the lifetime of the plan".

The Executive, on many occasions, has stated its commitment to have this report prepared within the lifetime of the Plan. To that end, the Feasibility Study for the R336 Bearna-Scrib via Ros a Mhíl will commence in 2024.

HEALTH AND SAFETY UPDATE

ISO 45001 HEALTH AND SAFETY AUDIT

The NSAI ISO 45001 Health and Safety surveillance audit was completed on Friday February 09th 2024.

The following locations were audited on the day- Roads & Transportation (Athenry/Oranmore MD), Library (Athenry), Fire Service (Current fire station in Athenry and the new build fire station in Athenry).

CAPITAL PROGRAMME

ATHENRY WASTEWATER NETWORK

Coffey Construction commenced works in January 2023 and the contract is expected to be completed in Q4 2024. The majority of pipelaying is complete, but some network construction and reinstatement is to be completed in the centre of town in March. Reinstatement work in private lands and estates is ongoing. The new pumping station's mechanical and electrical fit-out is complete and awaiting connection to ESB. Commissioning of the pumping station is expected to be completed in Q2 of this year.

The works consist of:

- Approx. 3.9km of gravity sewer, which includes 3 no. railway crossings and 4 no. river crossings.
- Decommissioning of the existing Caheroyn PS.



- New pumping station at Pairc na hAbhainn.
- Approx. 460m of rising main.
- Project will facilitate decommissioning of 9 no. DPIs.

FIRE & EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

OPERATIONS

The information below is based on February data from West Regional Control Centre (WRCC). Galway Fire and Rescue Service (GFRS) had 146 turnouts to 114 Incidents. That is a decrease of 7 incidents on 121 the previous month. 42 were fire incidents, 70 were special service incidents (road traffic collision (RTC), Automatic Fire Alarms (AFA's), flooding, storm damage, etc.) and 2 were standby in station. Of those incidents, 45.28% were attended by Fire Service resources within 10 minutes of alert, 36.79% were attended between 10 and 20 minutes and 17.92% were attended in over 20 minutes. The average turnout time for the Full-time station in Galway City was 2.05 minutes and for county retained stations was 5.86 minutes.

CAPITAL PROJECTS

ATHENRY FIRE STATION

Construction of the New Fire Station in Athenry continues with the project substantially complete and the building is now fully enclosed. Installation of services and remaining siteworks are underway. It is anticipated that the station will be completed by the end of April 2024.

Part 8 Planning application is scheduled to be mentioned at the Loughrea Municipal District meeting in July 2024, subject to Senior Management approval.

BRIGADE MECHANICS WORKSHOP ATHENRY

Tender for Design Team is due to be issued prior to month end March 2024.

HEADQUARTERS AND GALWAY CITY FIRE STATION

Preferred site identified and awaiting Chief Executive approval. Capital appraisal 99% complete and will be submitted to the National Directorate for Fire and Emergency Management once Chief Executive approval is available.

PREVENTION

The information in the following is based on the February figures. The Fire Authority received 23 Fire Safety Certificate applications and issued decisions on 7 applications. 8 Disability Access Certificate applications were received, and decisions made on 5 applications. A total of 2 new licenses were issued and 29 inspections were conducted.

GRANT AID FROM THE NDFEM

Capital approval has been received from the National Directorate for Fire and Emergency Management to procure hydraulic rescue equipment and a Hazmat unit, this will go to tender presently, combined value €900,000. In addition, approval has been received to procure two Class B appliances, value €1,300,000, the ordering process is underway. Finally,



the tendering process for a new high reach aerial appliance will begin presently, value €1,600,000.

TRAINING

Four new firefighter recruits successfully completed their initial training Firefighting Skills course which commenced on 12th February and lasted three weeks. These newly trained firefighters will be stationed at Athenry, Mountbellew (2firefighters) and Clifden fire stations. There are another three recruit firefighters currently being trained and are due to complete their initial training on 16th March. These firefighters will be stationed at Carraroe, Tuam and Ballinasloe fire stations. It is planned to train a further four new recruit firefighters on a training course which will be commencing on the 8th April next.

Two firefighters successfully completed driving training for Class C vehicles.

Swift water rescue initial recertification training was conducted from 19th to 22nd February. The participants were predominantly from the full-time fire service. The training was conducted at various training locations in Galway City and Tuam.

One training place was allocated to Galway Fire Service on the National Directorate for Fire & Emergency Management's "Fire Services Management 1" training course which took place in February. The aim of this training course is to assist fire authorities in developing and updating their ability to deliver efficient and effective fire and rescue services. This module develops the skills, knowledge, and attributes necessary to effectively lead and manage people and teams in the fire service.

Effective Decision-Making training took place at the Hydra Suite training Centre in Clonmel fire station. The aim of this course is to enhance the ability of fire authorities to deliver efficient and effective fire and rescue services, by providing fire service officers with the opportunity to explore critical decision making relating to their role. There was one allocation to GFRS on this course.

MAJOR EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

Several members of the West Region Major Emergency Management Working Group (WRMEMWG) met on the 7th of March to discuss a Voluntary Emergency Services (VES) Open Day which is planned for mid-May. This Voluntary Emergency Services Open Day will involve up to 20 voluntary services and will take place on a Saturday over a morning and afternoon.

Information Manager training took place on the 28th and 29th of February with 36 new Information Managers trained over the two days. Three personnel from Galway County Council took part and successfully completed this course.

FORWARD PLANNING

REACHING OUT TO THE EDUCATION SECTOR

A collaboration with students and lecturers from the University of Galway's MA in Planning and Development and second level students and Geography Teachers from the Presentation College in Athenry participated in a Retail Planning exercise with the Planners from the Forward Planning Section of Galway County Council over two days Wednesday the 21st of February and Thursday the 22nd of February 2024.

The aim of this project was to link spatial planning as a statutory exercise conducted by local authorities to youth participants and engage them in shaping their places. The main vehicle



for contributing to spatial planning is through local authority plan-making, county plans, and local area plans. In this instance the focus was on retail planning.

Survey work and a participation workshop was undertaken in Athenry town on the Wednesday and students participated in a further workshop in the University on Thursday morning and presented their findings in the Council Chamber of Galway County Council on Thursday afternoon.

GORT



The Gort Town Centre First Plan was formally launched at the National launch in Adare Co. Limerick on the 29th of February. Minister Heather Humphreys, Minister of State Kieran O'Donnell met members of the Gort Town team including Chairperson Annie Rozario, Town Champion Bernice Forde Carolan, supported by TRO Hazel Fox and Liam Hanrahan

Director of Economic Development and Planning.

The Regeneration team secured funding under the Heritage Stewardship Fund to undertake project development with the Gort Town Hall Management Committee to appoint Conservation Consultants to help draw up their future plans for the repairs and maintenance of the Town Hall Building. This project is identified under the theme revitalising culture and the arts within the Gort Town Centre First Plan.

The public realm project for Gort is in its final stages of detailed design in preparation for the submission of a planning application, environmental surveys to support the Part 10 planning application are currently being undertaken. Negotiations with the Diocese are continuing regarding the future of Cannon Quinn Park.

TUAM

The Regeneration Team submitted 2 applications under the recent RRDF call for Category 1 (shovel ready) projects, these included Tuam Town Hall and the Tuam Shambles project. It is expected the department will announce the funding awards towards the end of Q2 2024.

The Regeneration Team are preparing a strand 1 THRIVE application for the Tuam building on the projects identified within the Tuam Regeneration Masterplan, to create a pipeline of investment ready proposals. The Thrive programme offers 100% funding for the conservation and adaptive reuse of the built heritage.



BALLINSLOE

The Regeneration Team are preparing a strand 1 THRIVE application for the Ballinasloe, to deliver an integrated urban strategy for the Town Centre, using the Town Centre First Framework. The Thrive programme offers 100% funding for the delivery of a Town Centre First Masterplan.

THE HERITAGE COUNCIL COMMUNITY HERITAGE GRANT SCHEME NOW OPEN



The Heritage Council is now accepting applications from community groups and not for profit non-governmental organisations in Galway for its Community Heritage Grant Scheme 2024. All relevant information is available from the Heritage Council's website here.

A broad range of project types are eligible for funding under the scheme including:

- Conservation works to collections, objects, or places, including natural heritage projects e.g., control of invasive species or habitat restoration works; conservation works to buildings, including churches; stabilisation works to ruined structures.
- Surveys, reports, plans, and audits to inform the future management of buildings and monuments, habitats, collections, or objects.
- Accessibility projects that make heritage activities more accessible for people with disabilities e.g. building ramps, automatic doors, handrails, tactile interpretation
- Projects that help people engage more with their heritage e.g., interactive maps, videos, virtual exhibitions, podcasts, websites.
- Purchase of specialised equipment e.g archival boxing for vulnerable documents, monitoring equipment for humidity or light, interpretation/multimedia equipment, specialised software
- Projects that address the heritage of minority groups e.g an oral history project documenting
 Traveller heritage
- Training in traditional skills and crafts e.g., workshops on skills such as roofing, thatch, dry stone walling etc.



Citizen science projects on environmental conservation

Last year, 15 Galway-based projects were funded through the scheme, including the Kinvara Hockey Club who used the funding to design an accessible heritage and biodiversity trail within a new pitch development project, and Bullaun Cemetery Committee who used the funding to train community volunteers on how to map its graveyard For an overview of all projects funded under the scheme in previous years, see list of 2023 recipients here and 2022 recipients here.

The minimum grant that can be requested through the scheme is €500. The maximum is €25,000.

The Heritage Officer of Galway County Council and Galway Community Archaeologist is providing advice, guidance and letters of support to several groups in the county.

The closing date for applications is Monday, 25th of March 2024 at 5pm. Applications must be made via the Heritage Council's online grants management system. Funded projects must be completed by 15th of November 2024. Full details are available here

The Forum has commenced the review of the previous plan as they embark on the creation of the new plan for the county.



The Biodiversity Office, in partnership with the GIS section, ran a workshop on the National Tree Map to mark National Tree Week 2024. The hybrid workshop was attended by 33 staff members from across the organisation. The discussions and presentations explored the potential uses of the dataset, which was acquired by Galway County Council through the Heritage Stewardship Fund from the Heritage Council in 2023.

total, there are over 9 million trees mapped in Co. Galway, providing ecosystem services and benefits to biodiversity throughout the county. The maps are created from high resolution national aerial photography, accurate terrain, and surface data, and colour infrared imagery, using innovative processing techniques.



Barry Doyle and the Galway County
Council GIS Team have developed a Tree Map
Dashboard to view the data which is accessible to all staff and the data is also available to view on the Corporate Map
Viewer. This is an excellent resource

which can guide the actions of staff in manage and protect these living assets.



HEDGEROW PLANTING EVENT



The Biodiversity Office coordinated a collaborative tree planting event on the 7th March, in the Palace Grounds, Tuam. Nine hundred local provenance, native trees were planted, creating a new 180m hedgerow. Galway County Council Area Office staff and members of the Community Employment Scheme were joined by students from Archbishop McHale College, Highcross College

and St. Jarlath's College, as well as members of Tuam Women's Shed, Tuam Tidy Towns and

Ability West. Galway County Council Climate Action Team were also there to assist with the planting.

Cathaoirleach Liam Carroll welcomed everyone to the event, and after planting some trees, launched the new Tree Management Guidelines for Communities, which was developed as part of Galway County Council's Heritage Stewardship Project



funded by the Heritage Council in 2023. This resource will provide information and guidance on how to plan tree planting projects and also presents the information in an engaging and accessible format.

A FUNDING scheme to support landowners and community groups across Galway in undertaking nature-positive measures on their lands will open to applications from this Friday.

The Hare's Corner, an innovative biodiversity initiative, coordinated by the Burren-based landscape charity Burren-boo Trust in conjunction with the Biodiversity Office of Galway Trust in conjunction with the Biodiversity Office of Calway County Council, is being rolled out following the successful ploting of the non-profit initiative in Clare and Mayo which resulted in the creation of 125 ponds, 200 orchards, 175 native mini-woodlands and 97 plans for nature.





VETERINARY DEPARTMENT

Galway County Council Dog Warden Service continues to be under severe pressure at present with high numbers of stray and unwanted dogs entering our dog shelter allied to a significant number of complaints received regarding the control of dogs in the county.

682 dog licences were purchased during the month of February. Of this figure, 454 were purchased in the Post Office (66%) with the remaining 228 licences purchased online. 15 of the 682 licences purchased during February were lifetime licences.

12 stray/abandoned dogs were picked up by the Dog Warden Service in May.

Six fines were issued to dog owners for offences under the Control of Dogs Act 1986 As Amended.

Three sheep worrying incidents were investigated by the Dog Warden Service in February. Thes areas in which the sheep worrying was reported were in Tonegurraun, Corrandulla, Ashfield Demesne Gort and Muckanagh North, Ballygar. The Dog Warden Service has followed up with responsible dog ownership campaigns in these areas following the complaints received as well as liaising with the relevant agencies such as An Garda Siochána and the Irish Farmers Association in respect of same. Galway County Council social media platforms were also utilised in informing farmers in these areas to be vigilant of dog attacks



and to remind members of the public to ensure that their dogs are always kept under effective control.

FOOD SAFETY

Notification was received from the FSAI for an extension of Galway County Council's service contract for providing official controls on food safety in the City and County. The latest extension will run to 22nd March 2024. Discussions on the implementation of the transfer of veterinary personnel to the Department of Agriculture, Food and the Marine (DAFM) remain ongoing with a proposed date of 31st October 2024 for the transfer of the service.

WATER QUALITY AND ENFORCEMENT

RMCEI RETURNS AND PLAN FOR 2024

In February, staff completed and submitted to the EPA the Recommended Minimum Criteria for Environmental Inspections (RMCEI) returns for 2023 and the Plan for 2024. All activities in 2023 must be reported on in the Progress Report. For the water area, the following are the headings to be reported on:

- Pressures from Agriculture (slurry/soiled water collection and storage)
- Pressures from Agriculture (slurry and fertiliser spreading)
- Domestic Wastewater Treatment Systems (DWWTS) / Septic Tanks
- Discharge Licences / Misconnections
- Local Priorities and Water Quality Issues


- The Western Regional Operational Committee meeting took place online on the 8th of February. Topics covered included:

QUAGGA MUSSEL

 A meeting was held with LAWPRO in relation to poor water quality results in the Kilcrow river in east Galway. This area will be prioritised for investigation work this year. Also discussed were potential areas for septic tank inspections. One area for priority will be catchment 29 which is an area that stretches from Oranmore and Athenry to Gort in the south.

COMPLAINTS

Water complaints being investigated in February included forestry activity adjacent to Tynagh Mines and pollution of a stream near New Inn. One farm was inspected on foot of a pollution complaint.



BATHING WATERS

A meeting took place with the EPA in relation to this year's bathing water season. The sampling programme has been finalised with 28 bathing areas in total being monitored. The 2023 bathing water results for both beaches in Spiddal were excellent and it is hoped that this will continue in 2024 now that the new public wastewater treatment plant is fully commissioned.

WASTE/AIR MANAGEMENT AND ENFORCEMENT

RMCEI RETURNS AND PLAN FOR 2024

In February, staff completed and submitted to the EPA the Recommended Minimum Criteria for Environmental Inspections (RMCEI) returns for 2023 and the Plan for 2024. All activities in 2023 must be reported on in the Progress Report. For the waste area, the following are the headings to be reported on:

- Tackling significant illegal waste activity
- Construction and Demolition Activity
- End-of Life Vehicles (ELV) Directive & the Waste Metal Industry
- Waste Collection Household & Commercial
- Producer Responsibility Initiatives (PRIs) and additional local priorities

FIXED PAYMENT NOTICES (FPN'S)

Following surveillance on authorised waste collectors moving C&D material, 15 FPN's were issued to one collector for various non-compliances with their waste collection permit.

COURT FILES

One file for court proceedings was submitted to the law agent for Section 32, 39, 55 and 58 of the Waste Management Act 1996 as amended. The site concerns a business storing and breaking cars without a waste facility permit in place.

CCTV

Inspectors from the Data Commissioners Office visited 2 CCTV sites (bottle bank sites) to check compliance with their directions following the CCTV Audit. They found that Galway County Council was in full compliance with their directions.

We are now exploring the options for using CCTV going forward. There are a numbr of problem sites we intend to focus on at first.

LITTER FINES

The Community Warden Service continues to implement the Litter Pollution Act across the County. 16 litter fines were issued for offences under the Act in February. 5 of these fines



have been paid to date with the remainder issued continuing to be processed through the system.

One file was sent to the Law Agents to initiate prosecution for non-payment of a litter fine during February.

COURT ATTENDANCE



Two cases were presented at the District Court Ballinasloe in respect of offences under the Litter Pollution Act. In a case heard on the 1st of February in Ballinasloe, see below, Judge Faughnan convicted and fined the Defendant the amount of €500 plus €120 costs with the

Defendant given six months to pay.

The second case was heard on 22nd of February, and the Defendant's solicitor indicated that his client was going to plead guilty and was also going to pay our legal costs. It was agreed that the clean-up and legal costs would total €450. The Judge then adjourned the matter to the 2nd of May 2024 at Ballinasloe District Court to facilitate our costs.

MD MEETING

Cathaoirleach Declan Geraghty hosted the March 2024 Ballinasloe MD meeting in his home parish of Williamstown.

An introduction and welcome was provided by Leo Finnegan of Temple Togher Mill Project, John Neary, Tourism Officer brought the members up to speed on Just Transition Tourism projects and Gerry Costello gave an input on the role of Community Alert.





Ballinasloe MD staff have finalised preparation of the 2024 Annual Schedule of proposed works, to be considered and adopted by Councillors. This includes proposed restoration improvement, restoration maintenance, climate adaptation, low cost safety, bridge repair and maintenance projects for delivery under Department of Transport grant funding. Throughout February, drainage road maintenance works were ongoing, while seasonal hedge cutting/trimming maintenance works came to an end on the 1st of March in accordance with Section 40 of the Wildlife Act, 1976.



CONAMARA MUNICIPAL DISTRICT UPDATE

In February 2024 the Conamara Municipal District continued its main focus on road maintenance works. Priorities included road drainage works such as opening water tables, cleaning gullies and upsizing culverts where there were capacity issues. Other maintenance works include hedgetrimming, gritting roads during prolonged winter weather, sign maintenance.



On Tuesday 5th March 2024 the roads programme was passed by councillors at a Meeting of Municipal District of Conamara. The Conamara MD has now tendered for roads programme works with a closing date of later this month.

Over the last few years some trees had been removed from the park for safety reasons and to remove nonnative species. The new trees are all native species, and they will mature beautifully over the coming years and decades.

SENSORY GARDEN IN TUAM

The proposed Sensory Garden has been given a final design to stimulate the five senses. The garden will be a refuge for everyone to enjoy, particularly for those with impaired senses. The continuous development of the garden has been co-ordinated by Tuam Women's Shed (lead group for project), Tuam Tidy Towns, Tuam Men's shed, local schools and other



members of the public to get to this stage. Tuam MD Staff will commence digging out the pathway through the garden in the next 2 to 3 weeks. Completion of the pathway is the priority as this will be the spine of the project, everything else can then be planned off that, in different stages, depending on funding and staff resources. The spoil from excavation of the pathway will be used to make the 'Hillocks in Lawn' (small mounds used for kids to run up and down on or roll down in summertime). Much of the works will be carried out by he Tuam Town crew and gardener has agreed to take on much of the planting, we also have had a commitment from the Women's Shed to help with planting and from the Mens Shed regarding helping with timbers frames, trellises, and other small timber items required in the garden. There are however some areas that will need to be installed by specialists, including the paved area in the centre and the water features.

The garden will have many key features: -



Planters are dedicated to each of our senses; sight, hearing, touch, taste and smell. For example, herb plants of lavender, oregano, chives and lots more to stimulate our sense of smell.

The Meandering Path consists of tactile materials of various textures, which people can walk on, feeling the various surfaces, thus stimulating the sense of touch.

The garden will also feature a play area, quiet space, learn and grow vegetable plots, and a mediation area.
