LOCAL COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE (LCDC)

LECP:

Work is progressing to finalise the Issues Paper / Socio-Economic Statement for the LECP and engage consultants to carry out public consultation for the plan.

LCDC MEMBERSHIP

Following the resignation of Mr. Michael Keady, the HSE Representative on the LCDC, Elected Members are requested to approve his replacement, Mr. Laurence Gaughan, Regional Project Manager HSE, effective from October 2023. A meeting will then be arranged to brief Mr. Gaughan on the LCDC programmes, particularly in Health & Wellbeing as he will assume the role of Chair of this LCDC Sub-Committee.

COMMUNITY RECOGNITION FUND

Most small-scale grants awarded under the Community Recognition Fund have been completed and site inspections are being carried out which is a requirement of the scheme prior to drawdown. While it was not possible to complete 60% of all larger projects due to the tight timescales for Year 1 of the Fund, it is hoped to complete a substantial drawdown of funding by end 2023 and discussions are ongoing with the Department of Rural and Community Development in this regard.

COMMUNITY ENHANCEMENT PROGRAMME

Following purchase of a Property Marking Machine under this funding scheme, and completion of training for Men's Sheds, and underspends have been reallocated towards a bulk purchase of signage for this community safety programme, following which meetings will be arranged with An Garda Síochána and Men's Sheds to finalise a booking system for the machine and formally launch the initiative.

HEALTHY ISLANDS PROJECT

Healthy Galway and Galway Rural Development showcased their "Healthy Islands" project which was shortlisted for a National Age Friendly Award to a panel of judges on 3rd October in Galway County Council. Healthy Islands was a series of health and wellbeing events on the 4 offshore islands, where over 20 agencies were coordinated to provide a series of health and wellbeing days aimed at breaking down the barriers to accessing services and information on the islands. We will find out the result of the process at the National Awards Ceremony at the end of November.

TIDY TOWNS

Tidy Towns Groups across County Galway continue to improve their marks in the Supervalu National Tidy Towns Competition results year-on-year, while carrying out invaluable work in their respective communities. First place in the County, and their Gold Medal, was retained by Milltown, while Abbey retained second place in the County and their Silver Medal status. Gold, Silver, and Bronze Medals are awarded to entrants who fall within a specified number of marks of the overall winner of the competition, and this demonstrates the high quality of improvement works being carried out in these communities. In this regard, An Spidéal retained third place in the County and their Bronze Medal, which they first achieved last year – they also received a special mention by Mary Kennedy at the Awards Ceremony for the substantial improvements they have achieved over the last 2 years – An Every year, there is also an Endeavour Award which recognizes the community who have achieved the highest increase in marks in the County – huge congratulations to Tullycross who achieved a whopping increase of 37 marks since last year – the Community Section cannot recall ever In addition to the Medal Awards, there are a number of seeing an increase in marks of that size! Special Award Categories in the Tidy Towns Competition to recognize excellence in particular areas of the competition, and County Galway continued its proud record of high achievement in this area with the following honoured with special prizes at the Awards Ceremony:

- Williamstown Tidy Towns was the overall winner of the National Heritage Award
- Monivea Tidy Towns was the overall winner of the Gum Litter Taskforce Award
- Northampton National School was a regional winner of the Supervalu Schools Award
- **Woodford Parish Development** were Highly Commended for their work towards the All-Ireland Pollinator Plan.

SOCIAL INCLUSION

PILOT PROJECT ON NURSING HOMES

Age Friendly Ireland have partnered with Trinity College Dublin Research Centre to conduct a research project into the quality of life and resilience of residential long-term care settings, and one of the settings chosen for the project is St. Brendan's Nursing Home Loughrea. In addition to focus group consultations to be conducted by the Research Team, the Age Friendly Programme Manager will liaise with the Nursing Home staff and residents to conduct a Walkability Audit of the key outdoor settings and environs of the Nursing Home to identify how the built environment can enhance quality of life for residents, staff, and visitors alike. It is hoped that the pilot project will lead to the development of Universal Design and Best Practice Guidelines for the ongoing development of Nursing Home facilities and their integration into the surrounding community setting. Training sessions and templates will be developed in October with a view to carrying out the Walkability Audit in November.



POSITIVE AGEING WEEK EXHIBITION

The Local Heroes Exhibitions to honour 30 people from across the City and County who epitomize positive and healthy ageing, took place in Ballinasloe Library, Galway City Library, and Oughterard Courthouse, during Positive Ageing Week 2023 (1st to 7th October 2023). Cllr. Liam Carroll Cathaoirleach of the County, and Cllr. Evelyn Parsons, Leas-Cathaoirleach of the County, attended the events and presented a memento of the exhibition panel to each participant. Research tells us that our own ageing journey is impacted by what we see and hear about ageing, therefore, it is so important to shine a light on older people who are living life to the full and are so often valuable members of clubs, groups, or are vital supports to their families and enrich the lives of those around them so much. The exhibitions and events were very heartwarming and the biographies of the participants.

Margaret lives in Cashel, Connemara and is almost 80 years. She has six children, eight grandchildren and one great-grandchild. Margaret cared for her late husband and best friend Josle until his death in 2022 and had cared for her late parents also. She is a wonderful and considerate neighbour.

Margaret is very well known in her community for her voluntary work. She and her late husband set up St. Conal's Social Club in 1992, to provide social support for older people. She is a lady ahead of her time, who was helping to prevent social isolation in her rural community, before we had research showing the impact of loneliness on people's health. She and her small team of volunteers fundraised to provide weekly meetings, breakfast, annual Christmas dinners, a respite weekend break and day trips for the older people.

Margaret has sat on the Board of Management of the local school and has represented the Cashel Pony Show Committee for 30 years. Margaret believes in the importance of keeping the mind and body active, and walks regularly, reads every day, and she loves her weekly crosswords.

Margaret epitomises the old Irish term 'Meitheal' and is truly an inspiration to us all.

















PUBLIC PARTICIPATION NETWORK (PPN)

PPN membership now stands at 1,258 member groups spread across three pillars: Community & Voluntary, Social Inclusion, and Environmental.

ACTING AS AN INFORMATION HUB:

- The PPN sent out 1 Monthly Newsletter along with 7 mass emails to all 1,258 Member Groups.
- Regular updates across the PPN's social media accounts (Facebook and Twitter) and updates from various other shareholders shared via email.
- The PPN answered numerous queries in relation to funding, advice on setting up groups, insurance options for community groups, via phone calls, website and emails.



• The PPN Website was updated regularly with funding announcements, news from Government Departments, resources for groups and local/ national events.

BUILDING CAPACITY:

To celebrate and highlight European Sustainable Development Week (ESDW) 20 September – 26 September 2023 the PPN ran two Sustainable Development Goals workshops specifically tailored to Tidy Towns groups. The aim of the workshops was to help Tidy Towns Groups to: Align their work to the SDG's, learn how to map their projects to the SDGs in the Tidy Towns Entry Form & Special Award Category and, learn how to promote the SDG's in their community through their work. Two workshops were held, one in Claregalway and the other in Furbo.

PROMOTING REPRESENTATION:

- PPN Representatives attended the Climate Change & Biodiversity SPC, Transport SPC, LCDC, JPC meetings with reports sent on to PPN workers for member engagement.
- The PPN attended the National PPN Conference 5th and 6th October, hosted by County Wicklow PPN. The two-day conference brought together workers, volunteers, and representatives from across the Country, celebrating the work of



PPN's and their vital role in community engagement and participation.

The North-East Galway Fit-Up Theatre Festival returned to County Galway for its third year at the end of September 2023. Rural villages in North-East Galway enjoyed three weeks of fantastic theatre from Tuesday September 26th until Sunday 15th October. The Three Rings in association with Galway County Council Arts Office and the Arts Council, presented three high quality productions in six venues over a three-week period. Opening this year's three-week festival, the Three Rings welcome Hubcap Theatre with their hilarious, heart-warming play, The Parish written and performed by Michael Ryan and Sean Kelleher.





For the second week of the festival, Sligo native Niamh McGrath will perform her critically acclaimed play Gombean across this year's six Fit-Up venues from Tues 3rd Oct until Sun 8th October. Gombean, written by Niamh and directed by Seamus O Rourke is set in a sleepy town in Sligo. For this year's festival finale week, the Three Rings welcome Irene Kelleher with her play Wake, directed by Geoff Gould. - Introductions and networking with other independent artists and arts organisations nationally and internationally. One-to-one mentoring from Director Niamh O'Donnell and Programme Manager Leigh Hussey.
- Access to a shared workspace, rehearsal/meeting room spaces for development and collaboration sessions in ITI's offices located on 17 Eustace Street, Temple Bar Dublin 2.
- Access to short term dedicated desk in selected national venues or cultural spaces for non-Dublin based artists.
- An artist practice bursary of €1,300.

The open call for applications was announced on 12 October and the deadline is 09 November. We look forward to seeing who applies and who is successful.

CULTURE NIGHT LATE 2023

Galway County Council Arts Office in partnership with Macnas and Athenry Arts & Heritage Centre presented **Take a Walk with Crom**, a Culture Night Late event with funding from the Arts Council, Department of Tourism, Culture, Arts, Gaeltacht, Sport and Media and Galway County Council.

An estimated 5,000 people lined the streets of Athenry to witness a spectacular Culture Night event by Macnas in partnership with Galway County Arts Office and Athenry Arts & Heritage Centre. Take a Walk with Crom involved 64 artists and performers and 43 community volunteers, alongside staff and crew.

Take a Walk with Crom added tremendous value to our overall Culture Night programme. On the lead up we got great publicity and shares on social which garnered an audience for Take a Walk with Crom and events in Athenry but also shone a light on our 40+ open call events across the county. This was a major coup for the Arts Office and Galway County Council. It was also a great success economically for local businesses and community groups drawing visitors from all over the county.



Receiving Culture Night Late funding was an incredible opportunity for the Arts Office to produce a large-scale event with incredible partners. This was a clear step up of ambition for our Culture Night programme. It allowed us to appeal to a broader audience across the county and work closely with the community of Athenry to strengthen their relationship with Macnas.



The Tourism Strategy and these environmental documents were sent to the statutory bodies from the Planning department. There is a timeframe of 6 weeks for NIS and 4 weeks for SEA documents, there may be adjustments based on this feedback before the final strategy is launched and come before





Council for consideration and adoption in November. These environmental documents are due to all be returned by the week beginning 6th November.

The new Ahascragh Distillery and Visitor Centre is well worth a visit. The building itself, a restored corn mill, is stunning and gives a lift to the entire community. Ahascragh Distillery and Café has given a boost of tourism to Ahascragh.



A visit to the centre comes with a guided tour showcasing their whiskey and gin produced there. The old Ahascragh mill dates to the early 1800s and up until the 1950s processed grain into flour.

With an overall investment of €10 million, this project has created over 20 direct jobs in the rural village of Ahascragh and surrounding areas. The company will also support a further 60-70 indirect jobs through local supply chains.

The distillery has been recently named a finalist in the Sustainable Energy Authority of Ireland Awards (SEAI). The distillery achieves temperatures exceeding 115 degrees, a first in Ireland and the UK, this results in a remarkable reduction of 706 tones and CO2 annually and a 40% cost saving.

Ahascragh distillery is the first in the world to use a heat pump system for all its heat needs, setting the bar for sustainability and showcasing the incredible potential of heat pump technology in global decarbonisation efforts.

This tour was a very impressive and highly informative, Ahascragh Distillery and Visitor Centre is a major tourism edition to Ahascragh



and surrounding areas, congratulations to all involved, the tourism function in Galway County Council looks forward to promoting, supporting, and highlighting this state-of-the-art Distillery.



DEDP CONFERENCE 2023





GALWAY SOCIAL HOUSING TASKFORCE

The Galway Social Housing Taskforce met on Thursday 14th September in the Council Chamber. This is a joint Taskforce between Galway City and County and attended by senior members of the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage and the Housing Delivery Co-ordination Office. The main topics discussed were the delivery of social houses Housing Delivery Action Plan targets for 2023 and 2024, Approved Housing Body Delivery following the CALF review, Affordable Homes, and Homelessness. The final meeting of the year is scheduled for November.



CAPITAL UPDATE - LA BUILD

Construction Contract signing, 13 September 2023, between Galway County Council and Finna Construction Ltd., for a new Housing Development at Ballymoe, Co. Galway.

Galway County Council is pleased to announce that a contract has been signed with Finna Construction Ltd. for the construction of 8 no. houses at Durrow & Ballaghymurry, Ballymoe,

In conjunction with, the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage (DHLGH), Galway County Council appointed a multi-disciplinary Design Team, led by Hassett Leyden Flynn Architects to assist with delivery of this housing development.

Planning was granted in July 2022 and following a competitive tendering process for construction Finna Construction Ltd. were deemed the Most Economically Advantageous Tenderer.

The development consists of 8 no. houses comprising; 2no. single storey two-bed houses, 6 no. two-storey two-bed houses and all ancillary site development works, including road enhancement works along the R360 Regional Road.

Cathaoirleach of Galway County Council Cllr. Liam Carroll, welcomed the signing of the contract, stating that it is great to see the Local Authority's own build programme progressing to deliver new high-quality, energy efficient social housing across the county.

Liam Conneally, Chief Executive of Galway County Council remarked that he was delighted with the number of housing projects which are being delivered by the Council with the support of the Department of Housing Local Government and Heritage under 'Housing for All', noting that it's particularly exciting to see a wide range of projects which will provide much needed homes for people in many rural towns and villages.

Acknowledging the hard work and dedication of the housing staff, Director of Services for Housing and Ukrainian Response, Michael Owens stated that the provision of 8 new homes in Ballymoe was a further example of the commitment by the local authority to deliver high quality homes for families and individuals, in their local communities where people want to live and where they will help sustain our local schools, shops, clubs and services."

New housing developments are being provided and the delivery pipeline for housing will deliver 1,717, new homes in County Galway under Housing for All by 2026.

The overall value of the project is in excess of €1.6m and is funded under the Government's 'Housing for All' Plan to 2030.' Completion is expected in Autumn 2024.

HOUSING ASSISTANCE PAYMENT

Housing Assistance Payment (HAP) is a social housing support that has been in operation in Galway County Council since November 2015. HAP is available to anyone with a confirmed social housing need.

HAP recipients can work full-time and retain their HAP support - thus removing a barrier to employment. HAP recipients source their own accommodation in the private rented market and enter into a tenancy agreement with the landlord of the property.

Those households eligible for HAP are:

- Any household that qualifies for social housing support;
- Any current Rent Supplement recipients who qualify for social housing support.

In order to further assist homeless households in exiting emergency accommodation, the Homeless Place Finder Service is also available in Galway County Council. It is a targeted support for homeless households who are finding it difficult to secure HAP tenancies. It provides additional financial and related supports to tenants and landlords.

There are a total of 1443 applicants receiving HAP support currently. 104 of these applicants are currently living outside Galway County Council's functional area. This facility is replicated throughout each Local Authority across the country whereby LAs are permitted to HAP their applicants outside their functional area. Galway County Council also have 9 applications currently being processed through the system. Table below shows Hap applications by year of submission. To get a true picture of the level of activity, you need to consider both the open and closed tables together.

The two tables below showing closed statistics. Both tables refer to closed applications, however the top table refers to the year the closed application was received, the 2nd table refers to the year they were closed.

DOMESTIC ABUSE REFUGE

Galway County Council continues to engage with the HSE in relation to the potential for the former St Brigid's Nurses Home, Ballinasloe to serve as a possible location for the development of a Domestic Abuse Refuge for the wider region.

In June 2023, the HSE advised that one of the HSE Services have also expressed an interest in the Former Nurses' Home in St. Brigid's, Ballinasloe. The Service will be undertaking their own review of this building, so there is a possibility that the Former Nurses' Home may not be included in the property assets identified as surplus to HSE's requirement for subsequent disposal.

Further to recent engagement, the HSE advised that as part of developing a disposal strategy, valuations will be completed for various plots and that this should be well progressed by year end.

Regarding the former Nurses Home site, the HSE suggested that a Property Transaction Application Form PTAF is completed and formally submitted on behalf of Galway County Council. This will assist in providing the clarity needed. A meeting with the HSE Estate Manager for the area is to be scheduled for late October/early November to facilitate the progression of the Property Transaction Application Form.

UKRAINIAN RESPONSE

OFFER A HOME PROGRAMME

Galway County Council continues to work on the Ukraine response with the administration of www.offerahome.ie programme. Under the 'Offer a Home' programme, local authorities are appealing for offers of houses, apartments, or holiday homes for use as temporary accommodation for those arriving from Ukraine. Ideally, properties would be available for at least six months. Property owners can offer homes at www.offerahome.ie or by contacting the local authority in which the property is located — dedicated contact details for each local authority are available at offerahome.ie. The local authority in which the property is located will be the point of contact for owners throughout the offer and assessment process. Owners can expect to be contacted by the local authority within 5 working days of making an offer and an assessment of the property is carried out shortly after.



The owner of the property is informed throughout the process and anybody who offers a property through the website can check the status of their offer at any stage through the site. Suitable properties are matched with Ukrainian beneficiaries with by our implementing partner IOM and provide support in agreeing licence agreement and other arrangements.

OFFER A HOME

Galway County Council is operating the Offer a Home programme – which is for offers of unoccupied homes.

To date there have been 89 offers to this programme.

- 31 have been allocated.
- 16 have been withdrawn from the programme.
- 8 are no longer available.
- 2 were assessed as not suitable.
- 21 are being progressed by our implementing partner IOM.
- 11 are currently being inspected.

Host Roadshow series aimed at providing support to existing hosts and information to those who are considering opening their homes to displaced Ukrainians.

A roadshow session in Galway is scheduled for the 25th of October at 7pm at the Oranmore
Lodge Hotel. Hosts/potential hosts can find all the event details here. These events are a
fantastic way to get together with community members, thank those who have been hosting
for a long time, support those who are newer to the experience, and recruit new hosts to take
up the baton as the need for accommodation continues.

INTERNATIONAL ORGANIZATION FOR MIGRATION (IOM)

Galway County Council's implementing partner is an organisation called the International Organization for Migration (IOM); it is the leading intergovernmental organization in the field of migration and is committed to the principle that humane and orderly migration benefits migrants and society. IOM is part of the United Nations system. As our implementing partner the IOM identify beneficiaries suitable for the properties that have been offered.

UKRAINIAN MODULAR HOMES PROGRAMME

As part of the State's humanitarian response to the Ukrainian crisis, the government is rolling out a rapid build housing programme to provide accommodation for families fleeing the war in Ukraine. The programme aims to provide short-term accommodation to Ukrainians at several sites across Ireland. While rapid build homes will initially be used to temporarily house people fleeing Ukraine, they have the potential to be utilised to address other accommodation challenges, including social housing and student accommodation.

A rapid build home is a high-quality dwelling that is mostly built off-site from the planned location and then delivered and finished on site. This means they can be put in place quicker than standard accommodation and there is less construction disruption to the area. The Office of Public Works (OPW), working with the Department of Children, Equality, Disability, Integration and Youth (DCEDIY), has responsibility for delivering the Programme.

A Galway County Council site at Pollboy, Ballinasloe is currently under active consideration by the OPW/DCEDIY for the provision of rapid build housing project to provide approx. modular homes. A briefing for the Ballinasloe MD was held in September and arrangements are being finalised for a public information event to be held in early November in Ballinasloe.



NRPO UPDATE

N59 MOYCULLEN BYPASS



The N59 Moycullen Bypass is currently under construction. The works are 95% complete and are due for substantial completion in November 2023.

ACTIVE TRAVEL PROGRAMME - ACTIVE TRAVEL FOOTPATH AND INFRASTRUCTURE PROJECTS

ACTIVE TRAVEL UPDATE

- The Athenry Local Transport Plan (LTP) is effectively complete and the final stages of the adoption of the LTP and LAP are in train. Preparation of Loughrea LTP has commenced in conjunction with the drafting of the Loughrea Local Area Plan. The Planning Section has indicated that the LAP will go on display prior to year-end. The preparation of the Gort LTP has also commenced and is expected to go on display together with the draft LAP in early 2024. Work has also commenced on a Galway East Metropolitan Area LTP plan to include a transport assessment for Oranmore and an ABTA for Briarhill. Our consultants Systra recently spent a day in Oranmore, reviewing existing traffic and transport arrangements and street layouts.
- Initial work has also commenced on the Community Transport Studies locations included are Headford, Kinvara, Clifden, Oughterard, Portumna, and Maigh Cuilinn.
- The NTA has approved an additional staffing allocation to Galway County Council in recognition of the strategic nature of the transportation planning work currently taking place.
 We look forward to this position, together with an existing vacancy, being filled as soon as possible.

STRATEGIC REGIONAL & LOCAL ROADS: ATHENRY NORTHERN RING ROAD

- In early October the Department of Transport approved the issuing of Notices to Treat on the Athenry Northern Ring Road Western Section. Negotiations and discussions with landowners are ongoing—including on the section towards the Monivea Road (where the DoT has given approval to acquire lands in advance).
- A new staff member (Executive Engineer) commenced work on this scheme on 2nd October. This is a dedicated resource specifically for this project and will help in the progression of the tender documents for construction. This position is funded by the DoT.



PILOT PROJECT BETWEEN GALWAY COUNTY COUNCIL AND DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORT TO INFORM THE NEW REVISED GUIDELINES FOR THE REHABILITAITON OF ROADS OVER PEAT



On 24th August 2023 the DoTSO ran a trial in Galway on how to complete a basic Ground Investigation using manual equipment.

- This was an ancillary piece in respect of the revision of the Guidelines for the Rehabilitation of Roads Over Peat (re-drafting is underway).
- The trial took place over the course of one day on the L-3210 in the Ballinasloe MD. This is a relatively strategic road linking Mountbellew to Ballyforan in Co. Roscommon (and on to Athlone).
- The role of GCC was to provide TM and to assist the DoT in the GI works, with the aim of proving the concept of manual GI works can be completed in reality on the ground.
- This road was mentioned in the original guidelines from the 1990s – which is why it was selected. And this particular road has been the subject of several major interventions in recent decades

at various locations; – digging out of peat, using tyres as an infill material and geotextile.



The equipment used:

- 1. Peat probe rods (measure depth of peat)
- 2. Handheld Shear Vane (indication of undrained shear strength)
- 3. Russian peat bore sampler (to take a sample of peat from the ground)
- 4. Sample container for cores (MCV testing will be completed in the lab)
- The DoTSO (DoT Support Office works out of Kildare CoCo)

recorded all results and will aim to build a ground model that

can be used to help design future RI works.

- We encountered depths of peat greater than 5m and in one of the photos you can see we encountered the old geotextile.
- The DoT was delighted with how the trial went, and the GI processes were videoed.

TIC - TAKEN IN CHARGE

The Taking in Charge section is small unit within the Roads Department.

For those not familiar with what is meant by the term Taking in Charge, this is where Developers/ Residents seek to have a completed private residential development taken in charge by the Council. In the case of developers, it may also include request return / release of Bond provided in accordance with grant of planning not just for residential estates but for other developments.

The Taking in Charge of a development is a formal legal process by which the responsibility for certain public areas, structures and services in a private residential development or estate are transferred to or are taken in charge by the local authority.

The Taking in Charge section arranges the taking in charge of residential estates and/or the release of bonds on various developments subject to the developments being in compliance with all grant(s) of planning permission and attached schedule of conditions. However, there are some residential developments currently excluded for taking in charge, namely: - Holiday Homes; Gated Communities; Developments with private on-site infrastructure such as wastewater treatment plants. This infrastructure provided by developers as part of the housing development and where such infrastructure cannot be connected to the public water and wastewater networks for which Uisce Eireann is now responsible.

The work within the Taking in Charge section includes interaction with a wide variety of clients such as those listed hereunder.

- Councillors and other Elected Representatives
- Residents; Resident Associations & Management Companies
- Developers and their Agents
- Bondholders and Receivers



- Contractors & other Service Providers
- Uisce Eireann & Internal Sections within the Council

The Taking in Charge section has a Programme of Works which comprises of Estates where the Bonds were claimed and/or relinquished to the Council. The taking in charge section arranges the remedial works for these estates bringing them to the required standard for taking in charge. The older/historical estates are funded through an allocation in the Council Estimates for which we are extremely grateful to the members for this funding.

The Taking in Charge target each year is to have 12 estates processed for Taking in Charge and/or Bond Release. Our progress to date is outlined in Table A hereunder. Since 2018, 12 Engineers (Executive & Assistant) were assigned to the Taking in Charge section.

In addition to the Taking in Charge Programme of Works, the work in the section is also driven each year by the following:

- Taking in Charge Applications from Developers/Agents for developments to be taken in charge and/or for bond release
- Taking in Charge Applications from Residents for older historical estates
- Enquiries from Financial Bodies/Bondholders for Bond Release on various developments
- Works funded through Residential Estates with Developer Provided Water Services Infrastructure - Multi-annual Developer Resolution Programme 2019 – 2021 – specifically for estates with private infrastructure on site.
- Planning Compliance for new developments in respect of Public Lighting; Areas for Taking in Charge and Management Companies.

For Residents and Members, there is a great sense of frustration as to the length of time it takes to have their estate taken in charge. With this consideration, I would like to outline the background



works undertaken by the Taking in Charge section that enables us to progress estates and bring them to required standard for taking in charge.

The following is a summary of the process undertaken for the Sli an Bhradain estate in Claregalway which was taken in charge in January 2023.

- Sli an Bhradain estate was subject of IBRC bond claim.
- Taking in Charge section commenced engagement with Receiver Special Liquidator in 2015
- The Estate was reviewed; CCTV Surveys of underground pipe network carried out & Cost Estimate prepared and submitted with Bond Claim
- Following evaluation of our claim, the Special Liquidator made a payment to the Council as an unsecured creditor of IBRC. Payment received in 2 installments – final monies received December 2018
- Residents were consulted regarding Remedial Works and Residents submitted Taking in Charge application in February 2022
- Taking in Charge section arranged to have the Remedial Works carried out in accordance with Procurement Guidelines and subject to available bond monies.
 - Works Tendered the Works;
 - o Contractor engaged subject to Insurance and Health & Safety requirements.
 - o Taking in Charge conducted site checks and sign-off on completion of work.
- Taking in Charge consulted with Uisce Eireann (formerly Irish Water); Local Area Engineer and Water Services and received agreement to proposed Taking in Charge prior to finalizing Taking in Charge report and recommendation.
- Taking in Charge recommendation for the estate.
- Formal commencement of the Taking in Charge process.
 - o CE Order for proposed Taking in Charge of estate.
 - Estate Advertised
 - Report to Elected Members of Athenry/Oranmore MD for consideration after latest date for submissions.
 - o Members agreed to take estate in charge at meeting held on 10th January 2023.
 - Minute of meeting received and circulated to all relevant parties.

Recent Taking in Charge projects highlight the growing legal complexities with bond claims for developments, wayleaves, Uisce Eireann - Site Resolutions Plans, transfer of common open space areas, bond claims, etc. When a visual inspection of estate is carried out, it may seem in order, it is the hidden works and legal requirements that seriously impedes our progress, coupled that with a high staff turnover.

The Taking in Charge section is currently finalizing works on an estate in Oranmore called Tudor Vale. Tudor Vale is one of our older historical estates with no bond funding available. The works on this estate is being funded jointly by Uisce Eireann and Galway County Council.

 Initial Meeting held with the Residents of Tudor Vale in 2015 wherein the taking in charge process was outlined, highlighting that the progress in having the estate taken in charge was subject to appropriate funding being available.

With this consideration, the Residents to advance their Taking in Charge application, funded and submitted the CCTV surveys. Formal Application received in March 2018.



- The CCTV surveys confirmed that the network crossed into private property and wayleaves were required.
- The Taking in Charge section prepared the wayleave maps and documentation for issue to relevant parties 14 No. Wayleaves
- The Taking in Charge section also made a submission to Uisce Eireann (formerly Irish Water) for funding under the Site Resolution Scheme.
- Uisce Eireann agreed the Site Resolution Plan agreed allocating €50,000 for water and foul sewer repairs.
- Galway County Council is funding the remaining works on the estate.

The Works were tendered and the contract for the remedial works awarded to John Madden & Sons Limited. Works commenced on the estate in September 2023 and are currently nearing completion. Final reports to be prepared and sign off with Uisce Eireann. After which the Formal Taking in Process to commence.

WATER SERVICES

Process proving commenced at Spiddal WWTP on 6th September. Still on-going. Results to date from the plant have been well within compliance limits. Coffey Water Ltd. will operate the plant for 11 more months once fully commissioned. Caretaker and area operational training is due to commence over the coming weeks.

Ahascragh WWTP will commence process proving in the coming weeks. There has been an issue with some bulging in the GRP primary and final settlement tanks, so some remediation works are being carried out here. Full commissioning can't proceed until this work is complete. It will follow the same process as the Spiddal plant once the remedial works are complete.

Kilrickle & Kilcooley GWS Capital Project: The TK Earthworks, has installed 73% (30.3km) of the water mains on this project of 41.5km. The pipelaying process is by directional drilling and is proving to be a fast method of installation with less impact on the road pavement than conventional open cut method. Customers are not yet receiving water because pressure reducing valves will have to be installed which will be done in the next 6 weeks. Following mains disinfection customers will be able to connect to the meter boxes at their front boundaries. All works are currently in the Kilrickle GWS area with pipelaying progressing towards Mullagh Cross. Work to reinstate the Kilcooley network is expected to commence in November 2023.

All pipe laying is expected to be completed by mid Q1, 2024 with final completion expected in early Q2, 2024.

WINTER SERVICES PLAN

BACKGROUND

The Winter Service period for 2023-2024 will extend from the week commencing 16th October 2023 to the week ending 28th April 2024. An updated Winter Service Plan has been prepared and this forms the basis for the service which will be delivered by Galway County Council over the relevant timeframe.



Winter maintenance on national roads is carried out by Galway County Council on behalf of the TII and is funded by the TII. Winter maintenance on local and regional roads is funded by a combination of the Discretionary Maintenance Grant and the Local Authorities own funds.

ROUTES COVERED

The routes treated are categorised according to strategic importance as set out below.

Priority 1 routes consist of Motorway, dual carriage way, national primary and secondary routes and include a number of sections of strategic regional route network. These routes are ordinarily treated and receive precautionary treatment. Every effort will be made to ensure that these routes are treated by 8.00 am in the morning.

Priority 2 routes are the strategically important regional roads not included in Priority 1 and local routes. These routes are ordinarily treated and receive precautionary treatment. Every effort will be made to ensure that these routes are treated by 8.00 am in the morning.

Priority 3 routes are other local roads. These routes do not receive precautionary treatment but will be considered for treatment by the Duty Engineer once priority 1 & 2 routes are addressed and as resources allow at that time.

Priority 4 routes are other local roads and footpaths and will not be considered for treatment except in severe or prolonged winter weather and then only when resources are available.

Between P1, P2 and P3 routes, 1,140 km of road length is covered. That breaks down into 18km National Primary, 282km National Secondary and 840km Regional and Local Road.

P1 routes account for 499km of the road length treated. P2 routes 175km, and P3 routes 554km.

SERVICE DELIVERY

The decision on when and where to treat is made by the Duty Engineer based on the prevailing data and in accordance with the Winter Service Plan directions in this regard. The decision is communicated to the drivers on the various routes. There are ten P1 and P2 routes in total and all of these are looked after by Galway County Council vehicles and drivers. Of the five P3 routes, two are similarly serviced by Galway County Council directly with a further three the responsibility of private contractors.

Salt is stored in four separate locations. At salt barns in Tuam, Loughrea and Gort and in the Machinery Yard. This ensures an adequate supply in reasonable proximity to all routes.

BALAMI FUNDED PIER & HARBOUR PROJECTS

Total funding approval of €1,225,975 across 2022 and 2023 has been received for works to Piers and Harbours in the Galway County Council functional area from the Brexit Adjustment Local Authority Marine Infrastructure Scheme (BALAMI). Matched funding at 5% of the works value is provided from Galway County Council's own budget to bring the total provision to €1,290,500.

The table below identifies the location of the works, the grant funding provided and the total cost.

Works at all locations have been completed ahead of the funding drawdown deadline in November 2023.

The most significant of the projects included the construction of a storm wall at Bealcarra Pier, the installation of pontoons at Kilronan, Inis Mór, and the stabilisation of Blackweir Pier. It is hoped to replicate the installation of pontoons at other suitable piers, on a phased basis dependant on funding, in the coming years.



FIRE & EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

OPERATIONS

Galway Fire and Rescue Service responded to 140 incidents in the Month of September, consisting of 39 Fie Incidents, 97 Special Service incidents (Road Traffic Collisions (RTC's), Automatic Fire Alarms (AFA's), Ambulance Assists, etc. The full-time station in Galway City had an average turnout time of just under 2 minutes to all incidents and the retained stations in the County had average turnout times ranging from 4.45 minutes in Carraroe to 9.5 minutes in Tuam. The variation in turnout times in County stations is dictated by the time of day of the incidents and the urban nature of some of the stations and traffic congestion associated with same.

CAPITAL PROJECTS

ATHENRY FIRE STATION

The construction of the New Fire Station in Athenry is progressing at pace with the steel frame full erected and the building due to be watertight in the next number of days. Claims have been made to the NDFEM for drawdown of funding spent to date.

PRESENTATION 1916 COMMEMORATION MEDAL.

On Friday 13th October a presentation ceremony for the 1916 Commemoration Medal was held in Clifden Fire Station. The medals were presented to all members serving in Clifden Fire Brigade (some now retired) in the year 2016. While it is some years after the medals were received by the Fire Authority, the members in Clifden wanted to wait until after the COVID-19 pandemic to formally present the medals.

The ceremony was attended by some of the local Councillors, the Director of Service (DOS) for Operations and Infrastructure, the Chief Fire Officer (CFO), the current serving and retired members of the brigade in 2016 and their family members. The medals were presented by Councillor Gerry King.

In their speeches, the Cllr King, the DOS Mr Derek Pender and the Chief Fire Officer Mr Gerry O'Malley all recognised the dedication and commitment to the community of Clifden and surrounding areas of the personnel of Clifden Fire Brigade. This was further acknowledged by Mr O'Malley by virtue of the fact that many of the fire fighters in the brigade are also members of the RNLI. The evening was a great success and was enjoyed by all.

LOUGHREA TOWN HALL:

The Fire Safety Certification and the Disability Access Certifications have been received.

The revised cost plan and Bill of Quantities are due to be received in Regen in the coming weeks with a view to publishing the Tender Docs in November 2023.



TUAM

The Regen Team is reviewing the proposed submission for funding under CAT 1 RRDF for Tuam Town Hall. In anticipation of this call, which is expected before year end, the Architectural staff of the Regen team are advancing detailed conceptual drawings for the Shambles. This development was favorably received by Tuam MD Councillors at a meeting with the TRO in the past weeks.



CLIFDEN



The Planning package for the Public Realm for the Town Centre, the Community Park and Beach Road is due to be submitted to the Regen Team of Galway County Council by the end of October. This will lead to the milestone of submission to An Bord Pleanala as forecasted in Q4, 2023.

The impact of the proposals for the public realm on the existing Beacon installation on Market Square was the subject of positive discussions between Sharon O Grady, Arts Officer, Declan Breen, original commissioned Artist, Regen Team, and LUC consultants. This collaboration will continue through the development process.

Destination Towns projects are advancing through the procurement phase in consultation with Fáilte Ireland. Works are expected to commence on these works when successful tendering processes have been completed.

THE BEACON – MARKET SQUARE, CLIFDEN

PORTUMNA COURTHOUSE

Galway County Councils Regeneration Team have advertised on e-tenders for suitable contractors to undertake proposed works at Portumna Courthouse, consisting of:

- Change of use from former courthouse and living quarters to office and exhibition / event spaces.
- Demolition of a single storey annex to the side and rear of the courthouse.
- Demolition of internal elements to provide new exhibition / event spaces, first floor walkway and ancillary accommodation.
- Repair and replacement of timber sash windows, rainwater goods and repointing of stonework.
- New single storey extension to facilitate a cafe / ancillary office space.
- New entrance and the formation of a patio space adjacent to the public footpath and to the rear courtyard.
- Alterations to site works to include new security gates, boundary treatments, landscaping and connections to public sewer.
- New signage and external uplighters.

Closing date for receipt of tenders is 13th October 2023.

Fire Safety and Disability Access Certificate applications for the works were lodged mid-September.







PORTUMNA PUBLIC REALM

A vision that will be pivotal in shaping the future of Portumna town will go on public display for the first time at an upcoming public engagement evening. Tuesday, October 24th will see Galway County Council display a draft masterplan for the town centre public realm following detailed consideration of public feedback over the past 12 months. The public consultation will take place from 6pm to 9pm at the Irish Workhouse Centre, St. Brigid's Road, H53 EK74. Representatives of the Galway County Council Design Team will be on hand to take members of the public through the scheme design, which will include potential opportunities for a town centre that has undoubted transformational potential, having been recently designated a key destination hub with Irelands Hidden Heartlands. A press release and further communications will issue next week. The public consultation pack will issue to elected members in advance.

GORT

The Town regeneration Officer has reviewed the Environmental Screening reports submitted by BDP for the Town Centre First (TCF) plan for Gort. The plan, in its closing stages of completion, has been sent to prescribed bodies for review and comment with an expectation to have a formal launch of the final plan in November. The public realm project is in its final stages of detailed design in preparation for the submission of a planning application in quarter 4 of 2023. Environmental Reports and pre planning pack are due to be with the Regen Team prior to the end of October.

Meetings are taking place between Regen, Infrastructure and Operations and Forward Planning facilitating synergies between Gort Public Realm, Gort LAP and Gort LTP.

URDF CALL 3 - TUAM, BALLINASLOE, ORANMORE

Cross Directorate meetings have been held between Regen, Forward Planning, Housing and Environment to garner historical and current data on the properties identified in the successful bid for the rolling funding under URDF Call 3. This collaboration between sections will be supported with further searches, identifying ownership of the vacant and derelict properties which will be brought to the market in line with the scheme objectives.

The Environmental screening reports required for the Public Realm Part 8 application are due to issue to Regen on October 13th ,2023. It is anticipated that the Newspaper publication date for the Part 8 will be the 27th of October.

HERITAGE

FÉILE NA GCLOCH, INIS OÍRR



Féile na gCloch held on Inis Oírr, has concluded its most successful year to date. The festival, themed "Hands Across Europe," brought together drystone walling enthusiasts, skilled artisans, and cultural dignitaries from across the continent. Inis Oírr was abuzz with vibrant activities, informative lectures, and engaging workshops that celebrated the art of drystone walling and showcased sustainable practices.



This year Cllr Liam Carroll, Cathaoirleach of the County of Galway welcomed attendees and crafts people from various parts of Ireland, fourteen European countries, the United States of America, Canada, Japan, England, Scotland, Wales and The Princes Foundation.





The festival was a true celebration of all things stonerelated, offering participants the opportunity to engage in a wide range of activities. From lectures on the techniques and sustainable use of drystone walls to stone carving and stone lettering workshops, participants were able to hone their skills and deepen their understanding of traditional craftsmanship. The festival also provided hot lime mortar demonstration, where attendees witnessed the process of using this versatile material in construction, ensuring the preservation of the island's rich architectural heritage.

Renowned instructors Tom Little, Aileen Anne Brannigan, and Nettie Emerson led stone carving and letter carving workshops, providing participants of all skill levels - from beginners to advanced practitioners - with a unique opportunity to learn, improve, and share their craft.

The construction of the 40-meter international drystone wall stands as a testament to the dedication and craftsmanship exhibited during the Féile na gCloch Inis Oírr stone festival. Led by highly skilled instructors from Ireland and the EU, participants were able to learn and collaborate in this hands-on experience. The wall represents a harmonious blend of techniques, ideas, and cultural influences, creating a stunning display of drystone walling artistry.



The use of hotlime mortar is another testament to the versatility of stone. Properly prepared, hotlime mortar ensures the longevity of structures while maintaining the authenticity and character of the stonework. It is a craft that requires precision and knowledge, and those who have mastered it such as Eoin Madigan are truly remarkable. Eoin shared his skills with a large number of participants over the weekend.



Another highlight of Féile na gCloch was the sketching sessions around the island, allowing artists and enthusiasts to

capture the essence of the island and its unique stonework through their artistic interpretations. These 'Craggy Island' Sketch outs were lead by artists James Moore and Jessica Peel - Yates. The breathtaking landscapes and historic structures served as inspiration for both seasoned artists and budding creatives.

Adding to the prestige of the festival, Féile na gCloch welcomed esteemed guests, including the Cathaoirleach of the County Galway, Cllr Liam Carroll, Chief Executive Liam Conneally, Liam Hanrahan, Director of Services – Economic Development & Planning and Alan Farrell, Director of Services Community & Rural Development and Corporate Services & Athenry Municipal District.







This year's Féile na gCloch exceeded expectations, showcasing the enthusiasm and dedication to preserving our heritage through the art of drystone walling. It was an honour to bring together talented artisans, experts, and enthusiasts from across Europe, creating an unparalleled atmosphere of learning and cultural exchange.





2023 marks the 20th Anniversary of the establishment of the UNESCO 2003 Convention for the Safeguarding of the Intangible Cultural Heritage. The Art of dry stone walling, knowledge and techniques was officially inscribed on the UNESCO Representative List of the Intangible Cultural Heritage of Humanity in 2018. Croatia, Cyprus, France, Greece, Italy, Slovenia, Spain and Switzerland were included in this initial inscription. In March 2023 an application was submitted to UNESCO seeking to add Ireland, Austria, Andorra, Belgium and Luxembourg to the inscription. UNESCO's decision on this application is expected in December 2024.

Cllr Liam Carroll, Cathaoirleach of County the of Galway formally launch a tri-lingual exhibition and booklet entitled "Hands across Europe: Lámha trasna na hEorpa". The exhibition and booklet celebrate the craftsmanship, heritage, and the timeless beauty of stonework that is



Andorra, Austria, Belgium, Croatia, Cyprus, France, Greece, Ireland, Luxemburg, Slovenia and Spain. It seeks to showcase the rich traditional artistry of drystone wall building that can be found throughout Europe. It is hoped that this exhibition will travel to other parts of Ireland and Europe and that it will assist in the exchange of knowledge and skills, while also celebrating cultural heritage among the drystone walling communities of Europe.

Galway County Council picked up one of the main accolades at the Public Sector Digital Transformation Awards 2023 for its innovative digital project that mapped over 40,000 graveyard memorial records across County Galway and made them publicly available online.

The Digital Mapping of Graveyards Project was named overall winner of the 'Best Community Engagement' category of the competition at a ceremony held in Dublin's Shelbourne Hotel last night

(Thursday).

Organised by The Sunday Business Post, the awards recognise the achievements of public sector organisations that have made significant contributions to advancing digital transformation across Ireland. Galway County Council beat off competition from а shortlist of organisations that included Dublin City Council in partnership with Trinity College Dublin, CAWT and Aurion Learning, Longford County Council and Tipperary County Council to win the top award.



Working with and supported by Galway Rural Development, Forum Connemara, The Heritage Council, The National Monuments Service and Galway County Community Archaeology Service, Galway County Council provided funding to local groups to employ experts to train local communities to use mobile



technology and to undertake drone mapping of graveyards resulting in a public release of 40,000 records from across the county via the Local Authority's Open Data Portal.

ClIr. Liam Carroll, Cathaoirleach of Galway County Council, said, "The success of the Digital Mapping of Graveyards Project has been years in the making and is the result of forensic research and cutting-edge surveying work by the Local Authority's Heritage department and local communities across Galway. This has resulted in a body of work that will be of benefit to the diaspora and academia at home and abroad for years to come."

Liam Conneally, Chief Executive of Galway County Council, commented, "In congratulating everybody involved, I wish to emphasise the significance of the award win for the future development of this innovative project and similar digital projects that seek to record, preserve and share details of Galway heritage for the benefit of future generations. In an effort to digitalise our services Galway County Council has begun the preparation of a Council Digital Strategy and im happy to say this is the first instalment of this progress. I am delighted to confirm that it is proposed to transfer and update more memorial records and to map graveyards and record further memorial inscriptions in the coming months and years."

Liam Hanrahan, Director of Services, Economic Development and Planning, Galway County Council, said the award win is testament to the ambition of everyone involved in the development of the project.

"The project is a collaborative effort between the staff of Galway County Council, state agencies and local community groups who have invested considerable time, ingenuity and due diligence into producing an invaluable public resource," he said.

Eileen Ruane, Director of Services, Human Resources, Environment, It and Digital Transformation, Galway County Council, stated, "Galway County Council, through its GIS team, has identified the capability of advanced technology to record Galway's rich heritage in a way that makes it accessible to a much wider audience, as well as providing a valuable resource for researchers and academia. We are immensely proud of our achievement and look forward to developing existing and new projects into the future."

According to Marie Mannion, Heritage Officer for Galway County Council, "The aim of the project is to support our diaspora and communities to connect with their past by unlocking valuable graveyard information and making it available as open-source data that is free to use. We are delighted with the positive reaction we have received to making the records publicly available online and this national award will inspire us to further expand the project and develop similar heritage-based digital projects."

As part of the project, Connemara West mapped seven graveyards in Ballinakill Parish, Renvyle, Tooreena, Salrock, Letterfrack Boys Cemetery, Banogues, St Thomas and Ballinakill.

Janet O'Toole of Connemara West said, "The project's success is the result of dedicated volunteers giving over their time, and expert guidance delivered by the County Heritage Officer, Marie Mannion with her team in the County Council."

She continued, "We have mapped seven graveyards in this area, and they are now part of this bigger project from the local authority. It's online and anybody can enter their surname to find where their ancestors are buried."



Outlining the background to the project, Barry Doyle, Geographic Information System (GIS) project lead for Galway County Council, said, "We have been working with various community groups and organisations to collect and collating valuable data relating to those who are buried in various graveyards for several years. Galway County Council, with funding from the Heritage Council, the Open Data Engagement Fund and its own resources developed and made available a mobile app specifically for use by surveyors at the local level for memorial surveys, along with associated data management and validation processes. This technology, along with drone technology, was made available to local community groups to expand the number of graveyards in the project resulting in the 40,000 records that are now publicly available."

Digitally mapping the past

■ High-tech analysis of Connemara's cemeteries allows descendants trace their roots

DIGITAL maps of seven Connemara graveyards were officially launched this week, offering the key to unlock the past for the residents and diaspora of Ballinakili Parish.

The project, which involved hundreds of hours of volunteer work, got underway in Covid as part of community develop ment agency Connemara West's 50th anniversary celebrations.

And after two years of record ing headstone inscriptions, dig Ital maps of the seven grave yards in Ballinakill Parish an now available on Galway County Council's dedicated graveyard heritage website.

Janet O'Toole of Connemara
West said the launch of the digitised maps was the result of
dedicated volunteers giving
over their time, and experi guidance delivered by the
County Heritage Officer, Maris
Mannion with her team in the
County Council.

While there are many graves that are unmarked by a headstone, Ms O'Toole said by launching the digital maps this week, they hope some of those gaps may be filled in.

"At this stage of the projec Connemara West is holding number of open days in the Connemara West Centre whe the mane will be available. I or people's knowledge and expertise is an essential component of the project and could help identify unknown graves," she said, adding that the maps would be available in Letterfrack daily until October 28 for receptor could in antivier.

people to call in and view. Ms O'Toole said as Connemara West's 50th year came around during Covid, they were looking for a way to mark the occasion and graveyard mapping offered the perfect "Covid project".

As wen as providing a window into the heritage of Ballinakili, it was a practical project during Covid restrictions as the work of gathering information could be done in the great outdoors.

"When we launched it, we knew it was something people in the area would be interested in. We had three talks on Zoom and around 120 people turned up to each one of them.

gather the information from the headstones. We had some volunteers that were treating it like nearly a full-time job and others who were interested and helped out when they could," said Ms O'Toole. "There was just great enthu-

There was just great enumsiasm for it - people were out in graveyards in rain, hail or shine, dealing with midges and horseflies and trying to get through the ferns to gather the information we needed," she contin-

O'Toole said it will offer a useful resource on a number of levels. "On a very simple level, a person in Australia could look at a grandparent's grave back







CLEAN TO EUROPEAN NORMS

A great result for Loughrea and significantly improved on IBAL Marine 2022 when there was a very definite litter presence. The built environment was freshly presented e.g., car park area, bicycle parking, 'PEL' style pedal bins and regular bins, dog fouling 'mutt mitt' and associated disposal facility, seating, picnic tables, visitor information noticeboards, lifebelts etc. were all in very good order. Visitors are provided with the opportunity for a 'water refill' just beside the facility and to 'separate' their waste into plastics / tins and cans / paper and cardboard. There was a virtual absence of litter throughout the parking, access, and promenade area.



Littered



This 'Special Area of Conversation' is beautifully scenic with extensive white sandy beaches. Approach and signage at the small car parking area were in good condition. While there does appear to be maintenance / management associated with the beach, it was the marine related litter which really brought down the litter grade - the majority of this was at the high tide line e.g., fishing line, net, rope, crates, buoys etc. The area wasn't immune to food related items either e.g., coffee cups, plastic bottles, sweet wrappers. Non-food items included car parts, dog fouling and cigarette butts.

IN RELATION TO DOG'S BAY A REPORT FROM THE LOCAL COMMUNITY WARDEN STATES:

"From time-to-time members of the public gather rubbish and leave it at the side of the concrete slip at the entrance to Dogs Bay beach. I collect it when I do a routine inspection and we collect it when we get informed there is rubbish there.

Connemara Forum has a person working on the beach for 5 days working 19.5 hours over the week.



They do trojan work. I spoke to the supervisor for Connemara Forum, and I was told they will put a second person on the beach in the coming weeks. (SEE PICTURE OF VAN ABOVE).

In my experience, some beaches are spotless while others are littered. The reasons been, the shape of the beach, wind direction, movements of sea currents and popularity of the beach."

Also new signage has been erected at the beach, as above, and it is planned to run a beach awareness day in 2024 in this area. (As above)

UPDATE RE USE OF CCTV AND OTHER RECORDING DEVICES IN THE PREVENTION, DETECTION AND PROSECUTION OF LITTERING AND WASTE OFFENCES.

The CCMA convened working group has completed the required three Codes of Practice and accompanying DPIAs for (i) the use of CCTV, and (ii) the use of Mobile Recording Devices (MRDs), for the prevention, detection and prosecution of offences under the Waste Management Act, 1996, and (iii) the use of CCTV for the prevention, detection and prosecution of offences under the Litter Pollution Act, 1997 as amended by the Circular Economy and Miscellaneous Provisions Act 2022.

The DPIAs and CoPs were submitted in late July to the following bodies as part of the statutorily required consultation process detailed in Section 22 and 33 of the Circular Economy and Miscellaneous Provisions Act 2022,

- The Minister for Environment, Climate and Communications
- The Minister for Housing, Local Government and Heritage
- The Minister for Justice
- The Data Protection Commission

Comments and observations have been received from the following:

- Department of the Environment and Climate Change
- DPC
- Department of Housing, Local Government & Heritage
- Department of Justice (partial)

The LGMA is awaiting a full response from the DOJ and from the two representative Bodies for Elected Members who were provided with copies of the Codes of Practice.

LOCAL AUTHORITY NATIONAL AGRICULTURAL INSPECTIONS WORKSHOP



An EPA workshop was held on the 12th of September in the Midlands Park Hotel, Portlaoise and was attended by GCC environment staff. The workshop included presentations on all work in relation to agricultural inspections carried out by local authorities across the country in 2022, including case studies of enforcement activities. The lack of improvement in river and lake water quality was discussed and the need for more local authority

inspections emphasized. Funding has been allocated for 17 positions for LAs across the country for roles to focus solely on agricultural inspections. Galway County Council did not receive funding for a position as it does not have enough water bodies at risk of not meeting quality objectives. It is hoped that more positions will be funded next year, and that Galway County Council will have someone in place to focus on this work.

LAWPRO WESTERN REGIONAL OPERATIONAL COMMITTEE MEETING

The 3rd meeting of the LAWPRO Regional Western Operational Committee was held in Roscommon County Council main buildings on the 4th of September. Staff from LAWPRO, Local Authorities, Teagasc, NPWS, Inland Fisheries, Coillte, EPA and the National Group Water Scheme Federation attended. Progress with implementation of the River Basin Management Plan was outlined by each organization. Noel Meehan, Programme Manager with Teagasc presented on the roll out of European Innovation Partnership funding for water quality improvement measures on farms. This is vital work needed to reverse water quality trends in rivers and lakes.

CLEAN-UP OF FAHY GARDENS










The pre-draft on-line consultation to inform the Climate Action Plan completed September. We received 177 submissions from individuals and submissions from a groups number of including The Heritage Council, LAWPRO, National Federation of

Group Water Schemes, Science Foundation Ireland, and youth organisations.

Respondents were very supportive of the inclusion of ambitious targets and timelines in the plan. The top priorities for ongoing focus were Education and Awareness, Renewable Energy, Water Protection and Energy Efficiency.





A Baseline Emissions Inventory for the Aran Islands Decarbonisation Zone was completed and the SEA/AA screening process for the Climate Action Plan has commenced.



In conjunction with the Comharchumann Fuinnimh Oileáin Árann, a workshop was held with representatives



from the community and businesses on Inis Mór on the 11th of October to identify actions for the Decarbonisation Zone. Workshops were also held with the Infrastructure and Operations Department and the Climate and Biodiversity SPC.

students will build full-scale fully functional public space infrastructure to demonstrate carbon negative circular design and how FSC certified Conservation Timber can be used in Galway County urban regeneration projects. Conservation Timber is wood harvested from well-managed natural forests at below replacement rates that support community livelihoods and prevents deforestation. As part of the project, we are working with the Cities4Forests' Partner Forest Program and Greenville Consulting to develop a comprehensive sustainable wood procurement policy for the council.

FINANCE & MOTOR TAX

Unfunded Capital Projects, as with Funded Capital Projects, are reported in the Balance Sheet of the Annual Financial Statements.

Funding for such Capital Projects comes from various resources, to include:

- 1. Development contributions where applicable.
- 2. Government grants.
- 3. Sale of assets/lands.
- 4. Budget provisions in the revenue account; and
- 5. Draw down a long-term loan to be funded from the revenue budget.

The requirement to address the unfunded capital payments is under continuous review and once the Council is in a financial position to fund such projects they will be addressed as a matter of priority. There is an overdraft facility to accommodate cashflow in the event of a number of large capital payments being made and drawn on the bank account at the same time. The overdraft sanction is specific to a financial year, a new sanction is required for each year, and members approval is required for same. Following this the Minister issues the sanction, and this is lodged with Bank of Ireland.

BALLINASLOE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT UPDATE

ROADWORKS PROGRAMME

During August and September, a significant portion of the roadworks programme was completed, both restoration maintenance (RM) (surface dressing) and restoration improvement (RI) (strengthening/overlay). 100% of the RM grant funded roadworks were completed by mid-September. 90% of the RI roads are completed, with the remaining SMA (Stone Mastic Asphalt) projects scheduled



for October. It is worth noting, that during July 2023, roadworks were delayed on several occasions due to the poor weather conditions, and that this along with contractor availability has caused the programme to be pushed later into the year.



Footpath construction works are ongoing at Cloonreleagh, on the N63 - Moylough Road, Mountbellew. These works include provision of approximately 600m of accessible footpath, improvements to drainage and public lighting, and are expected to be fully complete in Q4 2023.

NTA Active Travel footpath works are ongoing at Beechlawn Phase 2. Initial drainage and accommodation works have been completed successfully and the project design review has now been approved by the NTA. Works at this location have resumed and are expected to be completed by December 2023.

A review has been undertaken by Galway County Council engineering and Health & Safety staff on both the existing Derrymullan flood defense measures, and the overall Ballinasloe flood defense plan. Engagement meetings with the OPW, Bord na Mona, Consulting and Local Authority engineers have been undertaken on Clonfert OPW Minor Works Flood Relief Scheme. Discussions are ongoing to agree on a final design and to begin engagement with landowners.



CURRENT WORKS STATUS

RI FUNDING

The 2023 Restoration Improvement programme is 88% complete to date with 100% of the Galway County Council Direct Labour schemes completed.

Pictures below show completed section of Overlay along the R332 earlier this month. Over the past 5 years the Tuam MD has overlaid from the Kilconly GAA pitch to the turn off the R332 to Kilconly Village (5km). This section of pavement was previously in poor condition with the recent works making a huge improvement for road users. This section will tie in with the Kilbannon Scheme on the R328 and when complete the entire R332 from Tuam to the County Boundary at Foxhall will have been overlayed with DBM and surface dressed. This has been one of the largest overlay schemes in the Tuam MD in recent years.

Over the past 10 years, cold in-situ recycling has become large part of the Tuam MD roads programme for rehabilitation of local and regional roads. The process consists of mixing a bitumen

emulsion with the recycled material from the existing pavement, in situ, to create a new cold-mix asphalt layer. From an environmental point of view Tuam MD is reducing the use of valuable resources, i.e., bitumen and aggregates as well as REDUCING the carbon footprint and REDUCING CO2 EMISSIONS through road RECYCLING.
