LOCAL COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE (LCDC)

It was with great sadness that the Members of Galway County LCDC heard of the passing of

Terry Keenan RIP. Terry was a member of Galway County Local Community Development Committee since its establishment in September 2014, and was a major contributor to all the Committee's workings, discussions, and programmes. Cllr. Noel Thomas, Chairperson of the LCDC, stated: 'Terry was a man of great knowledge and will be greatly missed. He is also a great loss to Forum Connemara where he served as Chairman for many years and is a huge loss to the whole community of Connemara, and of course, his own family'. Kieran Coyne, Chief Officer of the LCDC, added that 'it is with deep sadness that we heard this news. Terry was a stalwart and strong advocate for rural and community issues since I first got to know him through the Community Forum – the precursor to



the PPN. On behalf of all LCDC Members, we extend our condolences to Terry's family, friends, and all in Forum Connemara'. May Terry Rest in Peace.

SICAP (SOCIAL INCLUSION & COMMUNITY ACTIVATION PROGRAMME)

A Contract Addendum has been signed for the continuation of SICAP 2018-2023 for a further 2 months up to 31st May 2024, to ensure continuity of SICAP service delivery while arrangements are being put in place for the signing of contracts for the new SICAP Programme for 2024-2028.

LOCAL ENHANCMENT PROGRAMME

Galway County LCDC has submitted funding recommendations to the Department of Rural and Community Development in respect of the allocation of €142,400 under the General Fund, and a ringfenced allocation of €30,896.17 under the Women's Groups Fund. It is intended that Ministers Humphreys and O'Brien will announce details of successful applicants in April 2024, and the LCDC is not permitted to notify approved groups until the Departmental press release is issued.

COMMUNITY RECOGNITION FUND

Galway County Council has received an allocation of €1,303,230 from the Department of Rural and Community Development under the Community Recognition Fund 2024. This is part of a further €50m in funding nationally, to support communities that have welcomed people from Ukraine and other countries, and under which 33 projects were supported in County Galway under the first iteration of this Fund. While the Fund will again be targeted at areas with the highest level of new arrivals, and projects which display the highest need, there are a number of key differences to the 2023 scheme:

- Local Authorities will now submit funding proposals to the Department of Rural and Community Development in 3 different phases, which will allow them to respond to changing needs and circumstances during the year.
- The minimum level of funding for an individual project is €50,000 while the 2023 scheme provided funding for small-scale equipment, etc., the focus of the 2024 Fund is on projects of greater scale and impact.

The Department have indicated that it is essential that the funding proposals submitted by the local authority are developed based on direct engagement with impacted communities, and in consultation with Elected Representatives, the LCDC, the local Ukraine Community Response Forum, and the Local Development Companies. The local authority proposals must clearly demonstrate that the funding is targeted:

- Where the highest level of new arrivals is located (number / proportion of population).
- Where there is a clear need for investment identified through a community engagement process.

Galway County Council are currently confirming the number of new arrivals in communities across the County, to identify the areas where the Fund will be targeted in the first phase of funding. Once this is completed, direct engagement will be initiated with the relevant communities to identify areas where there is a clear need for investment.

AGE FRIENDLY ISLANDS PROJECT

A range of targeted consultations, and site visits for community consultations, will take place during April to identify equipment and infrastructural projects which will increase the range of social & leisure activities on the 4 offshore islands.

SOCIAL INCLUSION

AGE FRIENDLY PROGRAMME

Following on from the Age Friendly Alliance Meeting in March, it is intended to hold a meeting of the Galway County Older People's Council in April, to follow up on issues raised by the members at their previous meeting. The Age Friendly Programme Manager will also attend a Regional and National Meeting of Age Friendly Programmes.

Staff of Galway County Council will travel to Inis Oirr on 25th April as part of an audit of social & leisure activity opportunities which is being funded under Age Friendly Ireland.

COMHAIRLE NA NÓG

A meeting of the Comhairle na nÓg Steering Group will be held in April to discuss progress on the 2024 topic 'Mental Health & Addition'. Staff from the Community Department will also attend the online launch of the national strategy 'Participation of Children and Young



People in Decision-Making 2024-2028' – this is the second national plan which sets out the government's commitment to realise the right of children and young people to be heard when decisions that affect their lives are being made.

COMMUNITY AWARDS

The Cathaoirleach's Awards 2024 are open for nominations until 16th April, and groups or individuals who are active across the Award Categories are invited to complete and submit a Nomination Form, to be recognized for their valuable community & voluntary work.

AFRICA DAY 2024

The Department of Foreign Affairs has awarded funding of €7,400, and for the first time, Africa Day celebrations will be held in Tuam, Co. Galway, from 23rd to 26th May. The Community Department is finalizing the programme of events with the joint partners to the application and will circulate details of the activities once finalised.

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION NETWORK (PPN)

Duana Tuite, who is currently in the role of PPN Support Worker, is taking over the role of PPN Resource Worker on an acting basis for the remainder of 2024. PPN activities for April are set out across the 3 main functions of the PPN as follows:

ACTING AS AN INFORMATION HUB:

The PPN April Newsletter was shared on 2nd April. The newsletter is emailed to all PPN member groups, shared on Facebook, posted to the PPN Website, shared with all staff on the Council internal message board, and emailed to all Elected Members. The newsletter is a key information linkage between the local authority and communities, and contains a Council News section, with contributions from multiple departments including the Libraries, Community Section, Arts, Sports Partnership, Healthy Ireland, and the Environment section. The PPN also sent emails to the PPN members database and shared information online, on behalf of colleagues from several departments on a range of topics, such as funding schemes, training schemes, and the Cathaoirleach's Awards 2024.

BUILDING CAPACITY

The PPN Workers attended several events and progressed activities in relation to building capacity of PPN Member Groups:

- Attended National PPN Workers Network Retreat 2024 on 25th and 26th April.



- Panned with the Secretariat the roll out of two free PPN Members Trainings on Governance and GDPR & Board Roles.
- Attended a planning meeting on 2nd April in Ballinasloe for the Ballinasloe Intercultural Day, which will be on Saturday 25th May 2024.
- Attended a Galway online Planning Meeting for Men's Health Week on 8th April.
- Attended five events across the five Municipal Districts on 4th, 5th and 6th April, to launch the Energy Master Plan for County Galway. Guest speakers from Galway County Council's Climate Change Team and Housing Section, with presentations and core involvement from SEAI and XD Consulting who presented on the Energy Master Plan and free Energy Audits



which were provided to 11 Community Buildings through the PPN's project. A report and resource document were provided in print and digital format.

PROMOTING REPRESENTATION:

A PPN Secretariat Meeting is due to take place online on 9th April, which will be the first Secretariat Meeting for two new members. The PPN Support Worker held a planning meeting to go over the workplan for the Galway Disability Forum, in advance of the forum meeting on 23rd April. The PPN Workers are liaising with the Secretariat to plan the PPN Reps' Forum, and PPN Online Plenary Meeting. Following Strategic Policy Committee meetings in April, the PPN workers will work with the PPN Reps on the relevant SPC's to gather their feedback from the meeting, and report back to the wider PPN as appropriate.

TOURISM

COMMUNITY SUPPORT SCHEME - ECONOMIC FESTIVAL & EVENTS

Galway County Council continues to support Economic Initiatives and Festivals & Events with 73 communities granted support through the scheme for 2024.

Galway County Council funding = €69,250 with Fáilte Ireland supplying an additional €18,000.

Total funding allocated for 2024 Regional, Economic and Festival & events stands at €87,250.

MEITHEAIL 2024



Fáilte Ireland is hosting Meitheal 2024, the most important travel trade event for the Irish tourism industry, for the third consecutive year, in Killarney, Co. Kerry. Running since 1975, Meitheal is Fáilte Ireland's flagship trade event, which is organised in conjunction with Tourism Ireland to enable Irish tourism businesses to sell the best of Ireland to top international tourism buyers.

JTF SCHEME F - TOURISM LEARNING NETWORK PROGRAMME

Galway Council applied under scheme F of the JTF for Failte Irelands Tourism Learning Network Programme. The application was successful.

The EU Just Transition Tourism Learning Network Programme is a collaborative learning programme for the successful development of regenerative tourism in the EU Just Transition Territory.

This is a fully sponsored programme, led by best-in-class tourism industry specialists, provides professional learning and development to guide to achieve tourism growth in a commercial, equitable, socially responsible and environmentally sustainable way.

A member of the Tourism Team will attend the Tourism Learning Network Programme on behalf of Galway County Council.



IRELAND WEST AIRPORT - MARKETING MEETING



Galway County Council as a shareholder is delighted to welcome the news of a record year for passenger traffic at the airport. The continued growth in passenger numbers is great news from a tourism,

business, and regional development perspective.

The tourism Officer will be attending and participating a meeting to showcase the access now available to the West of Ireland from Cologne and Milan

A key feature of the activity is to promote access to all counties that form part of the Local Authority and Airport partnership. Between the months of March and October 2023 campaigns to the value of €200,000 ran across Radio, Digital and Social Media platforms promoting access from Milan and Cologne with Ryanair to German and Italian travellers.

The airport and trade from the West of Ireland were represented at events held in Frankfurt and Milan by Tourism Ireland. The events brought together over 50 German and Italian media representatives and Tour operators.

In 2023, the airport worked with RedC to carry out in-depth research, aimed at profiling overseas visitors flying through the airport, visiting the West and Northwest of Ireland. RedC interviewed 945 passengers arriving at the airport from overseas, over a period of six months. The key findings from the research highlights the importance of the airport from a regional access and economic development perspective in delivering visitors to several different counties across the regions. GALWAY SPORTS PARTNERSHIP

TRAINING AND EDUCATION

Galway Sports Partnership facilitates several courses to support clubs and organisations, these range from coach development, disability awareness courses through Active Disability Ireland, partnering with National Governing Bodies to run sport specific courses and courses on specific topics such as Women in Sport.

Our main courses we facilitate are Sport Ireland's Safeguarding Workshops as outlined below.

SAFEGUARDING 1

All Coaches, Club Children's Officers (CCO) and Designated Liaison Persons (DLP) must first complete the 3-hour Child Welfare & Protection Basic Awareness Workshop. This workshop educates participants on the implementation of best practice in safeguarding the welfare of children involved in sport.

SAFEGUARDING 2

A person appointed to the role of Club Children's Officer within a club must have firstly completed Sport Irelands Safeguarding 1 (Child Welfare & Protection Basic Awareness workshop). They should also complete Sport Irelands Club Children's Officer 3-hour workshop. The aim of this workshop is to help the *Club Children's Officer* to carry out their role and support the implementation of best practice in the club. Participants will also receive a Club Children's Officer Action Planning document as part of the training.

SAFEGUARDING 3

A person appointed to the Designated Liaison Person position in a club must firstly complete Sport Irelands Child Welfare & Protection Basic Awareness Workshop and should complete the Sport Irelands Designated Liaison Person 3-hour workshop. A club may appoint the same person to both the CCO and DLP positions however best practice advises that they are kept as separate roles.

Galway Sports Partnership Community Sports Development Officers and Sports Inclusion Disability Officer attended Sport Irelands Regional Development Officer meeting in Limerick on 11th March 2024. The meeting was an opportunity for Development Officers to

network, collaborate and to get updates from Sport Ireland on new policies, research and data that impact the work of Local Sports Partnerships. Galway Sports Partnership were asked to showcase a successful programme and our Sports Inclusion Disability Officer Ellie Loftus presented Galway Sports Partnerships Inclusive Triathlon. This is a partnership programme with Triathlon Ireland and Disability services in Galway to break down the barriers to a triathlon culminating in an Inclusive Triathlon in Kilcornan.

OLDER ADULT INFORMATION VISITS

Galway Sports Partnership supports Older Adult and Community Groups to become more Physically Active. As part of this we regularly visit groups and provide them with information of who Galway Sports Partnership are and the types of supports we offer to groups. As part of this we provide demonstrations on a variety of activities that their group can easily take part in to help them to become more physically active. This month our Sports Inclusion Disability Officer visited groups in Dunmore, Annaghdown, Lackagh and Cortoon.



INIS MÓR

On Monday 25th March Galway Sports Partnership visited Inis Mór for an adult's information session for both men and women. This was in partnership with Galway Rural Development, The Irish Men's Shed Association and Pleanáil Teanga Árann. Galway Sports Partnership provided demonstrations on various activities to promote physical activity such as Activator Poles, Boccia, Scooch and Flisk. There was also information from the Irish Men's Shed Association on how to set up a Men's Shed, the benefits of a shed and examples of activities that sheds around Ireland take part in. There was great feedback from the community with 17 participants eager to set up a social community group.



BIKE WEEK 2024

Bike Week is a celebration and promotion of the benefits of cycling. Bike Week 2024 will



take place from Saturday 11th to Sunday 19th May 2024.

Galway Sports Partnership received an allocation of €26,939 as part of an application from groups in Galway to run Bike Activities to cater for people of all ages and abilities, with a focus centred around inclusive, communitybased events.

ARTISTS SUPPORT SCHEME 2024 - OVERVIEW

90 applications were received.
€215,504 was the total requested amount.
11 applications were ineligible.
79 were eligible for shortlisting.

48 applications were shortlisted. €129,600 was the total requested amount of the shortlist. Artforms: Circus (1), Dance (1), Film (2), Literature (4), Music (9), Opera (2), Street Arts and Spectacle (2), Theatre (6) and Visual Arts (21).

CREATIVE IRELAND

CRUINNIÚ NA NÓG 2024

Cruinniú na nÓg 2024 will take place on Saturday the 15th of June. This is the National Day of Creativity for Children. Funding of €30,000 is available for running events all over Galway County on this day. Applications are currently open, and it is intended to have all decisions made and applicants informed by the end of April.

YOUTH CONSULTATION WITH BRANAR

Additional funding was secured to carry out a Youth Consultation to inform the programming of Cruinniú na nÓg 2024. It was decided to focus this consultation on the Aran Islands, as there is departmental interest in increasing engagement with Cruinniú amongst island and Gaeltacht communities. The consultation was carried out by Branar who have delivered a highly detailed report on their findings. 129 children were consulted across all 3



islands from 6 schools (both primary and secondary). The entire consultation process was carried out *as Gaeilge*, and the report was provided in both languages. The results will inform the programming of Cruinniú na nÓg on the islands in 2024 and beyond.

AUDIENCE METRICS - FACEBOOK

Last month Galway County Council gained 85 new Facebook followers, bringing the total followers as of March 31st, 2024, to 16,599. Galway County Council's audience ages range between 18 – 65+ with the main audience being those aged between 35 and 44, when this is broken down further 23.2% of this age group are women and 10.6% are men. In total, 31.8% of Galway County Council's Facebook followers are male and 68.2% are female.

The Local Studies section of Galway Public Libraries holds a five volume set of "Anniah Rioghachta Eireann", or the "Annals of the kingdom of Ireland". This is a billingual work in lifts and English, translated from the original lirish in 1856, by the Great Gaelic Scholar, John O'Donovan. It was originally written between 1632,and 1636, and is a history of the world ifrom its beginnings, until 1616.The main Author was Brother Micheal O Cleirigh, assisted by others, the "Four Masters". O'Donovan's english translation can be read side by side with the original lirish in these volumes, and it is a most interesting early history of Ireland. HOUSING & UKRAINIAN RESPONSE

HOUSING GRANTS

Three types of grant funding are available to private homeowners to enable them to make their accommodation more suitable for their needs:

- Housing Adaptation Grant for People with a Disability for people with a physical, sensory, mental health or intellectual disability to have necessary adaptations, repairs or improvement works carried out to make their accommodation more suitable for their needs. The maximum grant available is 30,000 or 95% of the total cost of the work approved by the Local Authority, whichever is less (not including the VAT cost of the work).
- Mobility Aids Grant for older people and/or people with a disability who may find it hard to move around their home to include for the provision of stair lifts, level access showers, access ramps etc. The maximum grant available is 6,000 or the total cost of the work approved by the Local Authority, whichever is less (not including the VAT cost of the work).
- Housing Aid for Older People Grant for people aged 66 years old or more who are living in poor housing conditions to have necessary repairs or improvements carried out and includes re-wiring, replacement of windows and doors, provision of heating etc. The maximum grant available is 8,000 or 95% of the total cost of the work approved by the Local Authority, whichever is less (grant can include the VAT cost of the work).



Galway County Council is required to provide 20% of the total of grants awarded, with the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage providing 80% of the amount awarded. The Council adopted a budget of 750,000 for their 20% contribution. This will allow the Council to allocate grants totaling 3,750,000, provided sufficient funding is allocated by the Department. Notification regarding the capital allocation from the Department is expected in the coming weeks.

DISABLED PERSONS GRANTS

Galway County Council has received 18 applications for adaptation works and one application for an extension to Council owned properties in quarter 1 2024. A tender was awarded for adaptation works to 19 Galway County Council properties throughout the County in mid-March 2024 with preparation work ongoing on a tender for extensions to 2 properties. The Department of Housing provides 90% of the costs for adaptation works, with the Council responsible for the balance of 10%.

VACANT HOMES

The Vacant Homes Unit attended five events across the five Municipal Districts on 4th, 5th and 6th April, to give information on the Vacant Homes Grant, the Local Authority Home Loan scheme, and the Disabled Persons grant, the housing aid for older persons and the Mobility aids grants. This was done in conjunction with the launch the Energy Master Plan for County Galway and with SEAI and the PPN workers. The events were held in Tuam, Ballinderreen, Lawrencetown, Lackagh and St Thomas's in Kilchreest. Unfortunately, the planned event in Maigh Cuilinn scheduled for Saturday 6th April had to be postponed due to storm Kathleen.







ENERGY RETROFITS

The Energy Efficiency Refit Programme continues to carry out significant energy improvements across the council's social housing stock. As part of the Energy Efficiency Retrofit Programme 2023 a total of 87 houses were deep retrofitted. These works involved various energy efficiency improvements to the fabric of the houses including replacement windows and doors, additional insulation to walls and attics, upgrade of the heating system to a heat pump and the provision of solar panels. The 2023 programme included works to houses in the following locations: Ballygar; Gort; Headford; Loughrea and Tuam. All these houses now have a Building Energy Rating (BER) of either A3 or A2. The tenants will experience enhanced comfort and reduced heating costs while producing much lower carbon emissions.



The Energy Efficiency Retrofit Programme for 2024 has recently been announced. Galway County Council has received provisional approval to deep retrofit a further 67 houses with a budget of €2,278,000. It is proposed to retrofit houses in the following locations this year; Athenry; Ballinasloe; Ballygar; An Cheathrú Rua; Clifden; Corofin; Glenamaddy; Gort & Headford.

PLANNED MAINTENANCE & VOID REFURBISHMENT

Galway County Council has again received funding from the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage towards the costs associated with refurbishing casual vacant housing units to get them ready for reallocation in a timely manner. Galway County Council has received an initial allocation of €451,000 based on the refurbishment of 41 units at an average cost of €11,000 per unit.

A number of planned maintenance programmes are currently being rolled out on a multiannual basis. These include works such as periodic electric inspections & repairs, upgrading of fire and carbon monoxide detection systems to current regulations, upgrading of septic tanks and the annual service of heat pumps. Funding of €90,345 is also being provided towards the cost of these planned maintenance works.

GALWAY SOCIAL HOUSING TASKFORCE

The Galway Social Housing Taskforce met on Tuesday, 10th April 2024 at County Hall with John McCarthy, former Secretary General, Department of Housing as the new Chairperson.

The Taskforce considered a range of housing matters including:

- 1. Taskforce Terms of Reference and Procedures
- 2. Overall Galway Planning and Housing Context
- 3. Social Housing Delivery
- 4. Affordable Homes
- 5. Homelessness
- 6. Traveller Accommodation

SOCIAL WORK TEAM [HOUSING]

STRUCTURE:

The role of Social Work involves supporting individuals and families who are experiencing difficulty in coping which is impacting on their ability to function. This may be due to, emotional issues, illness, general coping ability, lack of social supports, addictions, mental health, disability, ageing, personal or interpersonal relationship problems. The work involves assessing what the issues are and firstly identifying solutions with the client(s) themselves utilising a strengths-based approach and making referrals and recommendations regarding service delivery as appropriate.

Social Workers undertake work with clients experiencing difficulties in their lives. Referred clients may experience challenges within their family, community or services and require intervention, advocacy, mediation, or negotiation. The Social Work role involves



professional, clinical input to the client in addition to evidenced based service planning and having a liaison role with the Health & Social care sector as outlined above. Social Work is a professional and specialist role that is a valuable resource where available within the local authority setting.

LA Social Work respond to referrals in respect of:

- Existing tenants / Applicants
- Older persons
- Travellers
- Vulnerable adults work (Safeguarding)
- Child Welfare cases
- Disability cases (Intellectual, Physical, Sensory & Autism)
- Mental Health
- Homelessness
- LGBTQI+ (Lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer and intersex)
- Other marginalised and vulnerable individuals and groups

UPDATE:

- Increase in referrals during Q1 of older persons, vulnerable clients, both applicants and tenants, who are experiencing difficulties, seeking assistance. Referrals to Galway County Council Social Work from external referrers such as HSE Primary Care, Public Health Nursing and ALONE.
- Cost of living crisis impacting people.
- Changes to Sexual Offenders' legislation during 2024, this will impact the role of SOLO (Sexual Offences Liaison Officer), role held by Kieran Keon, Senior Social Worker. Access to accommodation and Housing is integral to the supervision and support packages provided to such housing applicants.
- CCMA National Review of LA Social Work underway. Kieran Keon, Senior Social Worker is one of three Social Work reps on the national group. The draft review report is in its final stages. It is envisaged that it will provide an up-to-date outline of the Social Work role in local authorities, outlining the value of local authorities recruiting Professionally Qualified Social Worker, in addition to providing guidance as to appropriate staffing levels, grading structures.

CAPITAL BUILD PROGRAMME

PART 8 AT BARKHILL WOODFORD

On 15th March 2024, an application under Part 8 of the Planning and Development Regulations 2001 (as amended) was lodged for the demolition of existing dwellings and outbuildings and the construction of 2 no. 2 bedroom houses including connections to existing services and all ancillary site works at Barkhill in Woodford.

Plans and particulars are available to the public for viewing at the Loughrea MD Office, the planning counter in County Hall and online on the Consult.ie portal, with submissions or observations to be received no later than 29th April 2024.



The project will then come before the elected members of Loughrea M.D.

EXISTING DWELLINGS AND OUTBUILDINGS AT BARKHILL, WOODFORD

PAIRC NA DARACH, BALLYMOE

Further to a construction contract signing with Finna Construction Ltd. last September works are continuing on the new development 'Pairc na Darach' at Durrow & Ballaghymurry, Ballymoe.

The development consists of 8 no. houses comprising; 2no. single storey two-bed houses, 6 no. two-storey two-bed houses and will include all ancillary site development works, including road enhancement works along the R360 Regional Road.

DESIGN BUILD CONSULTANTS' FRAMEWORK

The LA build team have advertised a new framework on e-Tenders for: Architect Led Fully Integrated Design Team Services for the provision of housing through the Accelerated Delivery Programme for Stage (i) to Stage (v) of the DHLGH's social housing investment programme.

This new framework once established will qualify design teams to manage delivery by Design and Build on behalf of Galway County Council and Galway City Council.

The advertisement includes for an initial competition for the appointment of a team to manage the provision of social housing developments at Gort Mhaoilir and Cullairbaun in Athenry.

Tenders are due back at the end of May with tender assessment to take place thereafter.

HOUSING FOR ALL LAND ACQUISITION FUND

On 2nd April 2024 Circular 10/2024 - 'Housing For All Land Acquisition Fund' was published by the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage which sets out new arrangements for making Land Acquisition Fund applications.

The Land Acquisition Fund is a dedicated fund managed by the Housing Agency to support Local Authorities to acquire land to deliver new build social housing schemes. The Fund has been extended into 2024 and its remit expanded to acquire sites for affordable/mixed tenure housing delivery.

Galway County Council intends to make applications for acquiring lands for the above purposes under these new arrangements.

INFRASTRUCTURE & OPERATIONS DIRECTORATE & FIRE & EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

NRPO

Galway to Oughterard Cycleway

A series of in-person information events were held in Oughterard, Maigh Cuilinn and Galway City in March 2024. Members of the Project Team were available to discuss the Preferred Route Corridor and this consultation would lead to defining the Emerging Preferred Route (i.e., a centreline) for the project.

FLOODING UPDATE

The third Public Consultation Day (PCD) for the Ballinasloe Flood Relief Scheme (FRS) took place on **Tuesday 27th February 2024.** A total of 65 attendees signed the attendance book, there may have been closer to 80 in attendance. Elected Representatives had a two-hour presentation and discussion prior to the main event. The PCD report is currently under draft.

ORANMORE TO TRAIN STATION ACTIVE TRAVEL PROJECT

The elected members' briefing has been completed. The project details have been uploaded on consult.ie. including updated material posted online on 09/04/2024, inviting public participation and feedback. COMMUNITY TRANSPORT STUDY TEMPLATE (CTS)

Systra are completing the final draft of the Kinvarra CTS template. When received, it will be submitted to the NTA and TII Land Use Planning and AT Investment teams for review this month.

TRANSPORT RESEARCH AREA (TRA) 2024 CONFERENCE

Two senior staff from Transport are attending some of the Transport Research Arena (TRA) Dublin 2024 Conference on April 15-18.



CAPITAL PROGRAMME

BALLYGAR WASTEWATER TREATMENT PLANT

New planning application to be submitted in the coming weeks. Land and wayleave acquisition is advanced and going through legal at present. Site investigation was carried out in 2017 and some additional investigation was completed by Irish Drilling at the end of 2023. Project is expected to go to tender in Q3 2024 and will be bundled with Mountbellew WWTP. Construction is expected to commence in 2025.

MOUNTBELLEW WASTEWATER TREATMENT PLANT

New planning application to be submitted in May 2024. Land and wayleave acquisition is complete and site investigation is complete. Project is expected to go to tender in Q3 2024 and will be bundled with Ballygar WWTP. Construction is expected to commence in 2025.

AN SPIDÉAL WASTEWATER TREATMENT PLANT

Wastewater Treatment Plant has been fully commissioned and results to date have shown that the plant is operating and providing an effluent well within its ELVs. An Spidéal is one of the 39 priority areas identified by the EPA where Uisce Éireann must progress new treatment to prevent wastewater discharges negatively impacting bathing water quality. The plant is 1,000 P.E design capacity, providing secondary treatment via Rotating Biological Contactors (RBCs).

The 12- month contractor, (Coffey Water Ltd), operate phase commenced in October 2023. During the final months of this operate phase, Galway Co. Co./Uisce Éireann personnel will be trained to operate the plant, in preparation for its handover in October 2024.

The official opening for the plant took place on Friday, 24th November 2023.





AHASCRAGH WASTEWATER TREATMENT PLANT

Flows have been diverted to the new WWTP since 27th October. All works have been completed on site. Process proving has been completed on the plant and results received to date show that the plant is operating well within its ELVs. The contractor, (Coffey Water Ltd.), will now operate the plant for a period of 12 months.

The new plant at Ahascragh is 470 P.E. capacity and provides secondary treatment via RBCs.

ROUNDSTONE WASTEWATER TREATMENT PLANT

The judicial review of the CPO for the preferred site is ongoing, and the hearing may progress in the coming months. In the meantime, Irish Drilling have completed site investigation on the foreshore for the terminal pumping station, (which will be required in any case).

AN CHEATHRÚ RUA WASTEWATER TREATMENT PLANT

Similar to Roundstone, the preferred site for An Cheathrú Rua WWTP has been tied up with judicial reviews. Following a decision by An Bord Pleanála to grant planning permission for an alternative project on the preferred site for the proposed An Cheathrú Rua Wastewater Treatment Plant, Uisce Eireann commenced a review of its plans to end the discharge of untreated sewage in An Cheathrú Rua. As part of this review Uisce Éireann has now decided to withdraw its Compulsory Purchase Order for that site. Once Uisce Éireann has completed

the updated Preliminary Business Case for An Cheathrú Rua it will make details of the proposed scheme available.



AN CHEATHRÚ RUA WWTP PREFERRED SITE

EYRECOURT

Budget approval has been granted to progress the planning and design of a new wastewater treatment plant at Eyrecourt. The options being progressed are for secondary treatment by either installing RBCs or an ICW. Both options will require a new greenfield site.



Ryan Hanley Stantec (RHS) were appointed to progress the project on 15th December 2023 and the kick-off meeting was held on 24th January 2024. RHS are currently assessing a shortlist of feasible options.

GREATER GALWAY STRATEGIC DRAINAGE STUDY

Ryan Hanley Stantec delivered an Inception Report for the project in July of this year. They are currently in the process of data gathering which will be followed by a gap analysis to identify what's needed to prepare the required existing infrastructure condition reports.

The study area covers the Galway MASP catchment, (which includes Baile Chláir), Maigh Cuilinn, and Athenry and the existing unsewered agglomerations of Na Forbacha, Craughwell, Clarinbridge and Kilcolgan. The existing infrastructure consists of 10 networks and 4 WWTPs with an estimated current capacity of 190,000 P.E.

The final Strategic Drainage Study Report will consist of the following deliverables:

- Communications Strategy & Plan
- Data Collection Review & Gap Analysis
- Population & Land Use Report
- Hydraulic & Marine Modelling Reports
- Optioneering Reports
- SEA Report

A programme of 24 months, (June 2025), has been specified for the Galway report.



A Gap Analysis Report was submitted to Uisce Éireann in February and the consultants are now progressing their assessment of the existing infrastructure within the catchment.

GREATER GALWAY STRATEGIC DRAINAGE STUDY CATCHMENT

OPERATIONS

The information below is based on March data from West Regional Control Centre (WRCC). Galway Fire and Rescue Service (GFRS) had 127 turnouts to 115 Incidents. That is an increase of 1 incident on 114 the previous month. 39 were fire incidents, 74 were special service incidents (road traffic collision (RTC), Automatic Fire Alarms (AFA's), flooding, storm damage, etc.) and 5 were standbys either in station or at a central location. Of those incidents, 44.04% were attended by Fire Service resources within 10 minutes of alert, 38.53% were attended between 10 and 20 minutes and 17.43% were attended in over 20 minutes. The average turnout time for the Full-time station in Galway City was 2.04 minutes and for county retained stations was 5.78 minutes.

CAPITAL PROJECTS

ATHENRY FIRE STATION

Construction of the New Fire Station in Athenry continues with the project substantially complete and the building is now fully enclosed. Installation of services and remaining siteworks are underway. It is anticipated that the station will be completed by the end of April 2024.

LOUGHREA FIRE STATION

Subject to Senior Management Team approved, it is intended to proceed with public consultation in accordance with Part 8 of the Planning and Development Regulations for the proposed Loughrea Fire Station, with a report to the Loughrea Municipal District meeting in July for members consideration.

BRIGADE MECHANICS WORKSHOP ATHENRY

Tender for Design Team is due to be issued in the near future.

HEADQUARTERS AND GALWAY CITY FIRE STATION

Preferred site identified and awaiting Chief Executive approval. There will be the initiation of a screening exercise in advance of any future development. Capital appraisal 99% complete and will be submitted to the National Directorate for Fire and Emergency Management once Chief Executive approval is available.

PREVENTION

The information in the following is based on the March figures. The Fire Authority received 23 Fire Safety Certificate applications and issued decisions on 13 applications. 8 Disability Access Certificate applications were received, and decisions made on 8 applications. A total of 5 new licenses were issued and 26 inspections were conducted.

GRANT AID FROM THE NATIONAL DIRECTORATE FOR FIRE & EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

Capital approval has been received from the National Directorate for Fire and Emergency Management to procure a mid-sized vehicle appliance foe use in Inishmore. This will enhance and provide additional resilience for the existing appliance in service.

TRAINING

Three new firefighter recruits successfully completed their initial training Firefighting Skills course which commenced on 26th February and lasted three weeks concluding on 15th March last. These newly trained firefighters will be stationed at An Cheathrú Rua, Tuam and Ballinasloe fire stations.

It is planned to train a further five new recruit firefighters on a training course which commences on the 8th April. These additional recruits will be stationed at Inis Mor (x1), An Cheathrú Rua (x2) and Gort (x 2). Once completed this will bring the total number of newly recruited firefighters thus far in 2024 to 12 which already exceeds the average total annual intake of recruit firefighters.



A water rescue initial/recertification training was conducted from 25th to 28th March. The participants were predominantly from the full-time fire service. The training was conducted at various training locations in Galway City and Tuam.

One training place was allocated to Galway Fire Service on the National Directorate for Fire & Emergency Management's "Fire Service trainer (Delivery)" training course which took place from 11th to 15th March. The aim of this course is to assist fire authorities in developing and updating their ability to manage efficient and effective training delivery. This training provides officers involved in the delivery of training with the skills and knowledge necessary to effectively deliver and manage training at fire authority level.

Training was provided to members of the administration team in fire service headquarters on the use of recently acquired software for the recording and management of staff training in the fire service. The software is an add on module to the existing asset management system "Flex".

Two training allocations were requested and granted on several National Directorate for Fire & Emergency Management's training courses scheduled to take place later in April. The courses in question being "Fire Service Trainer" and "Effective Decision Making". Allocations have also been sought for the NDFEM's "Module 2" training course schedule for May next.

MAJOR EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

A multi–Principal Response Agency Review commenced of the Upper Tier Control of Major Accident Hazards Site in Oranmore, with a Principal Response Agency & Relevant Stakeholder meeting early April and follow up exercise scheduled in late May. The Review will update the 2021 External Emergency Plan for the site, with a view to releasing a revised draft plan in June for Public Consultation.

The Draft Direction concerns the zoning of five parcels of land in the town. The particulars of this Direction were subject to public consultation from 29/02/2024 – 14/03/2024. Six submissions were received during consultation period. CE Report on Submissions to Draft Ministerial Direction to the Athenry LAP 2024-2030 was submitted to Minister for Local Government & Planning; Members for Athenry MD and Prescribed Bodies on 03/04/2024.

LOUGHREA DRAFT LOCAL AREA PLAN 2024-2030

879 submissions were received on the Loughrea Draft Local Area Plan 2024-2030 CE Report on submissions received on Loughrea Draft Local Area Plan 2024-2030 was circulated to Members on 26/02/2024.

Workshop for Members was held at MD Meeting on 11/03/2024.

CE Report was discussed at the Loughrea MD Meeting on 26/03/2024. A number of Material Alterations were made and will be going out on public display by mid-April.

Galway Community Archaeology Project and Galway County Council have arranged a free bus tour of Kilboght Church and Graveyard, Abbeygormican and St. Kerrill's Abbey in Gurteen where they can hear about ongoing local community efforts to restore and

promote the heritage sites. A bus will leave the offices of Galway County Council, Prospect Hill at 9.30 am with pick-ups at Oranmore, Athenry, Galway Plaza and Loughrea.

Gurteen Community Council, Kilboght Graveyard Heritage Group and Abbeygormican Cemetery Group have each worked with Galway Community Archaeology Project, Heritage Office, and Environment Section in securing funding through the Community Monuments Fund to prepare conservation management plans and to undertake conservation works.

The aim of International Day for Monuments and Sites is to encourage local groups and individuals to consider the importance of cultural heritage to their lives, identities, and communities, and to promote awareness of its diversity and vulnerability and the efforts required to protect and conserve it. Galway Community Archaeology Project is funded by the Heritage Council and the Heritage Office, Galway County Council.

HERITAGE COUNCIL'S COMMUNITY GRANT SCHEME



The Heritage Officer provides advice, guidance, and letters of support to many heritage groups in the County who were applying for the Heritage Council's Community Grant Scheme. The minimum grant that could have been requested through the scheme was €500 and the maximum is €25,000. Last year, 15 Galway-based projects received a total of €148,470 through the scheme, including the Kinvara Hockey Club who

used the funding to design an accessible heritage and biodiversity trail within a new pitch development project, Bullaun Cemetery Committee who used the funding to train community volunteers on how to map its graveyard, Reilig na bhFilí (Killeeneen) for a Conservation Management Plan, Kilcummin Church of Ireland for the repair and restoration of Church windows and Abbey Heritage for the creation of a digital StoryMap. TIDY TOWNS NETWORK MEETING



Mark Molloy, Environment Awareness officer and Denise Feeney, Community Climate Action Officer attended the Galway County Tidy Towns Network meeting organised by the Community section in the

Council. The event was co-hosted with Kinvara Tidy Towns and held in the Burren Nature Sanctuary and Botanical Collection on Saturday, March 9th. The event was attended by over 20 Tidy Towns groups from around the County with over 40 attendees. The aim of event was to network, share experiences, expertise, challenges, and solutions. Galway Co Council staff informed the attendees of the many supports from Galway Co Council including the many grants and resources available to Tidy Towns groups in the county.





INTERNAL ENERGY USE

The Galway County Council Energy Review was completed. Total Final Consumption for 2022 was 17,000,000 kWh (17GWh) with a breakdown of 42% on electricity, 37% on transport and 21% on thermal. This equates to 4,679 tonnes greenhouse gas emissions. There is an overall downward trend in consumption. Expenditure on energy consumed by Galway County Council in 2022 was €2.6 million. This amounted to approximately 2% of the Annual Budget for 2022. The Energy Review identifies opportunities for energy consumption reductions.

Work is ongoing to attain ISO 50001 energy management standard within the organisation to optimise implementation of these opportunities. Efforts to implement an automated Data Collection System are progressing and this is expected to be in-situ by end of Q2 2024. Outputs from this system will support analysis of energy use within the organisation.

ACRES

An ecologist from the ACRES West cooperation project gave an online talk on the Agri-Climate Rural Environment Scheme (ACRES), in particular aspects of the scheme that facilitate water quality improvements such as:

- Habitat restoration
- Riparian margin tree planting
- Riparian margin/sheep fencing
- Culverts

The area covered by ACRES West Connacht in county Galway is Connemara. ACRES Burren Aran and ACRES MSC are covering areas in the south of the county. ACRES replaces



the GLAS scheme. Landowners are paid based on various measures introduced.

FENCING TO PROTECT WATER QUALITY

DAWROS WATERBODIES

A meeting was held between the Council, Kylemore Abbey and MKO consultants in relation to the tourist season ahead in 2024 and ensuring compliance with the Kylemore's wastewater discharge licence. In consultation with environment section technical staff, substantial works have been carried out on the wastewater treatment plant, surface & wastewater pipe network and pumping stations over the past 12 months. These works will ensure compliance with the licence and protection of the sensitive Dawros waterbodies downstream.

BATHING WATERS

A meeting was held with the HSE to finalise the bathing water sampling programme for 2024. 28 bathing waters in total will be sampled during the season, with 11 inlet streams to bathing areas also being tested. The first samples will be taken on the 22nd May 2024.

WASTE/AIR MANAGEMENT AND ENFORCEMENT

WASTE PRESENTATION BY LAW INSPECTIONS

Over 130 waste presentation by law inspections were carried out in Ballinasloe. Some of these were follow-ups to previous inspections and if these were still non-compliant, Fixed Payment notices were issued to the householders.

EPA WORKSHOP

Some staff members attended a workshop run by the EPA in relation to case studies on waste enforcement issues. Topics covered included waste presentation by law inspections, instances for issuing Fixed Payment Notices, new CCTV guidelines and an update from the NWCPO. The staff found the cases very informative.

COURT FILES

Three files were submitted to the law department for prosecution. Two of them are for nonpayment of Fixed Payment Notices issued under the waste presentation by laws. The other case is for the non-submission of information under Section 18 of the Waste Management Act 1996 as amended.

COURT ATTENDANCE

There were two court cases heard in March. One was for a Section 32 prosecution under the Waste Management Act 1996 as amended, the person transported waste without a waste collection permit. The offender pleaded guilty and was convicted and fined 200 Euro. The other case concerns the storage of End-of-Life vehicles without a waste facility permit in place. The individual is being prosecuted for not complying with a Section 55 notice to dispose of the waste. The case was in court for the second time in March, on the first occasion the judge had given the individual a chance to dispose of the waste, but the judge was not happy with the progress and gave the defendant another month to clear all the waste from the site.

GROUNDING OF THE FISHING VESSEL AMBITIOUS ON INISHMORE

Galway County Council were contacted by the Coast Guard on Sunday the 3rd of March to advise us that a 20 m wooden fishing vessel ran aground on the north coast of Inishmore in the early hours of the morning. 5 crew members were rescued by the coast guard helicopter and taken to University Hospital Galway – all were ok. We were advised that the vessel was carrying 2 tonnes of marine diesel which posed a risk causing environmental pollution.

Our Oil Pollution Response plan was put into effect, and we contacted SEA- PT (Shannon Estuary Anti-Pollution team) to advise them that we may need equipment brought to Inishmore.

Galway County Council had an initial briefing with the Coast Guard on 4th March and further information was gathered in relation to the vessel's owners.

Weather conditions at the time prevented any kind of salvage operation. The prevailing winds and currents were such that any oil would have been carried away from Inishmore.

Galway County Council instructed PWS ltd (Pollution & Waste Services), who are specialists in oil spill response, to send a team to the Island to monitor the situation and assess any potential oil pollution. At this stage, the vessel had started to break up, but PWS reported no evidence of oil pollution on the shoreline.

The owner of the vessel gave Galway County Council an undertaking that he would remove all debris from the shore and by the 6thMarch was on the Island with a team of locals removing the wreckage.

GCC attended daily briefings with the Coast Guard throughout the week to monitor the situation. Aerial surveys were carried out by the Coast Guard helicopter throughout the week.

In the end, the vessel broke up before any salvage operation could be carried out. It is assumed that all fuel on board escaped, but it did not wash ashore and, due to the nature of diesel, would have dispersed quickly.



VETERINARY DEPARTMENT

FOOD SAFETY

FSAI once again extended the contract for veterinary public health and food safety work in the county and city from Feb 29th until March 22nd. At this point it was further extended to October 31st with a cover letter explaining that transfer of the Local Authority Veterinary Service to the Department of Agriculture had been agreed and that they expected the



veterinary service nationally to transfer to the Department of Agriculture by October 31st, 2024. Further details on this are pending.

DOG CONTROL

Upgrading works at the dog shelter provided for by Department of Rural and Community Development fund granted in December 2023, are almost at completion with insulation works throughout, external shutters and new flooring all installed. The upgrade project provides for better biosecurity and disease management as well as thermal protection for the dogs under the care of Galway County Council. New European legislation due to be introduced in 2024 mandates allowable environmental temperatures in dog pounds and shelters for the first time and these works guarantee same.

Funding has not yet been granted for recruitment of more dog wardens as widely reported by the media in 2023.

675 dog licences purchased during month of March 2023, 470 of which were purchased in the local post office.

FREE E-WASTE AND BATTERY RECYCLING EVENTS FOR COUNTY GALWAY HOUSEHOLDERS

Householders across County Galway are being encouraged to bring their batteries and electrical/electronic waste to a set of free collection days being held in Mountbellew, Loughrea, Gort, Maam Cross and Oughterard during April and May.

Hosted by WEEE (Waste Electrical and Electronic Equipment) Ireland and supported by Galway County Council, the annual initiative saw over 180 tonnes of electrical waste collected in the county last year.

Anything with a plug, battery or cable can be recycled for free on the day, including old washing machines, TVs, toasters and kettles, electronic tools and toys, cables, IT equipment, mobile phones, remote controls and batteries.

The series of events kicks off on Saturday April 6th at the Oughterard GAA car park followed by Loughrea Mart (April 13th), Mountbellew-Moylough GAA Club (April 20th), Maam Cross Mart (April 27th) and Gort Co-Operative Mart (May 4th). Collections will be accepted from 10.00am to 4.00pm each day.

Cllr. Liam Carroll, Cathaoirleach of Galway County Council said "With old electric waste items and batteries lying around many households, these drop-off days provide a great opportunity to recycle these items for free. This initiative ensures waste is diverted from landfill, raw materials are recovered for reuse, and hazardous materials are safely and responsibly disposed of. "

"Recycling e-waste is incredibly beneficial for both the environment, the county, and the economy," said **Liam Conneally, Chief Executive at Galway County Council**. "There are many old items still lying around a lot of households and we are delighted to work with WEEE Ireland in offering householders the opportunity to recycle these for free."

According to **Leo Donovan, CEO of WEEE Ireland Ltd**., "People living in County Galway have contributed greatly to e-waste recycling every year. We want to encourage that trend and ensure that everyone avails of this free service."

Eileen Ruane, Director of Services commented "We look forward to working with WEEE Ireland and Galway householders to hopefully recycle a record-breaking amount of



electronic waste. All items collected this year will help County Galway meet national e-waste recycling targets for 2024."

BALLINASLOE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT UPDATE

During March 2024, the focus of the technical team within Ballinasloe MD is the preparation, presentation, and procurement of the annual roadworks programme. Tenders for the largest elements of work including road restoration improvement (strengthening), and road restoration maintenance (surface dressing) are being evaluated to establish the most economically advantageous tender.

Outdoor crews are working on maintenance projects throughout the MD and given the poor weather condition and extended period of rainfall, a primary focus is on drainage maintenance and pothole repair.

Seasonal turlough flooding at Polleagh, Williamstown has resulted in a road closure for an extended period. Technical teams are monitoring levels and will be undertaking surveys in order to design alleviation works.

Good progress is being made on the Ukrainian Response – Rapid Build Modular Homes site in Pollboy, Ballinasloe. All 64 prefabricated units have been delivered and sites works including connections to utilities are ongoing.

UPDATE ON ACTIVITIES FOR CONAMARA - APRIL 2024

- The Restoration Improvement Works and Restoration Maintenance Works have been tendered and a Most Economically Advantageous Tender Identified. Work due to commence in May.
- An application for funding regarding for Inishbofin, Inis Mór, Inis Meáin and Inis Oírr has been submitted to the Department of Rural Community Development. Substantial funding was granted in 2023 and a decision on 2024 funding is expected shortly.
- An allocation of €30,000 has been granted by the Department of Transport to progress a Strategic Infrastructure Scheme at Cuan na Loinge to address flooding of the main road into this area.
- Safety Improvement Works allocation of €35,000 has been granted to refurbish the traffic signal heads and push button units in Maigh Cuilinn.
- Climate Change Projects €305,000 (4 projects) has been allocated.
- Main activities at moment for outdoor staff include road maintenance, town and village maintenance, preparation works for roads programme & drainage works.



- Community Wardens 3 positions dealing with illegal dumping, parking enforcement, ring buoy inspections.
- Town and Village Maintenance substantially done by direct staff.
- Piers & Harbours- Direct labour projects ongoing under marine infrastructure scheme.
- Operation & Maintenance of Public Beaches- Summer ready- preparing for summer 2024.

TUAM MUNICIPAL DISTRICT UPDATE

The 2024 roads programme for the Tuam Municipal District was considered and adopted by the Tuam elected members on the 5th March. The elected members welcomed the good dispersal of funding right across the MD. Funding of over €6.8m was approved and allocated to the MD for 2024. The main allocations of funding were: -

- Restoration Improvement grant €3.3m
- Restoration Maintenance grant €0.845m
- Discretionary Grants €0.5m
- Bridge works €0.33m
- Climate Action and drainage grants €0.5m
- Safety grants €0.1m
- Road maintenance grants €1m

Following the adoption of the programme the Tuam MD office staff tendered out part of each grant for contract works. The road improvement overlay schemes, road recycling schemes and surface dressing schemes were all tendered out throughout the month and returned. The Tuam office staff are currently procuring the returned tenders. It is envisaged that the successful contractor will commence the works in the coming month.

WORKS CARRIED DURING THE MONTH IN TUAM MUNICIPAL DISTRICT



Works have already commenced for the 2024 programme across the District with the Road improvement and surface dressing schemes being prepared by the Tuam Roads crew. This involves drainage works, edging of verges, small road surface repairs.

The removal of the pole was the final part to be done under a community involvement scheme in Luimnagh. The scheme improved road safety by widening the road for a passing bay and to improve sightlines.

Road reconstruction works were carried out in Kiltivna outside Dunmore to remove a dangerous section of roadway. A section of road was excavated to improve vehicular sightlines at a junction. The road was given a temporary surface before a full road recycling overlay to be carried out during the summer as part of the Roads programme.
