



# LOCAL COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE (LCDC)

- The closing date for receipt of Tenders for SICAP 2024-2028 was 8<sup>th</sup> September, and tenders are currently being evaluated for Lot 27-1 (East Galway), Lot 27-2 (West Galway) and Lot 27-3 (Galway Islands), with a total framework value of over €14m. This process will continue until year-end when the winning tenderer(s) will be announced.
- Work is also continuing to finalise the Socio-Economic Statement for the LECP which will then proceed to public consultation.
- Contacts are being made with all groups who received funding under the Community Recognition Fund in light of the deadline for drawdown of Year 1 Funding which is 6<sup>th</sup> October, at which stage Galway County Council are required to drawdown 60% of the total Fund.
- The deadline for drawdown of Community Support Fund / Community Enhancement Funding has now passed, and all groups have been contacted to ensure full drawdown of available funding to the County.
- The Healthy Ireland Coordinator attended Pobals Event on 'Enhancing Social Inclusion in 2023' in the Ardillaun Hotel, Galway on 6<sup>th</sup> September. The focus of the day was on Pobal, Government and communities in the Galway region working together to create an inclusive society.
- Healthy Galway County attended a 'Women's Health Event' hosted by Solas Family Resource Centre, Headford on 11<sup>th</sup> September where Healthy Galway County shared resources and promoted health and wellbeing initiatives both locally and nationally.
- Healthy Galway County and Galway Rural Development have been shortlisted for a National Age Friendly Award for their project "Healthy Islands". This was a series of health and wellbeing events on the 4 offshore islands, where over 20 agencies were coordinated to provide a series of health and wellbeing days aimed at breaking down the barriers to accessing services and information on the islands. A key aim of the roadshow was to form new relationships, and strengthen existing relationships, with the people and groups/organisations on the islands, to identify future projects to address the specific health and wellbeing needs of each individual island. A local judging process is due to be held in early October with the national awards ceremony in November.
- The Community Section has collaborated with the Heritage & Biodiversity Officers, and the PPN, to part-fund courses on the Sustainable Development Goals for Tidy Towns Groups, to coincide with Sustainable Development Goals Week. Tidy Towns Groups are required to identify which SDG's their Tidy Towns projects relate to when completing their annual Entry Form to the National Tidy Towns Competition, and therefore, this course will be of immense benefit to them in continuing their very valuable work in communities.
- The Community Section is currently liaising with the Environment Department regarding the establishing of an online grants system to administer small-scale grants which require a large amount of administration. It is hoped that this system may be in place to roll-out either the Community Support Schemes or Community Enhancement Programme for 2024 by year-end.
- Following on from the successful roll-out of the Property Marking Machine purchased by the Elected Members, the Community Section has collaborated with Men's Sheds to secure the purchase of an additional Property Marking Machine which will be rolled out in the East of the County. Property Marking Ireland carried out training on the use of the machine with



representatives of Men's Sheds from Clarenbridge, Athenry, Ballygar, Headford, Loughrea & Oranmore on 9<sup>th</sup> September. This is the first property marking machine in the country to be rolled out through the Men's Sheds Association, and demonstrates the huge community value of Men's Sheds, and their willingness to become involved in all types of community initiatives and projects for the benefit of their communities. Community Gardai from all of the relevant areas and Michael Walsh, Crime Prevention Officer, were also in attendance on the day.

### **SOCIAL INCLUSION**

- Galway County Council is collaborating with Galway City Council, COPE Galway, Galway Rural Development, and Galway City Partnership, to again deliver a series of events during Positive Ageing Week which takes place from 1<sup>st</sup> to 7<sup>th</sup> October. Our flagship event is again a Local Heroes Exhibition which will showcase 30 people who epitomize positive and healthy ageing. The exhibition for Galway East will be held in Ballinasloe Library, and the exhibition for Galway West will be held in Oughterard Courthouse both will culminate in events to present the recipients with a souvenir brochure of their professional photo & biography. Many other local events are taking place across the County in libraries and community settings to celebrate positive ageing and the PPN will collate a full list of events for circulation.
- Galway City & County Council have been sitting on a Working Group with a range of HSE Professionals to develop a Directory of Services for Older People which will include information on accessing services and initiatives across a range of areas such as health, housing, social welfare entitlements, wellbeing, safety & security. It is intended to launch the Directory at the AGM of the Older People's Council in November 2023 the Older People's Councils in City & County have been centrally involved in the development of the material by reviewing all the chapters as they are completed, thereby ensuring that the voice of the older person is central to its development.

### PUBLIC PARTICIPATION NETWORK (PPN)

PPN membership now stands at 1,250 member groups spread across three pillars; Community & Voluntary, Social Inclusion and Environmental.



### **ACTING AS AN INFORMATION HUB:**

- The PPN sent out 1 Monthly Newsletter along with 9 mass emails to all 1,250 Member Groups.
- Regular updates across the PPN's social media accounts (Facebook and Twitter) and updates from various other shareholders shared via email.
- The PPN answered numerous queries in relation to funding, advice on setting up groups, insurance options for community groups, via phone calls, website and emails.
- The PPN Website was updated regularly with funding announcements, news from Government Departments, resources for groups and local/ national events.

### **BUILDING CAPACITY:**

- The PPN collaborated with LAWPRO to organise an event 'Who's Who in the Corrib'. This
  event brought together various groups from the area with an aim to setting up a River's
  Trust.
- The PPN ran an insurance webinar for member groups. The webinar provided an in-depth session on the types of insurance available to community groups with advice from an expert from BHP.
- The Galway County Energy Master Plan Steering Committee met for a progress update with consultants running the project.
- The PPN organised training on the Sustainable Development Goals tailored towards Tidy Towns groups to run as part of SDG week 2023.

## CREATIVE TEAM PROJECTS

The Creative Team of Galway County Council have assigned funding to support a number of projects. As the team is inter-disciplinary, these projects are varied in their scope and subject matter.



### AROUND THE HOUSE AND MIND THE DRESSER



This project is managed by the Libraries. The aim of Around the House and Mind the Dresser (working title) is to highlight the rich musical and song writing traditions of North and South Galway; to explore the various storytelling voices of South Connemara and our Islands; to

re-ignite in our older audiences' memories of times past and to inspire our younger generations to value and participate in this exploration of our Culture.

The series of free events will be hosted by our branch libraries throughout the county and will concentrate on song collecting in North Galway; the musical traditions of South Galway; Sean nós singing from our Gaeltacht areas; storytelling from Connemara and a residency in popular music in East Galway.

This will take place in a number of Branch Libraries including Gort, Ballinslaoe, Tuam, Carraroe, Loughrea & Ougherard. The Residency will be in October with Events taking place throughout November. Cultural Praticioners involved include Aindrias de Staic,musician and Irish storyteller, Máirin Mhic Lochlainn & Nuala Hayes, Storytellers, The Fahys from Ballinakill, Aine Ní Shioradain, Johnny Conneely, Ultan Conlon, musicians and others TBC.

### GALWAY'S FORGED GATES PROJECT





Following on from a very successful Galway Forged Gates Project 2021/2, it is now hoped to embark on another forged gates project in 2023, this due to a major interest expressed in the project in the county with other areas now wanting to be part of the project.


The vernacular forged wrought iron field gate is a very valuable, but often neglected, aspect of the cultural heritage of our rural landscape in county Galway. These field gates were for the most part forged in the local blacksmith's forge. The objective of the project is to collect and collate information, oral heritage and images of forged gates, the craft of the blacksmith and the forge in three locations in County Galway. The locations picked for the 2023 project are Ballymoe, Moylough and Ballinasloe and build the work undertaken as part of the Galway Forged Gates Project 2023.

The project will capture and preserve the significance of the blacksmith and the forge as told by blacksmiths themselves and their descendants as they recall and relay their recollections from childhood memories and stories from their ancestors. This very valuable information will be captured on short films, audio interviews and recordings, photographs, pull-up banners and postcards. Local launches will take place in Ballymoe, Moylough and Ballinasloe. This project is managed by the Heritage Office.

### THE HIDDEN LAKES OF CONNEMARA

Artisan House are running a print of Hidden Lakes of Connemara. It is a publication by four Dutch environmentalists, who have conducted a 35-year+ study of Connemara lakes. In his Foreword to the book, Wetland ecologist, Jim Ryan, writes 'This book ... analysed the botanical and chemical changes which have occurred in their vegetation plots over the 35 years and have identified the main causes of such changes. To my knowledge this is one of the very few long-term studies of this kind in Ireland and is unusual even on a world stage.'

The book contains original watercolour illustrations, poems, and essays, describing changes in the lakes and the landscape highlighting the special nature and beauty of Connemara. While the subject matter is quite specific, the book



is designed in such a way that it will appeal to a general audience who share a deep appreciation of their environment. The study was based in Ballyconneely and Roundstone. This re-publication or this book including new images is supported by the Creative Ireland programme.



### IRISH WORKHOUSE CENTRE, WORDS FROM THE WORKHOUSE



As part of a new initiative in the arts and in collaboration with Portumna Arts Group and the Portumna Pen Pushers Group,

the Irish Workhouse Centre will host a 5-day writing workshop on site, facilitated by Gerard Hanberry, Galway poet, writer and musician.

The participants, in an open invitation from the local community, will include both new and established writers. Following an introductory tour of the Irish Workhouse Centre, the group will meet for a number of sessions under the guidance of Gerry and a series of writings on the Workhouse and the museum artefacts will be then edited and published alongside a series of photographs of the inspiring pieces that each participant selected from the Workhouse. These will be edited by Gerry and become a part of the Workhouse collection. A reading will also take place to launch the publication.

### **TOURISM**

The County Galway Tourism Strategy has commenced its final project stage incorporating stakeholder and agency feedback on draft documents. A Tourism Strategy Briefing was held in the Raheen Woods, Athenry in July. Excellent attendance and engagement by our elected members resulted in a very informative briefing.

A panel of speakers at the briefing consisted of members from Failte Ireland, Galway City Tourism Officer, Cathaoirleach, Chief Executive and Director of Services of Galway County Council. They presented and demonstrated the overarching framework within which tourism is being developed in the County. The panel worked very well together, and this reflected to the elected members who also received a very informative and engaging briefing. We look forward to continuing to work together to realise our shared vision for Tourism development.

All points and queries raised at the briefing is supported by the Strategy bearing in mind the strategic nature of the document.

The speakers stated that the timing of the County Tourism Strategy is excellent with the recently launched Failte Ireland regional plans and the upcoming Destination Experience Development Plan for East Galway by the Ireland's Hidden Heartlands Team.

This Strategy was sent to the statutory environmental bodies as required, there is a timeline of six weeks for return of comments, there may be adjustments based on this feedback before the final strategy is launched and come before Council for consideration and adoption.



The Strategy was presented to the Economic Development & Enterprise SPC, and they agreed the draft to go forward as proposed to Council.





#### MILWAUKEE 2023

Milwaukee Irish Festival is the largest celebration of Irish culture and heritage in the United States and takes place in Lake Michigan in Wisconsin. Members of Galway County Council and Galway City Council attended the four-day festival.

Staff working in the tourism function in Galway County Council worked with the Tourism Officer in Galway City Council and tourism Ireland in designing a new Galway stand, banners, pop ups, backdrop and PR material for the festival showcasing the new Galway Brand.

Maps of County Galway including visitors' attractions, visitor information and Connemara maps were organised and printed in Milwaukee with Pens, Tote Bags and T Shirts for distribution. Further literature and information on County Galway's tourism attractions were also sent over.

This festival has a huge audience of more than 130,000 visitors and was a great opportunity to showcase all what Galway has to offer.







### **ADVERTISING**

Staff in the Economic, Rural and Community Development unit invested in a County based marketing spread for the Connacht Tribune Supplement 2023 edition. 'Where West' is a full colour, high quality magazine circulated throughout the west- from Connemara to the Islands; south to north Galway; north Mayo to south Clare.

4 pages in 'Go West' magazine was also published in the 2023 edition. Galway County Council annually invest in the magazine of Knock Airport- alongside local authority partners in Sligo; Mayo, Roscommon and Galway City. For 2023- coverage includes highlighting festivals and events that are supported by GCC and promoting the best aspects of the visitor experience around the County including North/East Galway and high quality photography to promote Tourism in the County.



### **HOUSING & UKRAINE RESPONSE**

# CROÍ CÓNAITHE

From 1 July 2023, additional support under the Vacant Property Refurbishment Grant is available to support the refurbishment of vacant and derelict properties located on the islands to help bring them back into use.

The maximum rate of the Vacant Property Refurbishment Grant payable is up to 20% higher for eligible vacant and derelict properties on qualifying islands which are Inishbofin, Árainn (Inis Mór), Inis Oírr and Inis Meáin in County Galway.

This brings the maximum grant rates for refurbishing properties on islands up to €60,000 for the refurbishment of vacant properties and up to €84,000 where the property is confirmed to be derelict. The maximum cost limits for the individual works categories are also increased by 20%.

### INFORMATION EVENINGS ON CROÍ CÓNAITHE & LAHL

Two Information evenings on the Croí Cónaithe and the Local Authority Home Loan (LAHL) Schemes are being held in the coming weeks in conjunction with Sustainable Energy Authority of Ireland (SEAI).

The first is being organised by Portumna Chamber of Commerce and will be a gathering of local business and property owners and the venue is Podumna, Portumna (Eircode is H53E953) commencing at 7:30pm on Tuesday 26<sup>th</sup> September.The second is being organised by Kinvara and District Sustainable Energy Community (SEC) and will take place in Kinvara Community Centre on 4<sup>th</sup> October at 7.30pm.

## VACANT HOMES SURVEY

Pathway 4 under Housing for All is the "pathway to addressing vacancy and efficient Use of Existing Stock". The Department have identified 1,727 properties in Galway County as potentially vacant based on Geo Directory Vacancy data. These are all located within 1Km of a settlement buffer. Each of these

properties must be visited to confirm that it is vacant. If it is unclear at the time of the visit, the property must be visited up to three times. Once vacancy has been confirmed a poster will be placed on the property as shown below and details of the schemes available to the Owner to bring the property back into operation will be placed in the letterbox. The Department have developed an app to assist in







carrying out this survey and the survey will be carried out by staff in housing with assistance from the Community Wardens.

### **REPAIR & LEASE SCHEME**

The maximum interest free loan amount available under this scheme has been increased to 80,000 euro. The loan must be repaid over the life of the lease and the property must be rented to Local Authority or Approved Housing Body Tenants.

### TENANT PURCHASE

The Housing (Sale of Local Authority Houses) (Amendment) Regulations 2021 give effect to amendments of the Tenant (Incremental) Purchase Scheme 2016, which include changes to (a) minimum income criteria for applicants and (b) the period of time applicants must have been receiving social housing support to be eligible under the scheme. The amendments come into effect from 1<sup>st</sup> February 2022.

Specifically, the changes are as follows -

i. Minimum income requirements: The minimum income required for an applicant to be eligible to apply under the scheme has been revised downward from €15,000p.a. to €12,500 p.a.

This change will ensure persons whose pension is their primary source of income can now apply under the scheme. **The change only applies to pensions** — other social welfare payments may only be regarded as secondary income.

ii. **Time receiving social housing supports:** The period of time tenants will be required to be in receipt of social housing support to be considered eligible under the scheme has been changed **from one to 10 years**.

In the case of joint tenancies, both tenants must be in receipt of social housing support for at least 10 years before being eligible to apply.








### Clontuskert -

Major refurbishment of the 3 houses in Traveller Specific Group Housing Scheme at Clontuskert completed, including upgrade of waste water treatment facility. Multi-generational family housing facilitated in 1 house to include separate accommodation for 2 Grandparents. Families were provided with temporary housing in 3 mobile homes whilst the works were ongoing.



## Cloonkeen, Attymon -

Traveller Specific property which is being extended and undergoing major renovations to meet the needs of a large family currently residing in homeless services.

### 34 - 36 An Ceathrú Bán, Athenry -

Three houses in the new turnkey housing development in An Ceathrú, Bán, Athenry have been identified as Traveller Specific Accommodation. Two of the properties are occupied by Traveller families and shortlisting is ongoing to identify a family for the third property.

### Cloonlyon, Ballygar -

Substantial upgrade works of 11 properties in Cloonlyon Crescent (6) and Cloonlyon Road (5) has commenced. Each household is moving into a vacant property, which was renovated, on the site whilst work is ongoing in their own property. One property is to be rebuilt, as following a fire it had to be demolished and this is being managed by the Housing Captial team. One prefabricated property is to be demolished and removed from the site. The project is expected to be completed within 22 months.

### Ballygurrane -

Plans have been completed to include an extension for a family with particular health needs and an application for funding is being prepared for submission to the Traveller Accommodation Unit.

### Capital Projects -

Plans for the redevelopment of Tuam Halting Site to provide 12 houses and 3 bays are at the preparation stage and are being advanced in consultation with the residents of the Halting Site.



### TENANT IN SITU

As of the end of August 2023 there are nine properties being progressed under the Tenant in Situ Scheme. These are in a number of locations including Headford, Loughrea, Ballinasloe, Tuam, Gort and other smaller towns.

### CAPITAL BUILD PROGRAMME

# PART 10 PLANNING APPLICATION **DROIM NA GAOITHE, BAILE AN CHLÁIR, CO. GAILLIMHE**

On Friday 18th August, Housing Capital section lodged a planning application under Part 177AE(4)(a) of Planning and Development Act 2000 (as amended) to seek approval from An Bord Pleanála for the development of 88 residential units and creche at Droim Na Gaoithe, Baile an Chláir (Claregalway).

The proposal comprises:  $2 \times 4$ -bedroom  $\times 2$  storey houses,  $19 \times 3$  bedroom  $\times 2$  storey houses,  $18 \times 2$  bedroom 2 storey houses,  $15 \times 3$  bedroom apartments,  $21 \times 2$  bedroom apartments,  $13 \times 1$  bedroom apartments and a Crèche. The proposal includes two new estate entrances, one from R381 (to Oranmore) and one from the L7110.

The proposal is available to view at the planning office in Galway County Council or at the offices of An Bord Pleanála during relevant public office hours. It is also available electronically to view on Galway County Council's Consult portal. Submissions or observations are to be made directly to An Bord Pleanála by 4pm on 29th September 2023.

Elected members of Oranmore Athenry MD were appraised of the scheme with a presentation by Alan Brogan, Executive Engineer at their July meeting.

### PART 8 CAISLEÁN RAITHIN, ARDRAHAN

On Monday 10th July, Eithne Murphy Senior Executive Engineer attended the Loughrea M.D. meeting to present an overview of the Chief Executive Report recommending that the proposal for 10 houses to the rear of the existing Caisleán Raithin estate should proceed as proposed in the Part 8 planning application lodged on 3rd March 2023.

Following consideration of the report, the elected members voted in favour of the proposed development to be carried out as recommended in the report, without any modifications. The project is now progressing to detailed design with a view to tendering for construction in Autumn 2023.

### Gort Na gCloch, Clifden

The final phase Gort Na gCloch was substantially completed in August 2023 and upon completion of Building Control Certification the units will be made available to be occupied.





# Turnkey Acquisition of 32 Units at Eiscir Riada, Dunlo, Ballinasloe

In July, the Housing Capital section successfully completed the turnkey acquisition of phase 1 of this development which consists of 25 units. Included in the 25 units are a mixture of 2, 3 and 4 bed units serving various categories including specific housing for persons with disabilities.



It is anticipated this development will be substantially complete by year end.



#### AFFORDABLE HOUSING SCHEMES

The two avenues of affordable delivery have continuously been advanced. Firstly, affordable housing delivery projects on GCC owned lands is advancing and as mentioned earlier an element of the Drum Na Gaoith project in Claregalway will include affordable delivery. Other affordable projects on GCC owned lands are at early stages with preliminary site studies been completed prior to preparation of a planning application.

The second affordable housing delivery mechanism is through advanced purchase agreements and GCC continue to engage with private land owners/developers in relation to affordable housing delivery. A second call for Expression of Interests for advance purchase agreements will be advertised in the coming weeks.

The cost of construction, lack of a comparative private housing market information and uncertainty of sales is proving to be challenging in delivery of affordable housing.

INFRASTRUCTURE & OPERATIONS DIRECTORATE & FIRE & EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

Government Publish Speed Limit Review Report and the impact this will have on Galway County Councils own Speed Limit Review which is currently underway.







Minister for Transport Eamon Ryan TD and Minister of State Jack Chambers TD have announced the publication of the final report emerging from the recently finalised Speed Limit Review.

The Speed Limit Review is a significant piece of work which aims to address the fragmentation and inconsistency of speed limits on roads all over the country. Consistent and appropriate speed limits across the road network will contribute to increasing road safety.

The National Speed Limit Review, which is a high impact action under the Government's Road Safety Strategy 2021-2030, makes a number of recommendations which include for the following:

- Default speed limit on national secondary roads to reduce from 100km/h to 80km/h.
- Default speed limit for the network of local and rural roads throughout the country to reduce from 80km/h to 60km/h.



• Default speed limit on urban roads, which include built up areas as well as housing estates and town centres, to reduce to 30km/h.

Arterial roads and radial routes around urban settings would be able to remain at 50km/h. There are no proposed changes to the default speed limits on motorways, national primary roads or regional roads contained in the review. The framework allows for some appropriate, upward variations where a road is deemed to be safe and good quality on assessment by local authorities.

There is no doubt that speeding is a significant contributing factor to many collisions. Implementing the recommendations from the Speed Limit Review will allow for a consistent approach to setting of speed limits across the country. The recommendations in the report will help the Council to achieve the Government's Road Safety Strategy 2021–2030 goal of halving fatalities and serious injuries by 2030 and advance towards Vision Zero.

Vision Zero is a strategy to eliminate all traffic fatalities and severe injuries, while increasing safe, healthy, equitable mobility for all. First implemented in Sweden in the 1990s, Vision Zero states that any fatal or serious injuries that occur within the road system are unacceptable. It is considered best practice in road safety according to the World Health Organisation (WHO) and the Organisation of Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD). In best practice, Vision Zero is supported by time-limited targets and performance indicators to reduce deaths and serious injuries.

Changes to the default speed limits will require primary legislation and it is envisaged that the necessary legislation could be passed in Q1 2024. Statutory guidelines will also be updated such that implementation of the Review's recommendations can commence during 2024.

Reducing speed has been fundamentally proven to significantly reduce the risk of death or serious injury in road collisions. The World Health Organisation has estimated that a 5% reduction in average speed could result in a 30% reduction in fatal collisions. Furthermore, the evidence shows that 50% of pedestrians struck by a vehicle travelling at 60km/h will be killed, compared to 29% of pedestrians struck by a vehicle travelling at 50km/h and 5% of pedestrians struck by a vehicle travelling at 30km/h.

With this Government led initiative underway I am provisionally pausing the speed limit review process currently underway in Galway County Council. This is because the review currently under way locally will be undermined by legislative changes in the coming 12 months which will lead to additional costs. The members will be kept up to date with the national led initiate over the coming months.

# Uisce Eireann assumes responsibility for delivery of Water and Wastewater Services.

Pursuant to the Water Services (No.2) Act 2013, Uisce Éireann became the company responsible by statute for owning, operating and maintaining water and wastewater infrastructure and delivering water services and wastewater services in Ireland.





With effect from 00:01hrs last Wednesday 20<sup>th</sup> September 2023, (the "Effective date"), that responsibility passed to Uisce Éireann.

The Effective Date means the date upon which Uisce Éireann will take over Management and Direction of the Local Authority Water Services Staff.

Generally, there will be no changes on the ground to day-to-day operations and reporting lines for staff will remain unchanged.

"Water Services Staff" means Uisce Éireann Personnel and the Local Authority Water Services Staff and these staff will work together across Local Authority offices and Uisce Éireann sites in the delivery of water services.

All water staff of Uisce Éireann & Local Authorities will work together in delivery of water & wastewater services, during the transition. All water staff irrespective of employer will be under the management and direction of Uisce Éireann, from the Effective Date.

#### ATHLONE TO GALWAY GREENWAY - UPDATE



Westmeath County Council, as the lead authority, last week released a press release which is inserted below for ease of reference:

RPS Consulting Engineers were appointed to provide engineering, planning, environmental and other services on the above Cycleway, which forms part of the strategic Dublin Galway route in October 2019. Work has been ongoing since then and the Emerging Preferred Route has been identified and published. Work has also been undertaken on various other elements of the project, which will culminate in the submission of a planning application to An Bord Pleanála.

However, due to the complexity and scale of the 200km Preferred Route together with upward market pressures in recent years, RPS have advised Westmeath County Council that the project is no longer



financially viable for the company, having regard to the fixed price tender sum for the contract as signed in 2019 and have sought mutual termination under the contract with immediate effect.

To minimise any delay on the project and in particular the completion of the design and environmental evaluation phase of the scheme, the parties have agreed to now enter into a process to deal with the issues to hand.

As a result of this development, Westmeath County Council as the lead authority, on behalf of the participating local authorities and TII, is exploring various approaches to identify the most appropriate and effective mechanism for progressing and delivering the scheme through the design and environmental evaluation processes.

Please note that landowner liaison will continue and will not be impacted by this process.

It is self-explanatory in that RPS, due to upward market pressures in recent years, has advised Westmeath County Council (Lead Authority) that the project is no longer financially viable for the company, having regard to the fixed price tender sum for the contract as signed in 2019 and have sought mutual termination under the contract with immediate effect.

I must emphasise that the ongoing and extensive public engagement and landowner liaison will continue during this period of flux between the termination of the commission of RPS and the appointment of new consultants to provide engineering, planning, environmental and other services for the Athlone to Galway Greenway.

In relation to an overall project update,

- The Project Team have continued to meet landowners to finalise the route in more detail.
- The PLOs are currently contacting Landowners to request access to carry out surveys
- Breeding bird surveys such as Barn Owl, Heron, Crane, and Raptor are almost complete.
- Ecological and cultural heritage surveys are required at all locations.
- A number of ecological walkover surveys have taken place at areas of interest.
- Draft EIA Screening and EIA Scoping reports are at review stage.
- Preliminary horizontal and vertical alignment design are at preparation stage.



- Appoint new consultants to provide engineering, planning, environmental and other services.
- Environmental evaluation and preliminary design to be completed.
- Landowners to complete Voluntary Land Acquisition Agreements.
- Application to An Bord Pleanála
- Oral Hearing
- An Bord Pleanála Decision
- Construction of Greenway
- Collision Prevention Programme



- The Senior Engineer in Road Operations and the Divisional Roads Policing Inspector from An Garda Siochana met on 20th July to re-establish the Collision Prevention Programme after a hiatus due to Covid.
- While our Area Teams already link with AGS regularly in the course of their work; from September a regime of formal structured meetings will restart. The meetings will include members of AGS from the Roads Policing Unit, the local Sergeant, and the Area Engineer. The purpose of the meetings is to formally share knowledge and explore whether road factors are at issue in road collisions. This will further support our annual request for funding of works under the Low-Cost Accident scheme.
- This is linked to but separate from the Collision Reporting and Evaluation Procedure which
  takes place after every road fatality in Galway County in those cases the Garda and the Area
  Engineer meet in person at the fatal collision site to record factual information pertaining to
  such collisions and quickly to establish if there are road factors which may have contributed
  to the collision and which need to be remedied.
- Céibh Inis Oírr Improvement and Extension Project
- Summary Scheme Description
- The proposed works comprise the construction of a protective breakwater along with a 90m long extension. This will provide a much better protection to vessels in the harbour than is currently afforded resulting in a total length of 35m of additional berthage.
- The completed scheme will ensure that wave heights within the harbour are greatly reduced increasing safety and extending the time period the pier is usable, contributing significantly to the island's commercial potential while ensuring enhanced quality of life.
- Progress Update
- The project to extend Inis Oírr pier has made significant progress towards a works contractor appointment. Following Departmental approval for the revised Business Case in late June, the tender documents to shortlist suitable contractors were published, and that tender period ended on the 12th of September. Assessment of submissions received will be complete by the end of this month, with publication of the Design & Build Works Tender Documents to follow in October.
- Allowing for the required procurement time periods, it is anticipated that a contractor appointment will be finalised towards the end of Q1 2023. On that basis the current programme indicates that the development will be substantially complete by the end of 2025 and fully operational for the 2026 summer season.
- The acquisition by Compulsory Purchase Order of the terrestrial and marine lands required to
  facilitate the scheme was completed earlier this year. Notice to Treat and Notice of Entry will
  be served on relevant landowners in the coming weeks in preparation for the contract award.
- There has been significant engagement with pier users and the Island community over the past year in particular to prepare for the commencement of works. The aim is to carry out the development with the least disruption possible to island life and pier activity especially. The appointment of a permanent Harbour Master is being progressed and this resource will be in place in advance of the mobilisation of the appointed contractor. This will be of significant benefit in managing the pier and adjacent area over the duration of the contract and thereafter.



# RETAINED FIRE SERVICE INDUSTRIAL ACTION

The Retained FireService industrial Action that was ongoing since the 6th June has been brought to a conclusion with the acceptances by both parties, the LGMA (on behalf on management) and SIPTU (on behalf of the retained fire fighters) of a WRC recommendation.

On 14th August, both parties were invited by the WRC to attend a mediation to find a resolution to the dispute. They met in the WRC on the 16th August and in the early hours of the 17th August was reached. As a result of the agreed recommendation the industrial Action was suspended and the recommendation was put to SIPTU members for ballot. On the 5th September, 63% of the returned ballots voted in favour of accepting the WRC recommendation.

The WRC recommendation containsed all the elements of the Labour Court recommendation with some add-ons in terms of fixed elements of pay. There will be an increase in the Retainer of approximately €2,500 per fire fighter, 40 hours of the new 80 hours of community fire safety work will be incorporated into fixed pay and there is a floor number of calls (75 hours) for which all fire fighters will be paid, whether their station has that number of calls or not. The high rate of pay has changed from 10pm − 7am to 8pm − 8am and all drill hour will now be paid at the high rate. The number of fire fighters will increase in each station to a minimum of 12 personnel, providing the opportunity to



respond to calls on a week on / week off basis. The agreement is effective from the 1st July, and all the new elements of pay are to be backdated to then.

The agreement will have a significant impact on fire service and county council budgets for the remainder of this year and into the future, the effects of which are still being analysed

Many factors are used by the Council to determine if a site location is suitable for planning and the "pre-planning reports" available on this website highlight potential suitability based on several criteria. For example, if a site boundary is located within a Special Area of Conservation (SAC), then it may impact the planning decision. These reports let you know if your proposed site is within an SAC as well as numerous other lookup layers of information, and you can decide from there if it is worthwhile to proceed with an application for planning permission.

It is quick and easy to create your free pre-planning report. You can use the <u>Create Report form</u> and use the map to highlight your proposed site boundary. Once you submit your request, it will take a few seconds to build your report. You will also receive an email with a link to your report so you can revisit the report at a later time.

It is anticipated that the advent of this portal enhance the experience of our customers in accessing and interpreting key planning data and assessment criteria.

An Bord Pleanala has received an application for permission in accordance with Section 37E of the Planning and Development Act 2000 (as amended), from EP Energy Developments Ltd. to develop an Open Cycle Gas Turbine power plant (350MW) and associated infrastructure on land to the north of Tynagh Power Station, Derryfrench, Tynagh, Loughrea, Co. Galway.



#### **Project Description:**

The proposed development will include: Demolition of existing vacant shed structure on site; Installation of an Open Cycle Gas Turbine (OCGT) unit and associated plant

[Including GT enclosure; air intake; stack (40m high) with Continuous Emissions Monitoring System (CEMS); circuit breaker; main, auxiliary and ancillary transformers; switchyard; acoustic barriers; electrical rooms; finfan coolers; skids (to include gas skid, distillate fuel skid, lube oil skid, CO2 firefighting skid); propane store; pump out kiosk; gantry; hardstanding maintenance area]; Lubrication oil and chemical stores [3 no. shed structures]; Secondary fuel storage area [1 no. bunded fuel oil storage tank; fuel treatment plant; fuel forwarding building; fuel unloading area]; Fuel pipe gantry; Demineralised water storage tank and pumphouse; Firewater storage tank and pumphouse; Emergency diesel generator; Above Ground Installation ('AGI') to facilitate connection to existing gas pipeline; A new 220 kV switchyard bay within the existing electricity substation; And all associated ancillary development, site works and services including underground pipework and cabling, upgraded wastewater treatment plant, drainage infrastructure, fencing, internal roadways, lighting, etc.


#### FORWARD PLANNING

#### **ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT & ENTERPRISE**

#### FORMER AIRPORT SITE

Galway County Council have had a number of discussions in recent months with a music promoter in relation to the usage of the airport site for a music festival in 2024. Negotiations are ongoing and the proposal currently is to introduce the event to the market and keep the fees for artists (relatively) low. The promoter uses this model for the Trinity Summer Series in Dublin and in the first year of the Fairview Park series. A memorandum of understanding is in place whereby the commitment is for one year and any consideration for concerts beyond year one will only be if the site is still available for one off uses in the context of the master planning process being completed/bottomed out. The next step in relation to the discussions for a concert series in 2024 will be to draw up a licence agreement between Galway County Council, Galway City Council and the promoter.

#### **MASTERPLAN DEVELOPMENT**

Galway County Council Forward Planning unit have began to progress the Masterplanning process for the former Airport site.

The input of the IDA into the procurement process for consultants has been sought with key areas of action required:

- 1. Infrastructural Survey work
- 2. Spatial Planning
- 3. Design Standards
- 4. Masterplan

It is proposed to present the masterplan framework to the SPC in the first instance, the Municipal District and to a joint City/County SPC meeting to be held in December 2023.

#### **REGENERATION SCHEMES**

#### **ATHENRY**

The Cross Street and Market Square enhancement design package which is being in brought into the wider public realm is currently being finalised for the Part VIII with submission expected in early October. This will form part of Phase 1 of the Athenry Public Realm Enhancement Scheme. The below images give a before and after visualisation of the project. In addition, a proposal brief is being prepared to appoint consultants for the delivery of Town Centre First Plan for Athenry. The TRO will commence formal engagement including the establishment of a Town Team to help deliver the plan through 2024.







#### LOUGHREA TOWN HALL

Construction Tender Documents are being finalised for the Town Hall. These are due to be published on the etender platform with appointment of contractors expected before the end of the year and with a view to construction commencing on site in 2024.

#### **CLIFDEN**

Design consultants LUC and members of the Regeneration team met with local councillors and members of the Connemara Chamber of Commerce and had a productive discussion regarding the public realm plans for Clifden. The Design team are now finalising the planning application with expected submission to An Bord Pleanála before the end of the year.

#### PORTUMNA COURTHOUSE

The construction tender documents for the courthouse are now published on etenders with a tender return date of 27<sup>th</sup> September 2023. Pursuant to tender review and analysis the team expects to appoint contractors before the end of the year with anticipated construction commencing on-site in 2024.

#### **PORTUMNA**

The regeneration team met with members of the Portumna Strategic Partnership at Portumna castle. The partnership works in collaboration to coordinate projects across the town of Portumna. Members include representatives from Waterways Ireland, Coillte, Failte Ireland, the OPW, Inland fisheries and the GCC Regen team.





The public realm and wayfinding plans for Portumna will be going on the 2<sup>nd</sup> round of public consultation at the end of September. The Regeneration Team is exploring different sites across the town with a view to acquiring land for an additional public car park.

# GORT

The Town regeneration Officer has been working closely with the Gort Town Team finalising the content of the pilot Town Centre First (TCF) plan for Gort. The plan is in its closing stages of completion with an expectation to have a formal launch of the final plan in November. The public realm project is in its final stages of detailed design in preparation for the submission of a planning application in quarter 4 of 2023. The Regeneration Team ran a design competition for students at Gort Community College for their design ideas for the new public realm in Gort and presented the winner's prize to her art teacher.





# **HEADFORD**

The Regeneration Team were delighted to support the Headford Town team in the launch of their Reimagine Headford project. The launch was a great success and was well attended including by An Taoiseach Leo Varadkar, Maria Walsh MEP.



## **TUAM**

The Regeneration team is preparing for the funding call for a Category 1 application under the RRDF. It is expected a call for applications will be announced in November. The team are working towards resubmitting an application for the Tuam Town Hall which already has part VIII planning in place.

# **URDF**

GCC Has secured €2,000,000.00 in funding for Tuam, Ballinasloe and Oranmore under the URDF. The award represents a rolling fund which will be used to purchase and bring to the market identified vacant and derelict properties across these settlements. A team is being assembled to manage the fund and work on reducing vacancy and dereliction in our towns and villages.

# THE HERITAGE COUNCIL'S NATIONAL HERITAGE AWARDS

The Heritage Council's National Heritage Awards celebrate the most engaging projects and events organised by National Heritage Week project organisers.

The National Heritage Week Award have been running since 2010 and aim to acknowledge the work done by hundreds of event organisers across the country. Events and digital projects can be nominated for consideration for an award each year. This year, there will be seven award categories (see below), together with the county awards. Reflecting the theme of National Heritage Week this year, the primary focus will be on projects which placed particular emphasis on living heritage. The National Heritage Awards will take place in Gloster House in Co. Offaly on Friday 20<sup>th</sup> October 2023.

#### **AWARD CATEGORIES**

This year's National Heritage Week Awards will comprise the county awards, as well as

several special categories, outlined below.

**National Heritage Hero Award:** Awarded to an individual or organisation that has demonstrated – over a substantial period of time – an outstanding contribution to the protection and promotion of heritage. This award is based on nominations from the public.

**Living Heritage Award:** Awarded to the event or project that successfully encouraged a greater appreciation of an element of our Living Heritage- traditional crafts, skills, and practices.

**Wild Child Award:** Awarded to an event or project that successfully encouraged children and families to get outdoors and enjoy and explore the heritage and biodiversity in their locality; to look at the world around them differently; to open their eyes to the diverse beauty of the landscape in their area.

**Water Heritage Award:** Awarded to an event or project that best explored how a canal, river, lake or sea shaped the heritage of a locality or celebrates water as an integral part of our natural heritage, as well as being a vital part of our future, or reflects on what more we can do to conserve this valuable resource. The Water Heritage Award is in association with the Local Authority Water Programme.

**Inclusive Event Award:** Awarded to an event or project that made a special effort to share heritage with everyone in the community across age groups, including those who are; new to heritage; those who do not have local roots; those who have additional accessibility needs.




**Irish Language Award:** Awarded to an event or project that took place through the Irish Language and/or encouraged participation or activity in the Irish language.



OVER 40,000 GRAVEYARD MEMORIAL RECORDS RELEASED AS PART OF GALWAY COUNTY DIGITAL MAPPING OF GRAVEYARDS PROJECT





Over 40,000 graveyard memorial records were released as part of Galway County Digital Mapping of Graveyards Project. The aim of the project is to support our communities and diaspora to connect with their past by unlocking valuable graveyard data sources and making them available as open-source data that will be free for all to use.

Galway County Council working with various community groups and organisations have been collecting and collating valuable data relating to those who are buried in various graveyards for several years. Galway County Council, with funding from the Heritage Council, the Open Data Engagement Fund and its own resources has developed and made available an app specifically for use by surveyors at the local level for memorial surveys, along with associated data management and validation processes. In addition to this Galway County Council, Galway Rural Development, Forum Connemara, and the Heritage Council has provided funding to local groups to employ experts to work with and train local communities on how to use this technology and to undertake drone mapping of graveyards. Through this funding and the hard work and dedication of community volunteers we how are in the position to make available these 40,000 records.

It is proposed to transfer and update more memorial records and also to map graveyards and record further memorial inscriptions in the coming months and years; subject to available resources. A Burial Search Application has been created to allow easy searching and display of the data.

The launch of this project took place in Ellis Hall, Letterfrack on Monday 14<sup>th</sup> August.

## LOCAL BIODIVERSITY ACTION FUND (LBAF) PROJECT UPDATES

## Blue Dots of Connemara

Situated on Ireland's west coast, Connemara has long hosted some of our most pristine and sensitive waters. These waterbodies are a refuge for species which were once commonly found across Europe and Ireland but are now sadly in decline. Under European Union guidelines, Ireland must prevent the ecological deterioration of all surface waters; we, and our communities, have a vital role to play in achieving the aim that water bodies in healthy ecological condition or 'High Status' should not decline. The EPA have identified the waters in Ireland that should have a high-status objective, and these are more commonly known as Blue Dot waters or Blue Dots. Galway County Council has partnered with LAWPRO to develop a suite of measures to raise awareness about the Blue Dot sites of Connemara. These include a short documentary which was launched for Water Heritage Day on the 20<sup>th</sup> August. The 18-minute video on the Galway County Council YouTube Channel has been watched over 1,300 to date and showcases Connemara's beautiful habitats and nature. Ten primary schools across Connemara were selected for a half day workshop, which included kick-sampling and learning about the factors that influence the water quality in their local catchments. These workshops were delivered between the 4<sup>th</sup> – 8<sup>th</sup> September.

Coastal Amenity Planting for Communities Workshop: 6<sup>th</sup> – 7<sup>th</sup> September 2023.

This workshop was developed in response to a direct request made by a number of the coastal Tidy Town groups who wished to develop their amenity planting schemes in a more sustainable manner and resilient to the tough growing conditions experienced along our coasts. Through the Local Biodiversity Action Fund from the NPWS, a group of 12, including members of community groups, horticulturists and ecologists travelled to Mullaghmore, Co. Sligo and Falcarragh, Co. Donegal. Training was provided on native plant species that occur in dune and coastal habitats, how to document them in citizen science initiatives with the National Biodiversity Data Centre and which native species could be incorporated into amenity planting schemes. Seamus O'Donnell at Cluain na dTór Seaside Gardens and Nurseries demonstrated how the combination of native planting and ornamental planting can work together to survive the exposed conditions. This trip was particularly successful as it cultivated links within our own coastal communities from Kinvara to Inishbofin, together with groups in Mullaghmore and Cliffoney with Ruth Hanniffy, Sligo County Council Biodiversity Officer.







## LOCAL AUTHORITY CORPORATE PLAN 2024-2029 AND THE PUBLIC SECTOR EQUALITY AND HUMAN RIGHTS DUTY



Irish Human Rights and Equality Commission The Irish Human Rights and Equality Commission wrote to the Chief Executive in April 2023 to note that Local Elections and subsequent new corporate planning cycle for local authorities will take place in 2024 and take the opportunity to highlight Galway County Council's statutory obligations under Section 42 of the Irish Human Rights and Equality Commission Act 2014 ("the Duty") which is to promote equality of opportunity, eliminate discrimination and protect human rights; of all service users, policy beneficiaries and employees, across all function areas.

The correspondence advises that the Commission will develop and implement a strategic programme of work applicable to the local government sector during 2023/24 to support local authorities in meeting their obligations under the duty.



Section 42(2) (a) of the Irish Human Rights and Equality Commission Act 2014 requires an organisation to set out in its strategic plan "an assessment of the human rights and equality issues it believes to be relevant to the functions and purpose of the body and the policies, plans and actions in place or proposed to be put in place to address those issues."

In advance of the forthcoming corporate planning cycle Galway County Council is progressed an initiative to implement the Public Sector Equality and Human Rights Duty (the Duty). A crossorganisational working group was established to create the conditions necessary for effectively and efficiently implementing the Duty. The core task for the working group is to create the conditions for implementation of the Duty. This involved working with an external consultant to develop key foundations of:

- An equality and human rights values statement to provide a frame and benchmarks for implementing the Duty;
- Assessment of equality and human rights issues relevant to the functions of Galway County Council, the first step required under the Duty; and
- Implementation Plan for the Duty in Galway County Council.

The initiative will ensure inclusive policies and practices continue while informing the implementation of the Duty in this new corporate planning cycle.



The Management Team, on the 25th July 2023, adopted Galway County Council's Public Sector Duty Implementation Plan. Galway County Council will, once translated, publish, the plan on our website <a href="www.galway.ie">www.galway.ie</a>. In addition, Galway County Councill will

publish its human rights and equality assessment, and the policies, plans and actions in place or proposed to be put in place to address the issues identified in the assessment, in a manner that is accessible to the public in our strategic plan. We will also report, in a manner that is accessible to the public, on developments and achievements – in respect of the policies, plans and actions in place or proposed to be put in place to address issues identified in our assessment - in our annual report.



## PROMOTION OF GALWAY COUNTY AS VISITOR DESTINATION AT MILWAUKEE IRISH FEST


#### AUDIENCE METRICS - FACEBOOK








## LAW AGENTS UPDATE

There have been various successful prosecutions in terms of enforcement in both areas of planning and environment in recent months, examples of which are outlined below and by way of copy news reports.

These include, among others, significant planning enforcement Court Orders and subsequent enforcement of the terms therein, as and when required, such as the following:

- Demolition of an unauthorised residential structure located at Rossadilisk, Co. Galway. The unauthorised structure was understood to have been used as a recreational rental property. The Defendant has been afforded a further period of time until October 2023 to demolish the structure, in its entirety, or face a term of imprisonment.
- Demolition of an unauthorised commercial shed at Caoran Beag, Co. Galway. The council made formal application for Attachment & Committal for failure to comply with the terms of a Court Order for demolition. The matter came before the court on Tuesday the 19<sup>th</sup> September and has been adjourned peremptory against the Defendant to December 2023, thus affording him further time within which to complete the demolition works which have commenced on site.
- Demolition of an unauthorised residential structure located at Errislanen, Clifden, Co. Galway. The council have been successful in seeking a Court Order for the demolition of this unauthorised dwelling, for which planning permission for an agricultural storage unit had been granted previously.
- Successful prosecution for illegal burning of waste pursuant to the Waste Management Act, 1996. The Defendant has been ordered to pay a fine in the sum of €2,000.00, together with the legal costs of the council by the 10<sup>th</sup> October 2023.

## BALLINASLOE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT UPDATE

The Ballinasloe Horse Fair and Festival 2023 will be held from the Sunday 1st until Saturday the 7th of October 2023. The BHFF is a multi-faceted event that incorporates much of Ballinasloe's town centre. The Festival Co-Ordinating Committee includes representatives from:

- Galway County Council
- An Garda Siochana
- Ballinasloe Horse Fair & Festival Committee

This committee is involved in organising the festival and running the many events / activities that form part of it. While much of the October fair is centred on Equestrian activities there is also a range of other elements including markets, a street stage, Tug of war, pyro technical display and others. The fair is spread over 9 days and has varying levels of activities during this period, the weekends being the busiest. Event Overview and Location It is anticipated that up to 25,000 persons could potentially visit the horse fair per day. This figure would be a peak number. However, there are peak days and off-peak days.

The Horse fair is based around and in the fair green this is divided to provide separate areas for the following:

- Green Parking: This parking area is reserved for people who are displaying at the Fair rather than patrons in general.
- Food Vendor Area: This is a fenced area that separates the horses and animals from the food vendors and their associated back of house working areas.
- Church Hill: This is used for caravans who stay for the duration of the event.
- Lunging Arena; This is used for equine events and is part of a larger enclosure that includes facilities for administering the equine events as well as a spectator area.

### THE TOWN CENTRE

The Town Centre is closed for general traffic on Sunday & Monday, October 1st & 2nd and on the following Saturday, October 7th as a number and variety of street traders are in the town as part of the event. There is a general road closure to include:

- Society Street
- Dunlo Street
- Main Street

This creates a pedestrian zone which includes the town square. A gig rig (40 ft truck trailer) is set up at the following locations:

- Friday 6th October @ Car Park behind County Council Buildings
- Saturday 7th October @ Junction of Dunlo Street and Society Street.



## THE SHOW SOCIETY

The Show Society will hold a show jumping event on Saturday the 23rd September; they will use the Fair Green as a parking area. The Show Society will operate their grounds as a parking site for the October fair events Site Location The event site is broadly divided into three areas, the Fair green, the street stalls and the funfair as illustrated below:






# **MODULAR HOMES**





#### **DUNMORE NEWS**



Links between Tuam and Straubing were established through the contacts of Willi Kiefel, a native from the Straubing area living in Tuam in 1980's. In the mid 1980's a study done by the Tuam historian Dr. Tony Claffey suggested a twinning with the Bavarian town of Straubing. The main reasons were common heritage, religious and cultural connections from the early days of Irish Missionaries in Bavaria, common traits in character

By 1987 most of Tuam's Secondary Schools had introduced German as a subject. Consequently, both towns were interested in a pupil exchange programme. These exchanges have continued every year



since 1989. Furthermore, an increasing awareness of Germany as Ireland's second most important trading partner led to the establishment of a Twinning Committee within the Tuam Chamber of Industry and Commerce.

Other successful relationships include:

- In 1991 Tuam Town Commissioners and Straubing City Council signed and ratified a formal partnership between the two towns.
- Theatre and Music groups from both towns have visited each other.
- Students from Tuam went to Straubing for the summers for holiday jobs while an increasing number of visitors from Straubing come to Tuam for holidays on private arrangements.
- A street in Straubing has been named after Tuam.
